

A New Year. The Way Forward.

Acts 9:1 “But Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest 2 and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any belonging to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem.”



January often feels like a reset—new calendars, new goals, new promises. But the Church begins the year differently. We do not start with resolutions. We start with Epiphany—the season when God reveals who Jesus truly is.


Epiphany reminds us that the Christian life is not about reinventing ourselves, but about being **reoriented** by Christ. Before believers were called “Christians,” the book of Acts tells us they were known as **“the Way.”** That name says something essential: Christianity is not only something we believe; it is a path we walk. A direction given by Jesus Himself.

When God Redirects a Life

One of the Epiphany readings this month is the conversion of St. Paul (Acts 9:1-22). Saul of Tarsus was not confused or searching. He was confident, zealous, sincere—and wrong. He believed he was serving God while opposing Jesus and His followers.

On the road to Damascus, Jesus did not offer Saul advice or self-improvement. He stopped him.

“*Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me?*”



In that moment, Saul lost his sight, his certainty, and his control. But in that loss, God gave him a new direction. The persecutor became a servant. The confident became dependent. The enemy of the Church became its chief witness.

Epiphany teaches us this: following Jesus is not about adjusting our plans—it is about allowing Christ to redirect them.

Why the Early Church Called Itself “The Way”

Biblical scholar Joseph Fitzmyer notes that “*the Way*” was not a nickname given by outsiders, but a name the early Church used for itself. It described not just what Christians believed, *but how they lived*.

The language reaches back into Israel’s story, echoing Isaiah’s call to “*prepare the way of the Lord*.” To belong to “the Way” meant that life had direction, faith had shape, and daily choices mattered. That still matters today.

The Way Forward for Us

As a new year begins, the same question stands before us: **Are we simply busy—or are we being led?** That question sits at the heart of our congregation’s Strategic Plan, summarized in two phrases you will hear often this year:

Preparing People for the Road Ahead

Preparing the Next Generation for the Road Ahead

These are not slogans. They are confessions. They confess that Christ comes first, that eternity shapes everything, and that faith must be formed—not assumed. They remind us that the Church exists not only for today, but for those who will come after us.

The Strategic Plan is not about becoming something new. It is about walking more faithfully in the Way Christ has already given us.

Epiphany Light for a New Year

In a world marked by noise and uncertainty, the Church does not need to chase trends. It needs clarity. Epiphany gives us that clarity. Jesus is Lord. His Word still speaks. His Church still matters. His Way still leads to life.

A new year has begun.

The Way still stands.

2025 Year in Review

As we look back on 2025, this past year can best be described as a foundational year for Messiah Lutheran Church & School. It was not flashy, but it was faithful. Much of the work done this year focused on strengthening what supports our shared mission: preparing people—and the next generation—for the road ahead.

At the heart of everything remained Christ's work through Word and Sacrament. In 2025, we rejoiced in baptisms of infants, children, and adults; welcomed new members; celebrated marriage; and commended faithful saints into the care of our risen Lord. We also walked together through illness, loss, and moments of crisis. In all of it, Christ continued to prepare His people not only for life here, but for the road toward eternity as we wait for our Savior.


Our worship life was shaped with care for how people actually live. Wednesday evening services were restructured into a more contemplative format and moved to a consistent 6:00 pm start time. This has made worship more accessible for families with children and for older members, while bringing greater continuity across Advent, Lent, and other midweek services. These changes were made so that worship continues to form and sustain God's people along the road ahead.

Faith formation and Christian education remained central. Through Bible studies, Adult Information/New Member classes, women's studies, and online offerings, adults were strengthened in the faith. In the school, Battle Ready faith formation was integrated into 2025 religion classes so students receive instruction even when worship attendance is inconsistent. In this way, the church and school worked together to prepare hearts and minds in Christ.

