My husband is a Lakers sports fan, so I watch basketball with him and have learned how important the pivot foot (which must not move as the player looks to make a play), is in basketball to prevent a turnover called traveling. Thus, when the term “pivot” was defined using

the basketball analogy at our Conference of Presidents this past February, the conference theme “Pivot Don’t Panic,” took on more meaning and I understood how important that anchor was in the process of pivoting. In addition to the basketball analogy, our Bible study leader, Pastor Wyvetta Bullock, used the Exodus 1:15-21 scripture story of Shiphrah and Puah, the Hebrew midwives who saved the Hebrew babies who were ordered killed by Pharaoh’s decree, to illustrate a biblical example of pivoting. The midwives pivoted away from death to life, grounded in their Hebrew faith, through their clever explanation to the king that Hebrew women were stronger than Egyptian women and had the babies before the midwives arrived to help. Pastor Bullock emphasized our pivot foot is grounded in faith and then we strive to fulfill our highest calling by seeking opportunities to love and serve the neighbor. That is who we are as a women’s organization.

Since we had a virtual Presidents’ event this year, we were asked to invite five board members to join in

the Conference of Presidents event (another financial blessing of virtual over in person gatherings which involve travel expenses). Three of our board members were able to take part in the whole weekend: Dianne Tillman, Pastor Tracy Williams and Janet Simmons with Rosemary Lawson joining us for one day.

One of the discussions we had was entitled “What is leadership?” Margaret Wheatley’s definition: leadership is anyone who sees a need for change and is compelled and willing to step forward to help it happen. Another way of defining leadership using our collective ideas: leaders motivate, encourage and empower others to use gifts with empathy and sensitivity to work together setting the agenda and bringing creativity and openness to accomplish a common goal.

The bedrock of the Women of the ELCA organization which was founded in 1987, is the congregational units where our task of serving and loving our neighbor is powered by a **pivot toolbox** that includes:

Purpose: To grow in faith, affirm our gifts, support one another in our callings, engage in ministry and action, promote healing and wholeness in the Church, Society and the world. This shared purpose is to activate each of us so people know the way of Jesus and discover community, justice and love through a gospel of grace.

Prayer: Our individual and group prayers allows God to make us more like Jesus. WELCA encourages us to pray every Tuesday at noon.

Praise: Offer praises continually, specially during weekly worship, daily thank offerings and Bible studies.

Plan: Consider your options, stay focused and balanced as efficient planners.

As Women of the ELCA we indeed are equipped with a great toolbox!

Linda Post Bushkofsky, our executive director, gave us the churchwide perspective of the organization and their role in it. Our churchwide organization manages the day to day workings of 4,000 local units and 64 SWOs (Synodical Women's Organizations) giving us resources and events to inspire and educate. Additionally during the pandemic, they have **pivoted** to: remote staff management; managed mailings to keep communication ongoing; updated technology; renegotiated many contracts twice; maintained the publications *Gather* and *Bold Cafe*; found new and interesting ways to come together; analyzed finances and reduced staff to correspond with the projected revenue decrease of \$500,000. Even as they are exhausted and stressed, this stalwart team carries on doing their best with the resources they are given, forgiving each other's missteps and leading with grace. Linda also lifted up Article III of our constitution which lists the principles that we are governed by. See those principles at the end of this article as a reminder to us all.

The current focus in serving and loving the neighbor is promoting racial justice and fair immigration reform along with stopping human trafficking and domestic violence. In the past we have worked on banning landmines, getting rid of Styrofoam, promoting fair trade coffee and making and donating prayer shawls.

I came away from the weekend with the following ideas for change knowing that together we can accomplish much:

- Emphasize the goals and work of our organization. Use purpose statement for each meeting.
- Hold a SWO thankoffering worship service, possibly virtually.
- Improve regular communication with units by board members sharing the stories, programs and activities of both clusters and units.
- Connect with Cal Lutheran University by inviting students to participate in presentations, workshops and social ministry projects.

- Be intentional about creating diversity through invitation and using and celebrating gifts, talents and creative ideas of all.
- Promoting cluster events especially for those geographically challenged by our widespread synod.
- Give support to unit leaders by promoting connections with each other.

CHURCHWIDE WOMEN OF THE ELCA TRIENNIAL GATHERING

The Just Love Churchwide Gathering, currently scheduled for August 5-8, 2021 has been postponed. In its place will be the Twelfth Triennial Convention and Gathering in Phoenix, AZ during the week of September 18, 2023.

The Eleventh Triennial Convention consisting of delegates and visitors is being held this August 3-5, 2021 virtually (or digitally) if the 2017 voting members change the constitution to allow for virtual meetings.

The Women of the ELCA's executive board has recommended the 2022 budget of \$1,636,250 to be approved (compared to 2020 anticipated budget of \$2,366,000). As you know the 2020 budget fell short causing the reduction of staff from nine women to two full-time and one part-time. The executive board asked President Lisa Plorin to appoint an ad hoc task force to investigate measures the organization can take to continue operation. "We have to change tactics," Plorin said. "We can't continue to operate in the way we have been."

Even with the reduction in staff and budget shortfall, Executive Director Linda Post Bushkofsky remains hopeful. She considers the Women in our organization flexible, adaptable, and creative.

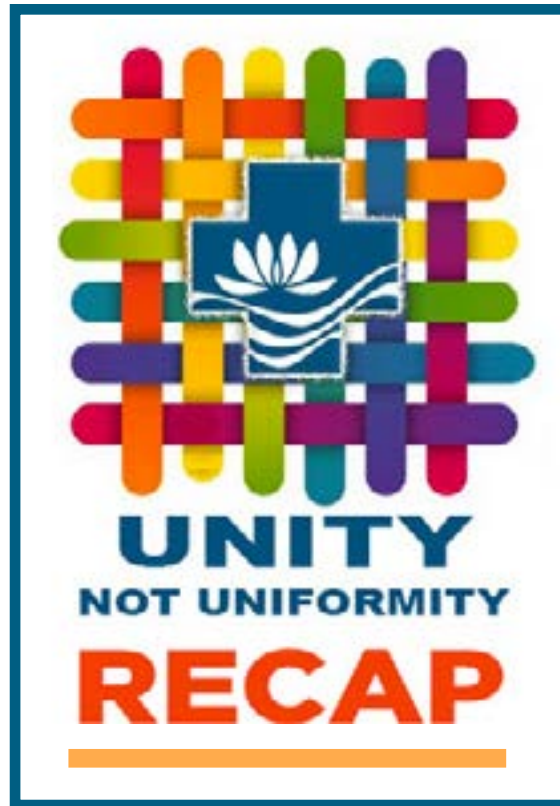
2021 WINTER GATHERING
