TIPS TO SUCCEED IN THIS PROJECT

- Read this letter, the brochure, and the rubric thoroughly before beginning. Highlight the expected products and the due date.
- Research the books for page numbers, reading levels, and additional details to help you decide. A great source is Common Sense Media and Amazon.
- Establish a reading schedule for the summer. If you order your book ASAP, you should be 1/4th through by mid-June, half complete by end of June, 3/4ths done by mid July, and finish reading by the end of July. That leaves you approximately 2 weeks to work on the poster.
- Schedule your work with consideration to your summer plans. Don't procrastinate!
- Download audio versions to listen to on long road trips. It's best to read along in a regular book to ensure visual exposure to new vocabulary.
- All books are available at Amazon, Barnes & Noble, your local library (they offer free online loans, too), or the Bounty Bookstore in Vacaville!

THE SUMMARY

A book summary is comprised of a large amount of information shared in a short space. It is written in a single, well-developed paragraph that delivers multiple elements about the novel while withholding the ending of the story. Your summary should include:

The genre and setting of the book. Readers want a sense of the style of the book, whether it is fiction, fantasy, historical, or fact. This can be a simple sentence that ties into the overall conflict or setting of the book.

A description of the main character(s).

Describe your character according to their key qualities or their role in the story. Is he an ultra-suave British superspy? Is she a trouble-maker? Is he deaf? Offer a relatable detail that intrigues readers throughout the story. State the goals of your protagonist and antagonist without giving away the end of the story.

The central conflict of the story. What does the protagonist want and how is the antagonist preventing this? Introduce the villain and their motives. Minor conflicts might be revealed in the book, but focus on the main conflict in this summary. Remember: don't reveal the outcome!

Here's a sample starting summary sentence to help you get started:

In a (SETTING), (YOUR PROTAGONIST) has a (CONFLICT) because of (ANTAGONIST OR SOURCE OF CONFLICT.)


THE POSTER

THE REVIEW

The book review is **not** a summary. It is an assessment to attract the interest of potential readers of the book. Your book attempting to flee their violent homelands in different.

potential readers of the book. Your book review will be shared in class for discussion.

Read the entire book before beginning your review. It is impossible to paint a full, all-inclusive picture of your book otherwise. Take notes as you read. Does something catch your eye? Makes you question? Strike you as important to the plot flow? Take digital notes, write in your book (if it's a personal copy) or use sticky notes placed in the book.

The format of your book


The format of your book review should follow this example: **Paragraph 1: Introduction.** Share your

insight and opinion of the book, as well as the author's intended message in the story. What is the theme, moral, or experience that impacts the main character?

Paragraph 2: Evaluation of the writing.

Explain the conflicts of the characters and how they respond. Offer more than your opinion. Elaborate on character development, what lessons they learned, or how they interact. Discuss the **writing style** of the author. Was it conversational? Easy to follow? In verse? Select and explain **one quote** that was meaningful to you.


Paragraph 3: Personal opinion of the book overall. Be honest. This is your review and what you learned from the book. Support your opinion with evidence. Explain if you could(n't) connect with characters, or why you couldn't stop reading until the end.