Messiah Lutheran School continued to live out its role of preparing the next generation for the road ahead. Enrollment stabilized and began trending upward, ACE Scholarships provided meaningful tuition support, and academic growth was documented through assessment tools. At the same time, significant work moved forward on accreditation, with staff, parents, and congregation members working together in preparation for the site visit scheduled for April 2026.

Much of 2025 involved important work that happens quietly but matters deeply. Administrative, governance, and financial systems were strengthened. Long-standing gaps were addressed, policies updated, accounting clarified, and a full financial compilation completed. These steps give us clarity, transparency, and stability—so ministry can continue faithfully into the future.

Because of the work done in 2025, Messiah enters 2026 with greater confidence and direction. The church and school move forward together with one mission: rooted in Christ, focused on eternity, and faithful in daily life—preparing people, and the next generation, for the road ahead.

2025 Year in Review continued...

Congregational Meeting Reports' Summary from December 14, 2025

Pastor's Report

Pastor Redeker described 2025 as a **foundational year** for Messiah—faithful rather than flashy. The year focused on strengthening systems, clarifying direction, and caring for people through both joyful and difficult seasons of life. At the center of everything remained Christ's work through **Word and Sacrament**, with baptisms, new members received, a wedding celebrated, and faithful saints commended into the care of the risen Lord.

Pastoral care continued through hospital visits, shut-in care, funerals, counseling, and crisis response, with increasing partnership from elders and Ministry Action Teams. Worship life remained Christ-centered, with midweek services reshaped into a more contemplative format and moved to a consistent 6:00 pm time for greater accessibility and continuity. Christian education remained strong across all ages, including adult Bible studies and the integration of *Battle Ready* faith formation into school religion classes.

Messiah Lutheran School continued as a vital arm of the mission, with enrollment stabilizing, academic growth documented, and accreditation work advancing toward an April 2026 site visit. Significant behind-the-scenes work strengthened administration, governance, and finances, providing long-needed clarity and transparency. Because of this foundational work, Messiah enters 2026 with momentum, clarity, and purpose as we continue preparing people—and the next generation—for the road ahead.

School Ministry Report – Jun–Dec 2025

Messiah Lutheran School experienced a strong first half of the 2025–26 school year. More than 25 adults—staff and volunteers—faithfully invested in students' spiritual and academic growth. Academic performance remains strong, with MAPS Growth testing placing students overall in the 60th–70th percentile.

The school benefited from \$21,000 in ACE Scholarships, successful PTA events, and a growing connection between church and school through Lunch Bunch prayer partners. Athletics, preschool programming, and staff development continued to flourish. Accreditation renewal is on track, with broad participation from staff, parents, and congregation members ahead of the April 2026 visit.

Looking ahead, marketing efforts are underway, facility upgrades are being funded through grants, and plans are moving forward to offer high school classes beginning in the 2026–27 school year to meet a growing community need.

Youth, Christian Education & Outreach – DCE Report

Youth ministry expanded through regular Youth Nights, service opportunities, and planning for future trips and events. Birthday outreach to youth and intentional follow-up with inactive members strengthened connections. Campus ministry at CMU continued through meals, events, and partnerships, with opportunities for more congregational involvement.

Christian education remained active through Kids Connection, Kids Time during worship, adult Bible studies, and continued development of the *Battle Ready* program across multiple age levels. Stewardship efforts included fundraising initiatives and partnerships that support both youth activities and broader ministry needs.

Finance Action Team Report

The Finance Action Team reported that 2025 was a **significant year for financial cleanup and transparency**. A long-awaited Accounting Compilation Report was completed, giving Messiah a clear and accurate financial picture for the first time in years—an essential step for accreditation.

Year-to-date revenue is slightly over budget, though fundraising remains below budget and will need continued attention. Cash balances remain stable, and expenses have been managed carefully. Outside accounting support has been secured, contracts are being reviewed for cost savings, and further work on financial policies and fundraising strategies is planned. The team continues to seek additional members to support this important work.

Administration Report – Julie McEndree

I would like to thank the congregation for welcoming me back. We are very blessed to be here in Grand Junction and at Messiah Lutheran.

