

Once again, we're supporting multi-platform worship by researching and noting material that is permissioned for online use. We will identify those online permissioned pieces with an asterisk by the title of the suggested resource, as well as with "permission notes" beneath the title information that document the source of that online permission.

A Reminder About Partial Texts and "Pointing not Publishing": To honor legal and relational standards, we do not include the full pieces of authors' works unless we've received explicit permission to do so. We want all subscribers to clearly understand that our worship packets are *research* packets not *publications*, which means we focus on "*pointing*" to where you can find fair use and publicly available pieces, rather than on "*publishing*" original writings and full resources. Our main service to you is theme-based *curation* and *research*, done in the service of saving professionals time.

A Note About Author Titles: Many of the authors we refer to are ministers. Some ministers prefer to be credited with their title "Rev.", others don't, and still others are fine either way. Our practice is to follow whatever practice was used in the source material we reference.

“Do you remember what we learned this past summer?
Deep within the history of our universe, there have been galaxies dancing together. Stretching each other.
Did you see it? Did you see the pictures of NASA’s Webb Telescope? We now know. No wait. We can now see: 5 galaxies. Let’s stop there.
One galaxy is a huge collection of gas, dust, billions of stars, and each of those stars’ solar systems held together by gravity.
This week we saw images of five galaxies. I can’t actually conceptualize that. But what I’ve learned is that four of those interact. They are pulling on one another. They are influencing each other. They are forming baby stars.
Yes, baby stars behind the curtain of dust and gas in what are called Cosmic Cliffs.
When I’ve been picturing cliffs lately, I’ve only seen us falling down, falling off.
Remember that early computer game where the lemmings fall thoughtlessly into an abyss, a straight shot down to their demise? Following their leader, who is following their leader and so on all because the controller couldn’t redirect them?

Cosmic Cliffs create something new. Whole universes. Whole solar systems. Possibility.

What if we decided this image, these images, came at just the right time? When the world, our tiny, teeny gorgeous ornate inimitable world feels so incredibly despairing. What if we learned to look differently at it, at us? If we began to wonder about what we didn't know, couldn't see, couldn't even conceptualize really, but took up the practice of zooming in, zooming out.

We'd have to stop following the followers. We'd have to start with curiosity. We'd have to begin with the truth that we are but a speck; yes, important, beloved, worthy of life and love and health and safety, but still, a grain of sand in a thousand stunning deserts.
