Three Chapters Join for Organics Tour and Meeting

Chapters 7, 8 and 9 revived a long-standing tradition with a joint summer meeting with a tour of the anaerobic co-digester at Nobelhurst Farm in August. The tour was led by Chris Nobel (pictured above, in the red shirt), a seventh generation dairy farmer who, like many farmers, wears a number of different hats, including CFO of Natural Upcycling a food scraps/organics collection company.

Much of the waste that Natural Upcycling collects in upstate New York is brought to Nobelhurst farm, combined with cow manure and turned it into a renewable resource.

Natural Upcycling reports that they collect over **1,500,000** lbs. of food waste per month, reducing carbon dioxide pollution of **818,000** lbs. or the equivalent of taking **1,569** cars off the road annually.

After the tour, the three chapters headed to Genesee County Park and Forest for information sharing and a lowwaste lunch. Members were asked to bring their own utensils and cups with compostable plates and paper napkins available. A composting bucket collected what little waste was generated. Region 8 member Peggy Grayson made a fruit salad and cookies, completely eliminating
