



ADULT EDUCATION SUNDAY MORNING: This morning we will welcome Rabbi Megan Doherty who will be speaking about the Jewish holiday of Purim, which is based off of the story of Esther. Next Sunday, we will watch the first part of the new documentary Won't You Be My Neighbor, based on the life of Fred Rogers.

ADULT EDUCATION WEDNESDAY EVENING: This coming Wednesday night Carl McDaniel will begin his 5-week series entitled: Building Durable Communities: Lessons for a Livable Planet.

"Building Durable Communities combines two concepts: Durable: continuing to exist, stable; Communities: groups of organisms—animals (including humans), microbes, plants—living together in the same environment. These concepts frame the fundamental challenge before humanity: Can we create and sustain durable communities in which humans can fulfill their highest ethical aspirations as articulated by humanity's world religions?" Sessions will run from 6:45pm-7:45pm on Wednesday night in the JFO Room.

Oct. 10th: Creating a 21st landscape

Oct. 17th: Replicating 21st century homes; new and rehabilitated

Oct. 24th: Creating durable communities, watersheds, and regions

Oct. 31st: No Supper or adult education

Nov. 7th: Creating a durable future: messages from survival of Shackleton's Endurance Party and history of changing cultural beliefs in Western civilization.

CROP WALK This year's area CROP Walk will be Sunday afternoon October 7, at 2 pm, from the Vermilion United Church of Christ Congregational. This will be a full afternoon for our own church schedule; but Lou and Jim Deitz can receive your pledges and turn them in. Enfolding Love World Communion Sunday

What were you doing in fifth grade? In Orange County, North Carolina there is an embodiment of Love of Children and Love of Neighbor and she's in 5th grade. She is a member of the Hillsboro United Church of Christ. Instead of Christmas presents last year she asked for blankets and socks for people in the local homeless shelter. She's been doing this kind of thing since she was seven years old. For her seventh birthday she got 71 coats delivered to the shelter. This year she's headed to a family shelter to read to the children.

Maya's morn is a single mother and when asked where Maya developed her boundless love, her morn says it was the church that helped raise her. How much more love our churches could share if we raised all our children this way. Maya sees that she has enough for her life and the joy she takes in giving is palpable to all who see her.

Love of Neighbor should be that visible. It is the way Jesus is resurrected into the world, through the church, through the way we raise our children, through how we show love.

Dorothee Soelle, was a theologian and Professor at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. She wrote a poem about Jesus needing us called Not Without You. This is an excerpt:

Help him
that's what faith is
he can't bring it about
his kingdom
couldn't then couldn't later can't now
not at any rate without you
and that is his irresistible appeal

This is a good way to think about our campaign for "A Just World" and "Three Great Loves." We are the expressed love of Jesus to the world. We are his hands. When we read in the Gospels that Jesus said we should receive the Realm of God like a child, we can imagine the love of Maya and the tears of joy she sheds because people who were cold are now warm.
