A Message from the Director of Information Technology - Rev. Jim Joyner

It has been a joy to begin work with you as the Director of Information Technology here in the new Shenandoah River District. This month we have merged the old Harrisonburg and Winchester Facebook pages into a new Shenandoah River District of Virginia UMC page. If you were following one of the old pages, you should automatically be following the new one. If you're already a follower, we invite you to join us on the new page for news and updates and ideas from your district! We will also be launching our new website shenandoahriverdistrict.org in the coming month. Look for an announcement to come when it is up and running!

In addition to supporting the district office, I am here to assist you in our local churches in finding the technological resources that you need and to help you learn how to use them confidently so that you can take the next step in growing your ministry in an increasingly digital world. Whether you worship in a place with limited internet connectivity and are not sure where to begin or just want to improve upon the online programs you already have in place, I hope to help you discover opportunities to expand your ministry that make sense for your community given your church's resources.

I am aware that the idea of digital ministry may elicit groans from many of us. The pandemic forced us to consider making rapid changes to become a more online form of community, at least for a time. At times, we grew weary of watching (and making) worship videos. We became fatigued by sitting at the computer for yet another Zoom meeting. We yearned to be back in person – and with good reason.

Despite the misgivings we may have about digital ministry replacing our in-person gatherings, we need to be careful not to throw the baby out with the bathwater. There are many ways in which our churches have flourished and in which we have had spiritual experiences we could not otherwise have through digital ministry. The reach of many churches has increased through livestreamed or recorded worship services. People who are homebound or miss worship because of illness or being out of town can tune in and not miss hearing what is going on with their church when they cannot be physically present. This spring, one of our churches hosted a prayer vigil for peace in Ukraine. They showed a video from a Ukrainian friend who had sought refuge in Poland. After the service, they received word that this friend along with other refugees had joined in on the livestream and had prayed alongside them. Imagine that – people joining their hearts and voices in prayer a world apart but as one! There are many opportunities for us not to replace our in-person ministry but to build upon and broaden its reach in the digital world. So here is an opportunity for all of our churches to use digital ministry to connect more with members who are homebound. You don't even need internet access to make this work – just one person with a tablet or smartphone. At the end of a worship service this month, have that person record a video of the congregation greeting one of your homebound members by name and then the pastor or lay leader leading a prayer of blessing for that member. That week, the person who recorded it can visit the member and show them the video from their tablet or smartphone. It's that simple to remind one of your people that they are remembered and loved by everyone. If they have a device of their own, you could send them the video for them to keep and watch when they want. For extra credit, the visitor could even record a message from the member to share with the congregation the next week in worship. I would love to hear how your church uses this idea for digital ministry to build connections with your members.

It is my prayer that God will grant us a spirit of boldness to explore opportunities for growing our ministry in an increasingly digital world. To adapt the words of Paul in his letter to the Philippians: "What does it matter? Just this, that Christ is proclaimed in every way, whether in person or online, and in that I rejoice!" Together may we proclaim Christ in every way!

The Lady of the Woods

She was beautiful, a small Methodist church tucked back in the woods in *Somewhere, Virginia*. Barely visible from the highway, she stood proud and graceful against mountains to the west. At one time she had been full of life and the plans of neighbors and friends; a place of vibrant worship and fried chicken potluck dinners, and children daring to be children.



Sometime in the recent past *Somewhere* changed. Jobs became harder to find, the call of the city lured the young to promises of a more fruitful world, those that remained lost interest in the message of salvation, and this Lady of the Woods became a resting place for the old and tired. The remaining congregation had more need of a chaplain than a pastor. As the congregation aged, she withered along with them until finally they closed her doors and forgot about her. For years she sat idle with only a few memories to comfort her. Just what did the Lord and Master have planned for her? She was lost in time and place, overgrown and forgotten.

Only the county tax assessor and neighbors who were somehow still comforted by her presence, knew she still shined. Today she is waiting for her time to come once again. And we are waiting with her.

We, Methodist, are in a poorly way right now. Our message forgotten and overgrown in time by the ever-increasing absurdities of the world. Although we know the answer, we are not sure how to frame it for our world and our times. In *Somewhere* we are rich in the traditions of wonderful churches but critically poor in disciples. There is a plethora of "learned" authors and their books on feigning recovery in urban ministry, but practical lessons for our rural communities are in short supply. Attempts to address the needs of our rural ministries with adaptation of proven urban success model seldom end in progress, but rather frustrate and discourage the membership.

So, this grace-filled old Lady of the Woods sits abandoned, patient, and waiting, waiting for the Lord of Second Chances and the Spirit of Renewal to call out to her wayward community to reclaim this wilderness as God's own Paradise. We, as children of God, with sweat equity and constant prayer can bring home her children and gather a fellowship of community once again. Resources of our existing rural church base, the passion of the missional outreach Christ, and commitment of clergy and laity can make it happen. It begins with a unified, focused prayer for these incredible sacred places of worship in the woods and the people that make them special.

My sisters and brothers in Christ, this is a God mission that stands before us calling all disciples of the Shenandoah River District to spread our wings and take flight to find those precious Gems of the Spirit among us in *Somewhere, Virginia*. Pray always and constantly that the Lady of the Woods will rise to answer her call for Jesus the Christ to show us all the way to reclaim our faith in the wilderness.

Before the Harrisonburg and Winchester Districts became the Shenandoah River District, the (former) Harrisonburg District had already made plans for the **Fall 2022 Lay Servant Training. The scheduled date for this event is September 24, 2022. The classes will be held in person** at Grottoes UMC, located at 300 4th Street, Grottoes, VA 24441. The following courses are scheduled:

Basic Course (Linda Conrad, Lay Person, Otterbein UMC)

These classes are scheduled to be taught in-person at Grottoes UMC. The Leading Prayer Class will also be taught via Zoom.

