

COVID-19 Guidelines for Worship as of July 21, 2020

Please refer to previously published Phase 2 Documents for details of procedures for inperson worship, mask wearing, social distancing, and sanitation. The following is an outline for your convenience. In short, this week's Governor's briefing prompts return to indoor inperson worship under the protocols previously disseminated by the Bishop.

Church Services

- In-Person worship indoors and outdoors are allowed and must follow all previously published guidelines for mask-wearing, social distancing, and sanitation.
- Congregations must provide online worship or refer members to the Bishop's virtual worship services in order to serve those in high-risk groups.
- Clergy, in consultation with lay leaders, may opt to offer only virtual worship, whether offered by the local clergy or by the Bishop.
- Clergy, in consultation with lay leaders, may opt to offer outdoor worship only.
- There must be a minimum of six feet between every person (with the exception of family members who live in the same household) at every in-person worship gathering.
- Morning Prayer creates less opportunity for person-to-person infection, and therefore it
 may be used as your principal Sunday worship service. However, Holy Eucharist is
 still authorized.
- If Holy Eucharist is celebrated:
 - Communion will be in one kind.
 - Only the celebrant may drink from the chalice.
 - Intinction is not allowed.
 - o Communicants must come forward one-at-a-time, or in family groups.
 - o Clergy should place the host into communicant's hands without touching hands.
 - No physical touching during the passing of The Peace.
- Masks are mandated for everyone in attendance at any in-person worship service.
- Singing is prohibited at all in-person worship services.

- High risk individuals, e.g., those older than age 60, those with compromised immune systems, compromised lung and/or heart function, or with other known risk factors, should be encouraged to worship online.
- Before and during indoor and outdoor in-person worship services, a person must be appointed to remind people of physical distancing guidelines and to ensure that you do not exceed the maximum number of people who can be physically distanced.
- If someone in attendance contracts COVID-19 within 14 days of attendance, contact the Diocese immediately.
 - The clergy person who administered Communion must be tested and quarantined.
 - Worshipers in attendance must be notified of a possible exposure.
- If you are uncertain about anything, call, text, or email the Bishop or Canon Bedingfield.
