
## **Possible Future Sites to Explore**

On our next trip to the Verde River, there will be the option to kayak on the river or enjoy a short hike. We will meet with a Verde Valley resident who is a member of a local environmental group.

This special trip will be availablae to people of limited ability--wheelchairs, walkers, etc. They will be paired with the able-bodied and will experience the treasures of Arizona's small canyons.

This trip will feature Tumacacori and San Kavier in Pima County. These are two Catholic missions established by Father Eusebio Kino in the late 1600s and early 1700s. San Xavier has recently been restored. Quitobaquito Springs lies along our border with Mexico. Native Americans have lived in the area for more than 16,000 years and have used this as a water source for an untold humber of years.
