

Why?

- One test will not give us a clear picture of a student's needs.
- We use multiple data points to make instructional decisions.
- We also use progress monitoring in between benchmarks to ensure that students are making progress towards their next goal.
- These assessments allow us to gather information that will impact teacher instruction and levels of intervention.

What are DIBELS?

Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills



What is mClass: DIBELS Next?

- It is a universal screener that is given to all students in grades K-3.
- It allows us to track student progress throughout their elementary years.
- It allows us to gather information that will impact teacher instruction and levels of intervention.



How Often is DIBELS Administered?

- Three times a year:
 - September
 - January
 - April-May



 Progress monitoring assessments allow interim check-ins. Students will also be assessed more frequently (every 2-4 weeks) to ensure progress is being made.

- Letter Naming Fluency (LNF)
- First Sound Fluency (FSF)
- Phoneme Segmentation Fluency (PSF)
- Nonsense Word Fluency (NWF)
- DIBELS Oral Reading Fluency (DORF)
- DIBELS DAZE



^{*}While LNF measures an important skill in a student's development, it does not correlate with any of the five Basic Early Literacy Skills.

Benchmark Goals

Status	What It Means	Likelihood of Achieving Subsequent Literacy Goals
Blue Above Benchmark	Student is likely to make adequate progress with effective core instruction.	90%-99%
Green At or Above Benchmark	Student is likely to make adequate progress with effective core instruction.	70%-85%
Yellow Below Benchmark	Student is likely to need <u>strategic</u> support to make adequate progress.	40%-60%
Red Well Below Benchmark	Student is likely to need intensive support to make adequate progress.	10%-20%


What is TRC? (Text Reading and Comprehension)

- Text Reading and Comprehension (TRC) is an individually administered assessment using leveled texts to determine a student's instructional reading level.
- Includes both Literary and Informational Texts
- Students read a benchmark book and complete comprehension tasks (retell, oral comprehension and/or written)

Who Takes the TRC?

- Students in grades K-2 take the TRC.
- It measures reading accuracy, oral comprehension, and written comprehension.



What is the RI?

- The Reading Inventory (RI) is an untimed, computer-adaptive assessment that determines a child's reading level as a Lexile measure.
- It is designed to evaluate students' reading ability, monitor their reading progress, and match students to books at their reading level.


What is the RI?

- Students in grades 3-5 take the RI.
- The Reading Inventory is a reading comprehension assessment. It includes passages from authentic texts, both informational and literary, like students will encounter both in and out of school.
- Vocabulary is tested in context and does not require knowledge of ideas outside the passage.
- Children will read a short passage and then answer a multiple-choice fill-in-the blank question.

Sample RI Parent Letter

Let's look at Student B's RI report.

RI Book List

- Students should be reading "just right" books which are 100 Lexiles below to 50 Lexiles above their Lexile score.
- For example, if student's Lexile score is 744, their target Lexile range is 644-794.
- He/she can read books that have a range of 794-994 with support, especially if he/she is motivated and/or has background knowledge on the content.
- Let's look at Student D's book list.


Helping Your Child at Home



Read! Read! Read!

- Read aloud to your child (model reading fluently) in ANY language
- Read literary and informational books (fiction and non-fiction)
- Book talks and retells: Ask your child to orally retell the book
- "Read" wordless picture books with your child





Choosing a "Just-Right" Book

- First, choose a book you would like to read. Find a page near the middle of the book with lots of text (words).
- Read the page aloud while doing the test so you can hear the places where you have difficulty.
 Each time you come to a word you don't know, hold one finger up.
- If you have all five fingers up before you get to the end of the page, wave the book "goodbye." It is probably too difficult for you right now. Try it again later in the year.
- If you do not have any fingers up when you finish the page, then the book may be an easy read for you.
- If you have less than five fingers but more than one or two fingers up when you finish reading the page, the book may be just what you need to grow as a reader. Use this Goldilocks' method as you read to see if the book is a "just right" book. Enjoy!
