

Going Around in Circles: Sardines, Cicadas, & Submarines

Bob Tredwell

Why do herring get caught in a weir? The weir has no bait and no moving parts. Flounder don't get caught in the weir; they swim in the open door and swim back out the way they came in. Understanding herring will lead us to follow the winding trail of a couple of simple ideas—flocking and predator satiation—through many fields: computer simulation, the flight of starlings, seventeen-year locusts, Second World War convoys, marching bands, why nut trees produce huge crops in some years, and how railroads drove the passenger pigeon extinct. Before we understand herring, we'll find more things to see and wonder at.

Bob Tredwell, PVSC President, teaches courses for PVSC for any practical purpose or all practical purposes. Recent courses include "Secret Writing," "Measure for Measure," "The Ways of Paradox," "How do we know that?" and "The Transposed Heads and Other Stories."



Biotechnology Innovations That Affect Our Everyday Lives

Dr. Nancy Kravit

How do developments in biotechnology affect our lives? After an introductory overview lecture, students will be asked to come with a biotechnology process that they've seen in their own lives and would like to know more about, for example, how it works, what are the pitfalls, (modern advertising usually touts the benefits and ignores any negative aspects). Examples include DNA testing to determine ethnic heritage, home pregnancy tests (that are now expanding to disease testing like home flu tests), medical tests done in hospitals, or enzymes in things like detergents. Discussion questions are encouraged.

Dr. Nancy Kravit has a Ph.D. in cell physiology and biophysics, and M.S. degrees in both chemical engineering and cell biology, and has been affiliated with leading research institutions including Harvard, Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Washington University Medical School. In 30 years as a research scientist, Dr. Kravit has developed important new techniques in the areas of cell biology and protein chemistry and has discovered several new genes. She has now discovered and patented 2 novel enzymes for use in the pulp and paper and biofuels industries.

Preserving & Sharing Your Family History

Jane McLean and John Elberfeld

We all have artifacts, including letters, photos, textiles, and heirlooms, that tell our family's story. In the first three sessions the instructors will present a process for decision-making, as well as current methods for handling, cleaning, and storing family items. During the final three weeks they will demonstrate ideas for passing on this story to family members, the local area, or the global community through the internet. They will provide an extensive handout and display relevant books and artifacts at each class.

John and Jane are dyed-in-the-wool Yankees who recently retired to the coast of Maine. John is a former math/science/computer teacher and amateur genealogist, with a master's degree from University of Rochester. Jane is a retired speech-language pathologist, special educator, and community theater performer, with a master's degree from SUNY Geneseo. This husband-and-wife team has training and experience in archival techniques, creating exhibits, and research.



Classes will focus on various men and units from Maine in the US Civil War. Much of the material will be based on the books we have written which detail the actions of Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain, the Battle of Petersburg, the 22nd Maine Infantry, and the 2nd Maine Cavalry.

Diane and Ned Smith are Civil War historians and authors who live in Holden, Maine. With five books between them currently in publication and more on the way, they have been frequent speakers at historical societies and Civil War Roundtables around the country.

A Citizens Guide to Climate Change

Glen Koehler

Stories abound about climate change, extreme weather, fossil fuels, and renewable energy. But what does it all mean? This presentation will cover (1) the history and basic scientific understanding of climate change; (2) some of the economic and environmental consequences of continued greenhouse gas emissions; (3) A brief look at psychology, politics, policy, and efforts to reduce climatic disruption and preserve the hospitable environment that has allowed human civilization to thrive.

While there are differences of opinion about the effect of confronting people with the facts about climate change, it seems to me that society will not respond until people understand what is happening and the consequences of our choices. Insight into the mechanisms and scope of climate change, while alarming, is much better than an undefined sense of dread. Understanding the problem is the basis for discovering opportunities to address it.

Glen Koehler is a biologist who assists apple growers with pest management decisions. That work involves regular interaction with weather and led to development of the Ag-Radar system to translate weather information into guidance for farm management decisions and led to awareness of the importance of changes in weather and climate that are already underway. (This presentation is a personal activity and is not an official representation of the organizations with which Mr. Koehler is associated.)
