Community Informed:
Community members participate by advising on research questions, informing data collection approaches, and providing feedback on dissemination. Their advisory capacity ensures the research is well-informed and relevant.

Researchers ask, “What research questions are most important to your community?”

Community Involved:
Community members engage in various ways, such as subcontracting with organizations, serving as advisory partners for data collection, analysis, and interpretation, or co-authoring and co-presenting findings.

Researchers ask, “What specific roles are you interested in taking on?”

Shared Leadership:
Community members and researchers collaborate equally in developing the research, conducting analysis, and disseminating findings.

Researchers ask, “How can we balance our roles and responsibilities effectively and respectfully?”

Community Led:
Community members lead all aspects of a project, from developing research questions to determining how information is analyzed.

Researchers ask, “How can we support you?”
