Fall 2018 Course Descriptions

Monday Courses

Global Climate Change

October 1, 8, 15, & 22

10:00 am - 12:00 Noon

NO LIMIT

Climate change is the biggest problem facing civilization today. Our grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and descendants not yet born will live in a climate vastly different from which we have now. This course will explain the science of greenhouse gas warming, how carbon dioxide is produced, and the carbon cycle. We will look at the earth as a system with four components: atmosphere, hydrosphere, biosphere, and geosphere, and see how the warming driven by increasing carbon dioxide effects each of these components. We will investigate the climate change predictions out to 2100, and the environmental, social-economic, health, and political effects these changes will produce. Finally, we will turn to many of the solutions being implemented now and proposed for the future to mitigate climate change.

Instructor: Dan Koch is retired from Mt. Desert Island High School, where he taught Chemistry, Math, and Special Education. With a co-worker, he developed and implemented a Portfolio Project for the chemistry curriculum at MDIHS, where students researched the aspects and implications of Climate Change.

Session #1: Hugh Curran will resume acquainting his audience with the ecological practices of Celtic and other nature-oriented cultures. From the computer dictionary: "Deep Ecology is an environmental movement and philosophy that regards human life as one of many equal components of a global ecosystem." Session #2: This session will deal with the cultural influence of immigrants from Celtic areas on the culture of the northeastern United States.

Instructor: Hugh Curran was born in Donegal, Ireland in a Gaelic-speaking family. After immigrating to northern Canada, the family lived in Ontario & Alberta. He attended St. Francis University in Nova Scotia &, after moving to the U.S., he studied psychology at Temple University, later becoming a Zen monastic at the Rochester Zen Center. He made an extensive pilgrimage to religious centers in India & Japan. In Maine, he became a founding member of the Morgan Bay Zendo, where he is on the Board of Directors & guides retreats. He currently teaches courses & workshops on Celtic Mythology & Early Irish Literature. Hugh maintains a deep interest in Celtic matters & continues to explore the golden age of Celtic spirituality, especially Irish & Scottish spirituality from the 6th to the 10th centuries.

Blue Hill Rifle & Pistol Club

The Wild West lives on at the Blue Hill Rifle & Pistol Club in the shooting sports of Cowboy Action Shooting, Cowboy Fast Draw, & Gong Shooting (buffalo hunting). Participants use firearms of the Wild West era, original or reproductions. The Buffalo Hunters shoot single-shot black powder cartridge rifles at steel buffalo targets. Fast Draw shooters pair up one-on-one in classic gunfighter competition and shoot wax bullets from .45 cal. single-action revolvers at steel targets wired to timing systems.

Cowboy Action involves shooting revolvers, lever-action rifles, and shotguns of the 1865 to 1899 era at steel targets. Cowboy era costuming is required for Cowboy Action & Fast Draw. We will visit the Blue Hill Rifle & Pistol Club on three Saturdays in September to watch and learn about these exciting western-themed shooting sports. Class members will have an opportunity to try out the firearms and targets under close supervision. Each of these shooting sports has strict but simple safety rules that will be explained to class members. The Blue Hill Rifle & Pistol Club requires each participant to sign a Liability Waiver. Eye and ear protection is required. Class limit is 5 adults. Grandparents may bring grandchildren 9-years-old or older. Information packets will be available. You will provide your own transportation to the Blue Hill Rifle & Pistol Club.
