PARTNERSHIP WITH THE AFRICAN AMERICAN CULTURAL HERITAGE ACTION FUND R. Keith McDonald & Valerie McDonald

Thank you to everyone who participated in the video and meeting with the African American Action Fund (the "Action Fund") on Sunday and Monday, April 23rd and 24th.

The Action Fund alongside Creative Theory Agency was in LA shooting the second iteration of the Preserving Black Churches video series with focus on Second Baptist Church. The filming took place over two and a half days and required the participation of leadership and members of Second Baptist Church.

The Action Fund has named Second Baptist as part of its Preserving Black Churches program. This program works to advance long-term and sustainable strategies that strengthen stewardship and asset management, interpretation and programming, and fundraising activities for historic Black churches across the country. They are allocating \$1.5 million to Second through this program.

The program is designed to support Second Baptist Church in the following ways: (1) co-develop preservation campaigns, model innovative stewardship models, and build capacity in partnership with five Black Churches serving as sites of social justice and civil rights in Alabama and nationally; and (2) amplify and promote historic Black churches through digital documentation, storytelling, and media relations.

The Preserving Black Churches video series tells the story of the program and its impact through place-based storytelling through the lens of partners and Action Fund leadership. The first video, which was played at our last church meeting, talked about 16th Street Baptist Church and Brown Baptist Church.

The second Preserving Black Churches video will focus on the work to preserve Second Baptist Church, highlighting its architectural and societal significance, along with the stories of the people who are currently here stewarding the church into the future. Additional commentary will come from the Action Fund's Executive Director Brent Leggs and Senior Director Tiffany Tolbert.

MEET OUR ACTION FUND TEAM



Brent Leggs is the founding executive director of the African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund, the largest preservation campaign in U.S. history on behalf of historic African American places, and a Senior Vice President of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Through the Fund, he leads a national community of leaders, preservationists, and activists to preserve the memory and legacy of Black American identity. Since the Fund launched in 2017, Mr. Leggs and his team have secured nearly \$100 million, supported 200 preservation projects nationwide, and established a \$14 million endowment to sustain the Fund's future. Described as the man who "spends time thinking in centuries" by the New Yorker, Mr. Leggs work is rooted in

telling the nation's full history - mitigating the erasure of African American cultural heritage and reconstructing national identity. In June 2022, as part of the "Future Rising" series sponsored by Hearst Magazines and Lexus, Ms. Oprah Winfrey named Mr. Leggs one of the 50 Black trailblazers changing our world. Mr. Leggs is also an Associate Professor of the Graduate Program of Historic Preservation and Senior Advisor, Center for the Preservation of Civil Rights at the University of Pennsylvania's Weitzman School of Design.



Tiffany Tolbert is Senior Director for Preservation of the African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund (AACHAF) at the National Trust for Historic Preservation. In her position, she leads the high-profile national preservation programs and projects, such as the HBCU Cultural Heritage Stewardship Initiative and Preserving Black Churches and develops preservation strategies for historic sites associated with African American Cultural Heritage such as the Nina Simone Childhood Home, the John and Alice Coltrane Home and sites associated with Emmett Till and Mamie Till Mobley. Tolbert previously

served as Director of the Northwest Field Office at Indiana Landmarks from 2006-2017. Tolbert is a native of Montgomery, Alabama and holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Huntingdon College (Montgomery, AL) in Political Science and History and Master of Historic Preservation from Georgia State University (Atlanta, G Public Relations & Corporate Communications Public Relations & Corporate Communications A). She has previously worked for the Alabama Historical Commission Black Heritage Council and the Georgia Historic Preservation Division as African American Programs Assistant. She has also completed consulting work throughout the Southeast where she completed National Register of Historic Places nominations, state historic marker preparation and conducted research on the role of women in the Civil Rights Movement. Her preservation expertise includes providing technical assistance to local organizations, advocacy, strategic and preservation planning, historic designation and rehabilitation. Her research on Rosenwald Schools, African American communities and the African American experience in Indiana has been included in multiple publications such as Reflections, a publication of the Georgia Historic

Preservation Division and Traces, a publication of the Indiana Historical Society. Tolbert currently serves on the board of Indiana Humanities and as chairperson of the Hobart (IN) Historic Preservation Commission.
