


COVID guidelines—updated March 2, 2022.

Wi-Fi access: Look for our networks beginning with **CBCI-77B0** and enter password **build7443guitar**; we encourage you to share pictures and posts on social media.

Worship/Liturgy Sources: Our worship is based on the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP--the red hardcover book in the pew rack), the *Book of Occasional Services*, the *Enriching Our Worship series*—the primary liturgical resources authorized by General Convention of The Episcopal Church—supplemented by occasional other resources. You may find additional prayers in the BCP on pages 832-834 helpful for personal devotion before, during, and after worship (especially prayers 64-69 and 57-61). If you'd like a BCP for your own use at home, the church can provide one for you—please talk to Amma Diane.

Children: Children of all ages are welcome in worship! Activity bags are available in the back of the church. A changing station is available in the restroom in the atrium just outside the sanctuary.

Hearing Loop: Our Hearing Loop system enables people with hearing loss to better hear sounds through our sound system. If you can set your hearing aid to a T or M/T setting, audio from our sound system will be received directly by your device (70% of aids have this feature). If your aid does not have this option, or you do not wear a hearing aid, there are a few portable headsets available in the back of the church.

Please share your prayer requests with us: All are invited to share their prayer requests so that the entire congregation may join in lifting up your needs and thanksgivings. Please add requests to the Prayers of the People clipboard (you can simply use first names on requests... God knows our needs). If you'd like a prayer lifted up for multiple weeks, please fill out a prayer request slip found at the back of the church.

We worship with our bodies: You'll notice that some of us may sit, stand, and kneel at various points in the service. Some of us may make the sign of the cross or bow now and then. Some may clap, raise their hands, or tap their feet. All of these movements are traditions from various parts of our Christian heritage—none are required, none are frowned upon. All are welcome to express whatever movements they might find meaningful in worship. Some instructions are printed throughout this bulletin—you may also observe what others do. None of these movements are a requirement: if you prefer not to use them, don't worry about it—God doesn't.

Restrooms/Layout/Accessibility: A handicapped-accessible restroom is located in the atrium just outside the sanctuary (next to the elevator.) Another restroom is located on the lower level. The atrium gives access to the lower level and upper level by stairs or elevator. The worship space and chapel are located on the upper level. The offices, fellowship hall, library, and classrooms are located on the lower level and marked by signs.

A Lenten Litany for the Kingdom of God

Reader 1 This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that we have no voice. We

refuse to believe that we are powerless; that we cannot make a difference in our neighborhoods, country, and world. We give up the idea that our vision of a better tomorrow must wait until we're older,

richer, smarter, or more holy.

People We will hear each other's voices and see each other's visions. We

acknowledge that with God all things are possible. We will support

each other in our efforts here and everywhere.

Reader 2 This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that war will always be a part of our world. We will not listen to those who lie to us when they say we must go to war to be safe. We refuse to believe that we must kill in order to bring democracy and freedom to others. We give up the idea that violence ever solves anything.

People We will be honest with each other. We will not glorify weapons or violence, or righteous indignation. We will teach ways of peace and model ways of loving our enemies. We will seek out and support leaders who, like Christ, are willing to be mediators and peacemakers.

This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that we are not responsible for our environment; that it has always been and will always be. We will stop taking our earth for granted and begin to hear her voice. We give up the idea that worship only happens indoors and behind stained glass. We will remember that our daily bread comes from God through a living, healthy planet and that we must care for her as she cares for us.

People We will delight in the moon and stars, look for God in the waters, and hear the Spirit's voice in the winds. We will walk gently as we tend the earth together. We will try to reduce our impact on this planet and try to consume less. We will see all life as sacred and join together in preserving the earth.

Reader 2 This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that we do not have a responsibility to act as healers through prayer, touch, and action. We give up the fear of disease, especially the fear that causes us to look away. We let go of the idea that illnesses like AIDS, malaria, or dysentery don't matter because they happen in other places. We refuse to believe that affordable healthcare must be only for some.

We will take on the role of healers, however we are best suited to do so. We'll help fund research to find cures and will support health education around the world. We will respond swiftly to natural disasters that threaten to bring new diseases to already battered people. When sickness occurs in our midst, be it physical, mental, or spiritual, we will not fear it. Through it all we will pray, touch, and be present together.

This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that poverty is something normal for some people in some places. We will not tolerate poverty in our world, or the thought that the poor don't matter. We will turn from seeing poverty as someone else's problem. We give up the idea that people who don't have enough stuff or the right stuff are any less worthy of hope.

People We will work together to help end poverty. We will put our own relative wealth to work, bringing hope and change to those who need it most. We will model providing food, clothing, shelter, companionship, and care to those in need, be they in our neighborhood or our world. We will stop pretending that the poor are not among us and we will help each other find ways to respond compassionately to needs.

This Lent and beyond, we give up the idea that hatred is ever okay. We refuse to believe people can be treated differently because they are a different color, speak a different language, live on the other side of a border, or have crossed a border. We will not allow unequal treatment of women, of gay and lesbian people, of transgendered people, of people with different abilities or intellect. We will not divide by education or employment, by social or economic status, by religion or politics. We dream of a world where all people, in all places, of all faiths can live and work together. We give up the idea that hatred, bigotry, intolerance, bullying, or lack of charity or kindness should ever be associated with God.

We will fight against injustice together for each other and for those who will come after us in this church and this world. We will not harbor hate in our own lives, and we will speak out when we hear intolerance of any kind, knowing that to remain silent is not an act of love. We will help build the Kingdom of God that Jesus was willing to die for.

So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father,

I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe--the best one--and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate. Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."
