# First Time Attendee's Reflections

# A 'Maze' of Grace—

## *If God Loves Me, Why Bother? Or How Do I Find My Way through the Maze?*

Pastor Brenda Frelsi lead us through the Convention Bible study. Here are a few of the points:

The bad news – all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God. That's where grace comes in – we get to do good

works because of the grace already given to us. Ephesians 2:4-10 asks us to remember that we receive grace not because we deserve it but because it is God's gift – so we don't get to brag. How do we find our way through the maze of life and experience God's grace? Sometimes we can't even read the signs!

Bonhoeffer shared "Cheap Grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, baptism without church discipline, communion without confession...Cheap grace is grace with-



out discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, living and incarnate." This ignores the price Jesus paid for our sinfulness. It might also infer that since God extends grace, why not just believe and do nothing? But we are encouraged to walk our talk – live what we believe.

Somehow, our faith guides us to be people who extend the grace of God given to us through Jesus, to others. This is done out of love—and it isn't cheap. It's risky and maybe costly. We are called to allow God's love and grace to move us to love our neighbors—do good works.

Maybe it is good to get lost in this maze of grace! Grace would then surround us and we might be able to do what we would not be able to do otherwise as we serve others. The greatest thing we can do is love God, love others and love ourselves enough to be sure that what we do for others might make a difference. Everyone wins when we all give love. Grace is amazing—because it is unexpected, unearned and life-giving. God's grace allows us to realize just how precious that grace is. Peace grows the longer we live and walk in the maze of God's grace. (Source: Brenda's notes)

## The story behind the plaque: A Maze of Grace

When you think of a maze, what comes to mind? Bumping into walls? Feeling lost? Running into dead ends? Losing your direction? Taking wrong turns? That's exactly what happens in this maze called life.....however, because of the grace of Jesus Christ, we do not remain lost in our maze. He guides us through—we only hit dead ends and make wrong turns when we think we can do it all by ourselves.

Let me tell you about a woman who lived her own maze of grace.

This woman was diagnosed with scoliosis—curvature of the spine—when she was a young child. To correct this, she had a new and experimental

surgery in which 6 bones from a cadaver were placed along her spine. This happened when she was 11 years old. She spent the next 2 years of her life in a hospital bed in a full body cast. Think about it. A girl at that age with a body trying to grow and hormones kicking in. At age 13 she was finally freed from her body cast. She then had a growth spurt. Because of that, she ended up with a large hump on the right side of her back. This was a "deformity" that she was embarrassed about for her whole life.

This young girl was denied her high school diploma because her physical limitations kept her from passing the physical requirements of Phys. Ed!

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Her maze included some happy things, too. She met a wonderful man and they married....at the Little White Chapel in Las Vegas. Yes, they eloped.

She and her husband became parents to two daughters.

Continuing in her maze, her insecurities caused her to become dependent on alcohol and prescription drugs, mainly Valium, to get her through her days. (The drug of the 60s.) She shared, later, that she needed to take a Valium just to answer a knock at the door.

She began her sobriety journey when her eldest daughter was 10 years old. Her cold turkey withdrawal at home caused seizures, shakes and other withdrawal symptoms. Her daughters ran across the street to get help from a neighbor who just happened to be a nurse and who just happened to be home. (Sounds like a God-thing to me!)

This woman began attending Alcoholics Anonymous meetings where she found women who understood her, supported her, and loved her. She found and felt the grace of God in this environment.

She became a sponsor and lifelong friend to numerous women in her AA groups. The were drawn to her because she listened and did not judge.


She earned her GED about the same time as her eldest daughter graduated from high school.

She beat breast cancer!

This woman was known for having the gift of listening. She kept the confidences of those who shared their thoughts and feelings with her. She never gossiped or talked behind someone's back. She knew what it felt like to be ridiculed and talked about and never did it to anyone else.

This woman was my Mom.