In the office – we are working on expenses and ways of cutting costs. We are going through contracts and looking at less expensive options and new ways of doing things.

We are also working on policies and procedures with Pastor, so that there are clear guidelines to go by. The Finance Action Team is very diligent in going through the financials and helping with day-to-day operations.

The Memorial Wall has been updated, the Giving Tree was a huge success, and we are working on end-of-year activities.

I'd like to thank all who volunteer in the office. It is greatly appreciated!!!

As we prepare people—and the next generation—for the road ahead, there are many simple ways you can support the work God is doing at Messiah:


- Pray for our congregation, school, staff, and students as we move into 2026.

You might notice in the design that the 4 is empty. That is a purposeful creation. It includes Luke 2 and symbolizes the empty tomb with an empty 4.

Messiah youth will be selling these shirts after worship each week from now until February 8th. Shirts are \$25. Long sleeves are \$30. Shirts should arrive by mid-March.

✚ Celebrate Jesus All Year Long!

I was first introduced to the Skit Guys by the DCE I was assisting in Las Vegas. I've been a fan of the Skit Guys from the first time I saw one of their videos. They even came to one of the LCMS Youth Gatherings (2019, I think). They are going through some changes and now go by the name 231 Collective. (Please keep them in prayer.) But they still have the same great content. I recently received a video promo from them. [Click Here](#) to watch it. (It's been purchased. So don't worry; it's just easier to use their link.)

In this video, Tommy and Eddie talk about a neighbor who leaves their lights up all year long, changing color depending on the holiday. But their point is that we shouldn't let our light dim just because the Christmas lights come down. The Light we have, of course, is Jesus! Jesus' light never dims.

As the children's song goes, "This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine." Or another favorite Christmas tune (which I usually think of as a VBS song), "Go tell it on the mountain over the hills and everywhere." We have the greatest news ever. Don't be ashamed to let your light shine or go tell it on the mountain! And when the HOA asks why your lights are still up, you have two options: A.) tell them the lights are Epiphany lights, Valentine's lights, St. Patrick's lights (both St. Valentine and St. Patrick have interesting stories about Jesus, by the way), Easter lights and of course, the longest season of all, Pentecost lights! Or B.) simply ask, "Do you really want to tell Jesus that it was your HOA duty to enforce the removal of His light?"

If you do tell your HOA that your lights are Epiphany lights on January 6th, remember the acronym I used a couple years ago...

Because Epiphany is the celebration of the first non-Jewish people to see Jesus, we can say **E**very **P**erson **I**nvited. What a blessing! Jesus was sent to save the entire world from sin because of God's great love for us. Take a moment to read John 3:16-21. How many times does this passage state the world... whoever... everyone? *Every person!* And because of God's great love for us, we **P**raise **H**im! Through this great gift, we are called to tell the world about God's amazing grace and wonderful love for everyone. (Matthew 28:19) **A**nd **N**ow **Y**ou. That's you as in you reading this; you as in your neighbor; you as in **E.P.I.P.H.A.N.Y.** is for everyone! Share that gift (it never runs out); let your Light shine; celebrate Jesus all year long.

From the Principal's Desk

Happy New Year! Students return to class on the 6th, so we still have a little time to make extra preparations. The Christmas/New Year break is a refreshing time for students and staff, allowing us all to return in January ready to tackle the second half of the school year.

One of the projects we are working on in the school side of the building is to replace the old fluorescent lighting with new LED fixtures. The fixtures are wearing out and bulbs are dying but the parts to fix them are no longer being produced. The new lights will also eliminate the flickering and buzzing so common to fluorescent lights that can be especially hard on young eyes.

We have been blessed to be informed recently that the Lion's Club of Grand Junction has awarded us a grant for over \$10,000 to complete this project during this school year! We received donations last year to complete three classrooms, and this grant will fully fund the remainder of the project. We need to be sure to express our gratitude to Ridge Electric for providing the manpower and expertise to install the lights, and to Consolidated Electrical Distributors (CED) for getting the parts for us at a reduced cost.

