The First Reading *Acts 17. 22 – 31*

Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, “Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, ‘To an unknown god.’ What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him — though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For ‘In him we live and move and have our being’; as even some of your own poets have said,

Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame. For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you — not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.



How will I receive the Sacrament if not by mouth? By faith. The Church has been through pestilence and passed its wisdom down to us in the Book of Common Prayer. Here's the rubric [instruction] from the 1689 Prayer Book translated into contemporary Californian: "But if a person, either by reason of extremity of sickness or . . . by any other just impediment, cannot receive the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood: the Clergy shall instruct them that if they repent of their sins, and believe that Jesus Christ has suffered death upon the Cross for them, and shed his Blood for their redemption, earnestly remembering the benefits they have received thereby . . . they eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Savior Christ profitably to their soul's health, although they do not receive the Sacrament with their mouth."

Via live stream you will receive what Tradition calls Spiritual Communion. Inclining your hearts, you will eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ to your soul's health, although you do not receive the Sacrament with your mouth.

— Music Notes —

The situation regarding music at the time of the Anglican Reformation is best reflected in the life and work of Thomas Tallis (c. 1505 – 1585). He served in the Chapel Royal for some 40 years, composing under four Monarchs with widely differing religious practices. Although much of his sacred music was written in Latin, Tallis was among the first to set English words to music for the rites of the Church of England. Stylistically, he bridges older musical forms with newer ones at the time. During the reign of King Edward VI (1547 – 1553) it was mandated that the services be sung in English, and that the choral music be brief and succinct “to each syllable a plain and distinct note.” *If Ye Love Me* is mainly homophonic (where all the voices sing in the same rhythm and all together), with occasional forays into polyphonic texture.

The text of Hymn 654 is attributed to St Richard, Bishop of Chichester (1197 – 1253). It appeared in its published form from a card published by Skeffington & Sons, Ltd. and dated March 18, 1915 by the British Museum. It has appeared in many hymnals and became part of popular culture (albeit with different music) through its inclusion in the musical “Godspell.” The music for this hymn was composed by Arthur H. Biggs for the 1940 Hymnal. The name of the tune, SUMNER is derived from the avenue on which St John’s Cathedral, Spokane, is located and where Biggs served as music director for many years.

— St Stephen's Church Fund for those in Need —

The committee, working with great diligence, dedication, and speed vetted 5 local agencies to see where funds could make the most impact. After careful due diligence and conversations with agency heads, the committee overwhelmingly and unanimously identified ExtraFood of Marin as the focused contributions recipient.

ExtraFood Marin [<https://extrafood.org/>] addresses critical issues of hunger, wasted food, and the climate crisis by collecting excess fresh food from businesses and immediately dispersing it to Marin's most vulnerable children, adults, and families via pantries and distribution locations.

ExtraFood is directing deliveries through St Stephen's to help make 75 meal bags per week for distribution at St Vincent's and Open Door Ministries.

St Stephen's Church has started a fund and welcomes your contribution. Leadership has dedicated an initial grant of \$4100 to support this effort and welcomes your donations to collect a sizeable and generous donation. 100% of your contributions will go to extending the mission and ministry of ExtraFood.