Mom celebrated each of her sobriety anniversaries by making a special gift in multiples and giving them to the women in both of the AA groups she regularly attended (on Monday night and Wednesday afternoon) and to her family. She had wonderful thoughts that she turned into inspirational reminders. One of my favorites is a little plaque that says, "I will not SHOULD on myself today." My sister and I each have collections of many of these gifts.



As the years added up she still had one specific idea that she just couldn't think of how to put together. Over several years she asked me, my sister, my son, her friends, her sisters, and anyone that was creative, crafty or artistic to help make her idea into something she could give away on her next anniversary.

My cousin, Stephanie, who is an artist, took Mom's idea and created a design based on Mom's maze of grace theme. Mom wanted to share that not only is God's grace amazing, it is truly a maze of grace.

On her 46th sobriety anniversary in October of 2013, she finally was able to give out those very special little plaques with her message and Steph's design. This was the gift she had wanted to share for so many years. About seven months later she passed away. So fitting that this special message was the last anniversary gift she gave.

All of the walls, wrong turns and dead ends of her maze led her to a place where she was able to help others through their own mazes. She taught me that our Lord leads us through this maze called life....we just have to hold His hand (it's always there) and let Him lead.

Each of us is going through our own maze of grace. I thank God for his guidance, his unconditional grace, and his never ending love.

# Message From Bishop Gonia

Dear beloved sisters in the Rocky Mountain Synodical Women's Organization,

Grace and peace be with you from our Lord Jesus. I am truly sorry that I am not able to be with you



in person for your Annual Convention. I have appreciated the time I have spent with you in the past, and pray that your time of shared study, conversation and fellowship proves fruitful.

As you may know, our synod theme for this year has been **For the Life of the World**. In various ways, we have been exploring how the Spirit has gifted us for our life, ministry and witness as the

part of Christ's Body known as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. We've been discovering the many ways we are uniquely blessed to be Church Better Together – in our congregations, synod and beyond – not for our own benefit or survival, but for the very life of the world. It's really that big!

To be church for the life of the world requires faithful leadership. At a time when our globe faces unprecedented challenges, our nation is mired in polarization and our church is seeking the way forward, I am convinced that the leadership of women matters more than ever. This past summer six of our 65 ELCA synods elected women to serve as bishops. While not diminishing the gifts of men, the selection of these women leaders speaks to the unique perspective and capacity that women bring to leadership in the church. I am deeply grateful for the gifts and passion of our

new colleagues and I look forward to their contribution to our life together.

At our recent Conference of Bishops meetings, the 17 women now serve as ELCA bishops enjoyed a dinner together. Afterwards, Bishop Kristen Kuempel (Eastern Washington – Idaho Synod), shared these reflections:

*I gave up a lot when I became bishop. I gave up time with my family. I gave up a congregation that I love. I gave up anonymity. In some ways, I gave up some of my autonomy.*

*But I got a lot in return. Chief among those is this sisterhood of women, who work alongside our brother bishops to effect lasting and important*

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*change in our denomination. It is hard, slow work. There are a LOT of critics. But I challenge you to find people more dedicated to the future of the congregations under our care.*

*As bishops, we know change is coming. But as female bishops, I think we perceive it more as labor and birth, rather than death. It will be hard. There will be cries, and pain, and tearing, and tears. But at the end—a day full of grace! Something new and infinitely precious.*

*So these women will do what women have done for millenia when birthing something new. We will lean on one another. We will laugh and cry. We will hold hands. We will sing songs and pray prayers and tell stories about the women who have traveled this road ahead of us, and left signposts along the way. We will break bread together. We will invoke the name of the Holy One.*

*Just as the women of God have always done.*

We in the church have not always recognized or honored the gifts of women. In fact, too many

of our Lutheran churches around the world still do not ordain women, including our companion church in Madagascar. At a time when the **#me too** movement has created the opportunity for women to publicly share their experiences of abuse and harassment, it's my prayer that women will also be emboldened to continue saying, "Me, too!" when it comes offering their gifts of leadership within our church. Imagine our future as the ELCA if even more women shared their gifts as leaders, helping us live into the interdependence of our relationships, fostering true collaboration instead of competition and promoting the well-being and dignity of all God's beloved children rather than the privileged alone. I am grateful for the way in which the RMSWO continues to provide leadership in our synod and supports women in leadership throughout our church. My prayer is that the Spirit will continue to empower you and make you bold for the sake of the gospel and for the life of God's beloved world.