The Lion's Club grant also has a few requirements for us as grant recipients. These will not be hard to fulfill if we work together. These requirements are:

- Participate in their annual parade, February 14, 2026 and also in February 2027
 - We can enter a float or just walk with our banner - this would be fun for kids and adults alike.
- Provide cakes for the cake walk at the Lion's annual carnival, February 14, 2026 and also in February 2027. Cakes may be homemade or store bought.
- You will also see the Lion's Club as a sponsor on the new banners we will be getting for events.

These represent such a small effort to recognize the size of gift they are giving us this year. Please watch for details in the Messiah Minute and in Sunday bulletins as we get closer to these events. Participating in these events will have the added benefit of promoting our church and school to more people in the community.



Our Strategic Plan: What We're Focusing On

As we begin a new year together, I want to share—simply and clearly—what we are focusing on as a congregation and school.

Strategic planning doesn't mean changing who we are. It means being **wise stewards** of what God has entrusted to us. Rather than trying to do everything at once, we are concentrating on a few important areas, in the right order and at the right time.



First, we are paying attention to **our community**. We are learning who lives around us, what families are facing, and where there is need for the Gospel and Christian education. We want to serve people as they truly are, not as we assume they are.

Second, we are being honest about **our capacity**. We are recognizing our strengths, naming our limitations, and addressing gaps before they become problems. This is not about criticism; it is about wisdom and good stewardship.

Third, we are strengthening **our systems**. This includes admissions, governance, accreditation, and clear procedures. Strong systems don't replace ministry—they support it and help it endure.

Fourth, we are focusing **our efforts**. Instead of doing many things at once, we are setting priorities and being careful about timing. Focus allows us to move forward together without unnecessary strain.


Finally, everything leads to **strengthening our culture**. Our greatest priority is discipleship, unity, and forming lives shaped by Christ. Programs may change, but a Christ-centered culture endures.

To help guide this work, I've been using four books—not as replacements for Scripture, but as tools for clarity and stewardship: *The Art of War*, *Turnaround*, *The ONE Thing*, and *Differentiate or Die*. Together, they help us prepare wisely, focus clearly, and remain faithful to who we are.

At the center of all of this is Jesus Christ—preached clearly, taught faithfully, and lived out together.

Thank you for your prayers and trust as we move forward in Christ.

What We Mean by “Preparing for the Road Ahead”


You will see two closely related phrases connected to our church and school.

“Preparing People for the Road Ahead” describes our church-wide mission. Everything we do centers on preparing people in Christ for the road toward **eternity**, as we wait for the return of our Savior.

“Preparing the Next Generation for the Road Ahead” describes the school’s role within that same mission. In the school, we prepare children first and foremost in Christ and His Word. At the same time, we provide an excellent education so students are well prepared for daily life, responsible citizenship, and the skills they need for the road ahead here and now.

These are not two different missions. They are **one mission**, lived out in different ways—rooted in Christ, focused on eternity, and faithful in daily life as we wait for our Lord.



Romans Bible Study

Why does life of faith still feel conflicted—pulled between hope and frustration, confidence and weakness, freedom and struggle? In Paul’s letter to the Romans, this tension is not explained as a battle between body and soul, but as life lived between *flesh* and *Spirit*: between the old world marked by sin and death, and the new life God has already begun in Christ.

This Bible study will explore Romans as a letter about real life, real struggle, and real hope. Paul shows how God’s grace, through Christ’s death and resurrection, creates one people and how the Holy Spirit sustains us as we live “between the times,” grounded in forgiveness, shaped by grace, and oriented toward the coming glory. Whether you are new to faith, returning after time away, or have walked with Christ for years, Romans speaks directly to life as it truly is—and to the hope God has promised.


Quilting Group




Volunteers Needed: Church & School Picture Directory
