



MAKE A HURRICANE PLAN:

- Discuss the type of hazards that could affect your family. Know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding and wind.
- Locate a safe room or the safest areas in your home or community for hurricane hazards.
- Determine meeting places and escape routes from your home, work, and schools.
- Keep an out-of-state friend as a family contact, so all your family members have a single point of contact.
- Create a plan for what to do with your pets if you need to evacuate.
- Post emergency telephone numbers by your phones and make sure your children know how and when to call 911.
- Check your insurance coverage - flood damage is not usually covered by homeowners insurance.
- Stock non-perishable emergency supplies and a Disaster Supply Kit.
- Use a NOAA weather radio. Remember to replace its battery every 6 months.
- Take First Aid, CPR and disaster preparedness classes.

DISASTER SUPPLY KIT:

 FOOD: at least enough for 3 to 7 days (non-perishable packaged or canned food / juices, foods for infants or the elderly, snack foods, non-electric can opener, cooking tools / fuel, paper plates / plastic utensils)	 WATER: at least 1 gallon daily per person for 3 to 7 days	 CLOTHING: seasonal / rain gear / sturdy shoes	 BEDDING: Blankets, pillows, etc.	 FIRST AID: Kit, Medicines, Drugs, etc.	 RADIO: Battery operated NOAA weather radio
 IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS: in a waterproof container or watertight plastic bag	 FLASHLIGHT / BATTERIES	 TOILETRIES: Hygiene items, Moisture wipes, etc.	 TELEPHONES: Fully charged cell phone with extra battery and a corded telephone set	 CASH: (with some small bills) and CREDIT CARDS	
 SPARE KEYS	 TOYS, BOOKS AND GAMES	 SPECIAL ITEMS: for babies and the elderly	 TOOLS: keep a set with you during the storm	 VEHICLE FUEL TANKS FILLED	 PET CARE ITEMS

"There is a 45% chance of near-normal tropical cyclone activity during the Central Pacific hurricane season this year, according to NOAA's Central Pacific Hurricane Center and NOAA's Climate Prediction Center, divisions of the National Weather Service. The outlook also indicates a 35% chance for below-normal activity, and 20% chance of an above-normal season. For the season as a whole, 2 to 5 tropical cyclones are predicted for the Central Pacific hurricane region. This number includes tropical depressions, named storms and hurricanes. A near-normal season has 4 or 5 tropical cyclones. "