A Special Annual Conference will be held virtually on Saturday, Oct. 29, 2022, at 9:00 a.m. The sole purpose of this Special Annual Conference Session is to close the remaining four churches utilizing *Discipline* paragraph 2549.3 (Disposition of property of a closed local church) and approve the severing of their relationship with the United Methodist denomination.

At 9:30 a.m., another Special Annual Conference will be convened for the sole purpose of ratifying the disaffiliation of local churches seeking to disaffiliate from The United Methodist Church over matters of human sexuality. Paragraph 2553 of the Book of Discipline governs this process. All approvals and agreements under this process must be completed by September 30, 2022.

This will ensure that EVC records are current and correct for the October 29 Annual Conference.

Active Clergy with Moving Expense Reimbursement:

Due to a tax law change in 2017, moving expenses that are either paid or reimbursed by an employer are treated as taxable income to the employee. In our denominational pension plan, the Clergy Retirement Security Program, all taxable income is treated as "pensionable income." Virginia United Methodist Pensions, Inc. will report all clergy moving expenses that are paid or reimbursed by a Virginia Conference church in 2022. In order to capture this detail, the Virginia Conference's EVC system has been modified to include a moving expense reporting portal.

If you were reimbursed for moving expenses in 2022, or if your church paid your moving expenses directly, please report those expenses in the EVC system no later than September 30, 2022.

Also, please note that moving expenses paid or reimbursed by a church should be included on your W-2 tax statement for the appropriate tax year.

District Superintendents:

Each year I am asked to provide you information that may be beneficial to local churches as they set their pastor's salary for the following year. Some information to consider follows:

Denominational Average Compensation – The DAC, determined by the Wespath, is an average of the compensation (as defined by the retirement benefit plans) of full-time U.S. clergy who participate in the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) and/or the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP). Plan compensation includes housing allowances and exclusions; certain tax deferrals, such as UMPIP before-tax contributions and Code section 125 medical spending account deferrals; and for clergy living in a parsonage, an amount equal to 25% of compensation. In 2023, the DAC will increase 0.9% to \$76,221.

Conference Average Salary – The CAC is also determined by the Wespath using information only from our Virginia Conference. In 2023, the CAC will increase 0.5% to \$66,344.

District Superintendents' Salaries – By action of the Annual Conference Session in June 2022, District Superintendent's 2023 annual salaries will be \$95,000.

Conference Minimum Compensation – The Minimum Compensation Guidelines proposed by the Equitable Compensation Commission was approved by the Annual Conference Session in June 2022.

- Full Members (Deacons and Elders) under appointment
- Certified Lay Professionals

The following persons are required to receive a minimum of 0.5 CEU per year and at least 2.0 CEU's per quadrennium.

- Part-time local pastors who have completed the Course of Study or an M.Div. degree



This We Believe: The Core of Wesleyan Faith and Practice
by William H Willimon, 2010.

Sometimes we just need to go back to the basics. That's what this month's good read is all about. Bishop Willimon has provided us with a study that does just that.

For our founder, John Wesley, the Bible is the joyfully consistent testimony of God's never-ending grace and ever-seeking love, and that, studying the Bible is more than merely knowing what Scripture says; it is also about living every day as a child of God.

Beginning with the Core Terms found in the NRSV version of The Wesley Study Bible, Bishop Willimon systematically lays out key Wesleyan tenets of faith so that you will have a fresh



way to hear God's voice, share in God's grace, and become more like Jesus Christ.

This We Believe is an 8-session study. The book and leader's guide can be found in the **U. M. Church** section of the District Library.

Just Neighbors provides high-quality immigration legal services to low-income immigrants, asylees and refugees in Virginia, Maryland, and Washington, DC. We also provide community presentations about immigration law and current events. Just Neighbors serves clients in and around the valley from Winchester to Waynesboro through a partnership with the United Methodist Church and the Shenandoah River District.



Volunteers are vital to the work we do. We have need of the following types of volunteers:

Clinico volunteers

Just Neighbors holds a legal clinic the second Wednesday evenings of every month at Asbury United Methodist Church in Harrisonburg. Volunteers provide hospitality and assist staff attorneys to screen clients and prepare their immigration applications. Training for new volunteers is held thirty minutes before the clinic starts, and no additional time is required after the clinic concludes. No specialized experience or languages skills are required (though Spanish-speaking volunteers are always needed).

Translator volunteers

Because many of our cases require a written translation of client statements, official paperwork, and letters, we often

need volunteers to translate documents from their home. When there is a need, we send out an email to our list of volunteers translations to see who is available.

EQUIPMENT FOR CARING

Hello to all as we continue with summer months which have been hot and unusually rainy. Our Equipment for Caring loaner closet remains busy with ongoing requests by those in need of medical equipment or supplies. We also appreciate your continuing support with your generous donations both monetary and through supplies and equipment. During July we gave disposable supplies to 37 individuals and loaned out over 55 various types of medical equipment. We find the most needed equipment is wheel chairs, transport chairs, seated walkers, bedside commodes and shower chairs. Disposables most often needed are incontinence supplies such as adult diapers, pullups and bed pads. We now have 60 hospital beds with most of these in the community. There are presently 7 beds along with mattresses in our storage. Thank you to all our faithful volunteers and we welcome you to be a part of this if you have a few hours to give toward this mission. We continue to serve individuals in Harrisonburg and the counties of Rockingham, Page, Augusta and Shenandoah.
