During this difficult time, Dr. Lockhart was also elected to the Board of Directors for the Wetzel County Chamber of Commerce, where she is helping with local business recovery efforts.

She has delivered numerous babies, including one in a gas station parking lot all alone. Countless lives have been saved and touched because of her. Her skills are only matched by her bedside manner...ask anyone that knows her or has had an emergency. When they see Cindi on the scene, they instantly know that somehow things will be okay. She will give everything she has, on EVERY call, to make sure everything possible has been done to save everyone and everything. On the evening of August 31, 2020 my family's world was turned upside down. Our six-year-old son Jasper was in an ATV accident on our family farm. All while talking to me, explaining what was happening, and trying to keep me calm.

After coming home, he had a few months' recovery, with a setback two months after the accident that required a second surgery. Thanks to Michael's quick actions, Jasper has made a full recovery. He is happy, healthy, and sweet seven-year-old. Michael kept in contact everyday with my sister for updates. The day he came home, Michael arranged for a homecoming he would never forget. Jasper was met at our home with lights and sirens from the fire trucks and firefighters in full gear. He got a tour of the truck and equipment, and his own real firefighter's helmet. He was asked to be an honorary member of the New Martinsville Fire Department.

Michael Smith is a fourth generation volunteer firefighter. He started at the age of fifteen with the Junior Firefighters at Grandview. He started with the New Martinsville Fire Department at the age of eighteen and is now the Captain and Training Officer. He has an extensive collection of certifications, including Rescue Operations Specialist, Hazmat Specialist, and Certified Rescue Diver. He also owns and operates ITB (Instructing the Bravest). His company trains departments and their firefighters. He has devoted so much of his life to firefighting, outside of his work and family. Michael resides in New Martinsville with his wife Michelle and their nine-month old son Hudson. Michelle is halfway through her training to become an EMT. Soon she will be going on calls and assisting people in need with her husband. I am certain Hudson will follow in his father's footsteps one day and be a fifth generation firefighter.

I believe volunteer firefighters do not get the appreciation or recognition they deserve. They put their life in potential danger every time they go on a call. Michael deserves the recognition.