## Writing Devotions

# Convention Report on Resolutions and Memorials

As is customary during the business meeting of the Convention, there is a report from the Reference and Counsel/Resolutions Committee. This year, Julie Elmquist, as Chair of that committee, presented the following Resolutions and Memorials for the consideration of the Voting Members.

## **Resolution 2017.01:      Act to end Human Trafficking**

This resolution was adopted by the Women of the ELCA and is of great concern also to the women of the Rocky Mountain Synod. We have brought attention to this issue by the presence of information and/or a representative of Sarah's Home at our Synod events and have helped support them through offerings. Sarah's Home works to free young women from human trafficking in Colorado.

The resolution passed at the RMSWO 2018 Convention and a portion of it follows here:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Women of the ELCA connect with others fighting human trafficking such as local and regional task forces and service groups including Lutheran Social Services, and

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that synodical women's organization presidents report what they have done to fight human trafficking and support its victims at the 2019 Conference of Presidents."

## **Resolution 2017.03:      Engage Women of the ELCA in supporting leadership needs in the ELCA**

Portions of this resolution that passed at the 2018 Convention are as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED that we call upon Women of the ELCA to pray for God's guidance and direction in the spirit of All Anew, encouraging women to pursue attendance at seminary for leadership in support of congregations churchwide to fill the needs of our church; and

BE IT RESOLVED that the resolution be sent to

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton who has set an example for like-minded women to use their skills and faith to address the leadership needs of the ELCA."

## **Memorial 6: Regarding domestic abuse and violence and its prevention**

Portions of this memorial that passed at the 2018 Convention are as follows:

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Women of the ELCA be encouraged to act by choosing from the following options:

Posting information for local domestic violence hotlines...,

Financially supporting the local domestic abuse and violence shelters...,

Volunteering at a local domestic abuse and violence shelter, ...

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that synodical women's organization presidents report at the 2019 Conference of Presidents what they have done to raise awareness of domestic violence."

## **Memorial Region 3:Current for Curran**

As Women of the ELCA came out in strong support for "PV for Phebe," support is now requested on behalf of the Curran Hospital in Liberia, Africa. Located near Guinea and Sierra Leone, the Curran Hospital was founded and supported since 1924 by the Lutheran Church. The solar panels requested for the hospital will not only provide electricity for the hospital, but extra electricity can be sold, which will generate revenue for the hospital.

The memorial passed at the 2018 RMSWO Convention concludes as follows:

"Region 3 Presidents recommend that all 64 SWOs of the Women of the ELCA support Current for Curran through prayer and financial support. We would like to challenge each synod to give

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\$3000. This would enable the installation and completion of the Current for Curran Project.

The Women of the ELCA made PV for Phebe a reality and we believe that the Women of the ELCA can make Current for Curran a reality as well."

As we enter the season of Advent, this devotional by the Rev. Katie Hines-Shah, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Hinsdale, Illinois, will help us begin to see that the Christmas story is also the story of life in faith.

### Winter Bible study: Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John

Get ready to reconnect with Jesus this winter in



Simply click on the yellow rectangle! This takes you to a page that asks for your e-mail Address, your first & last name, and to check a box stating if you are a Pastor, Associate in Ministry, Diaconal Minister, or Deaconess. Below this you should check the box that states: “I wish to receive e-Connection each week.”
3. Finally, click on the bottom bar that says “Sign Up.” That’s it! Remember, this is a free subscription to the synod e-mail weekly newsletter. You will receive notice of new issues of our Views from the Rockies newsletters from the synod’s e-Connection e-mail.
