Dinner/Storytelling with L.U.V. 11/1

St James has a long history of learning about and loving the “other”. Embracing diversity has been an important part of our congregational identity, and we’ve strengthened that through discussion groups, bible studies, video studies, sermons, and our Becoming Beloved Community series the past 3 summers. Lakeshore’s United Visionaries (L.U.V.) is an organization dedicated to uplifting the lives of marginalized individuals. They started to form in May 2020, and their goal is to recognize intersectional identities through allyship, awareness, education, understanding, and love.

On **Tuesday, November 1 at 6PM** we’ll gather in the fellowship hall with representatives from L.U.V. We’ll start with a meal at 6PM, then continue at 7PM with storytelling and discussion for 60-90 minutes. St James is a safe space for people to share their stories and have their stories honored. The goal is to learn about diversity in our community and to form more connections within our community. If there is interest, this could lead to more gatherings or other next steps. There is a sign-up sheet in the church, for those who want to attend, as well as those who’d like to help set up, cook, and/or clean up.

NEW! Barb Cook directs chime choir at Rahr-West 11/5

The Felician Village Hand Chime Choir, under the direction of Barb Cook, will be sharing a program of seasonal songs on Saturday, November 5 starting at 11:30AM. The event takes place at the Rahr West Art Museum (610 N 8th St), and the annual table setting exhibit will also be on display. Admission is free but donations are welcome to the museum. Barb is a member of St James who regularly shares her musical gifts on the piano.

NEW! Monthly congregational chat 11/6

The Vestry invites all to stay after worship on Sunday 11/6 for the third of our monthly congregational chats. All are welcome to participate. Each month the Vestry will have one or more topics to solicit ideas and feedback from you. Topics on 11/6 will include: 1) brainstorming ideas for 2023 (*what are projects, programs, events, ministries, building work, etc you would like us to explore for 2023*); 2) Clean Energy Project info and sharing other ideas for creation care; 3) recruiting for acolytes/servers ministry and altar guild.

All Saints Sunday 11/6

In early November we take time to remember and celebrate our family and friends, our sisters and brothers in Christ, and the saints in the broader church who have preceded us. Worship will include time to remember others, as well as candle lighting and other traditions to help us remember our unity through time and place as the Body of Christ. **Join us at 10AM on Sunday 11/6 as we celebrate All Saints Sunday.** It is one of the major Feast Days of the Church, and one of four days especially appropriate for Baptisms, and we'll take time to remember our own Baptisms.

Meals On Wheels

America's seniors are lonely. And, as a nation, we've allowed them to fall into the shadows. Families are living farther away, and neighbors are more strangers than ever before. We all have the power to help change that.

Meals On Wheels has been guided by a single goal since the first known U.S. delivery by a small group of Philadelphia citizens in 1954 – to support our senior neighbors to extend their independence and health as they age. What started as a compassionate idea has grown into one of the largest and most effective social movements in America, currently helping nearly 2.4 million seniors annually in virtually every community in the country.

Nearly 7.4 million seniors have incomes below the poverty line. Half of seniors living alone lack the financial resources to pay for basic needs. That's an income of \$240 a week or less, which, after housing, utility, and medical expenses, leaves very little for food.

St James Episcopal Church has been involved with Meals On Wheels for a long time and we are joined by others in the community. About every 5 weeks we go to the Senior Center at about 10:30 and pick up both hot and cold foods, already prepacked, plus milk. We go to Park View Haven next to Piggly Wiggly, Valley View Apartments, Manitou Manor Apartments, and River Hill Apartments, all north of Reed Ave.

We deliver the nutritious meals, friendly visits and safety checks that enable Manitowoc's seniors to live nourished lives with independence and dignity. If you are interested in helping with Meals On Wheels, or trying it out, please talk to Eleanor Agnew or Amma Dianne

Manitowoc Warming Shelter



We're a group of local congregations, organizations, agencies, and other caring people joining together to provide overnight shelter and meals to adults during our cold winter months. We need your help!

The Manitowoc Warming Shelter is projected to open in mid-November 2022 for the season. We plan to initially be based at First Presbyterian Church (502 N 8th St in downtown Manitowoc.)

WHAT WILL VOLUNTEERS DO?

Training provided for all volunteers. Options to help include:

- ◆ Evening set-up: 7:00pm to 8:00pm
- ◆ Check-in guests: 7:30pm to 9:00pm
- ◆ Three shifts options for overnight shelter attendants: 8:00pm to Midnight, Midnight to 4am, and 4am to 8am
- ◆ Morning clean-up: 7:30am-8:30am
- ◆ Daily food service coordinated by Grow It Forward

WHY DO WE NEED A WARMING SHELTER?

- * Lakeshore CAP provided \$44,852 in hotel vouchers in Manitowoc County since June, 2021. *This funding has ended — but the people in need still exist*
- * The three program-based shelters spent another \$4,750 in after hour housing since June 2021.
- * Individuals are typically homeless for 34 days before their situation is resolved.
- * Lakeshore CAP spent \$587,290 in WERA (WI Emergency Assistance Program) assistance in Manitowoc County for 2021. *This funding has ended — but the people in need still exist.*

Our community is blessed with Hope House, The Haven, and InCourage, which provide temporary housing and support to people year-round through their wonderful programs. Manitowoc Warming Shelter is designed to provide life-saving overnight shelter for those who fall between the cracks.
