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


During the holiday adaptive pause, each day one of my students had a mystery object that the rest of the class had to guess by asking questions. It was a nice way for the class to build community over Zoom.

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

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

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


The YE team has had a variety of challenges, and we have all worked together to overcome each of these challenges. Resilience is being able to support each other, even at distance.


