

# How to Run Better Panel Interviews (and Why They Matter)

Panel interviews often spark mixed reactions. For candidates, they can feel a little like being put under a spotlight—trying to answer questions from multiple people while keeping track of names, roles, and personalities. For hiring teams, they sometimes end up disorganized or redundant.

But when they're structured with intention, panel interviews are one of the most powerful tools you have in the hiring process. They provide diverse perspectives, streamline scheduling, and help reduce unconscious bias. 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## Why Panel Interviews Work

Unlike one-on-one interviews, panels allow you to gather input from several stakeholders at once. This is important because a new hire rarely works with just one person—they collaborate across functions and personalities.

The advantages include:

- **Broader perspectives:** Panelists can assess different dimensions such as technical ability, communication style, and cultural fit.
- **Reduced bias:** Having multiple voices in the room helps balance out individual preferences.
- **Efficiency:** Instead of holding four separate interviews, you collect insights in one session.

That said, these benefits only happen when the process is intentional. Without structure, panel interviews can easily turn into either chaotic interrogations or unfocused conversations.

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## Laying the Groundwork

Preparation is what separates an effective panel interview from a confusing one.

### Build the Right Team

Keep panels small but diverse. Three to four interviewers is ideal—enough to get multiple viewpoints without overwhelming the candidate. Choose people who bring different perspectives (such as a department peer, cross-functional partner, and leader) and who genuinely want to participate in the process.

## Assign Roles and Responsibilities

Each panelist should have a focus area. For example, one interviewer could cover technical expertise, another team collaboration, and another problem-solving skills. This avoids overlap and ensures that every key competency is addressed.

## Train and Align the Team

Not everyone is naturally skilled at interviewing. Brief your panelists on the role, review effective questioning strategies, and make sure they know the importance of open-ended questions. Share an agenda so everyone is aligned before the interview starts.

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# Creating a Positive Candidate Experience

Remember: the candidate isn't just being evaluated—they're also evaluating you.

- **Communicate in advance:** Let candidates know they'll be meeting with a panel, who will be present, and the general flow of the session.
- **Start with introductions:** Have each panelist share their role and what they'll focus on. This sets a welcoming tone and provides context for the conversation.
- **Avoid overwhelming dynamics:** Give candidates time to answer, build on each other's questions, and watch for signs of stress. The goal is to see their best—not to test how they perform under unnecessary pressure.

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# Running and Wrapping Up the Interview

During the interview, allow the discussion to flow naturally without jumping rapidly from one topic to another. Take notes on key insights rather than trying to transcribe everything.

Afterward, hold a structured debrief. Capture impressions while they're fresh, use a scoring system tied to the job's core requirements, and separate personal preferences from role-relevant concerns.

Finally, close the loop with the candidate. Whether or not you extend an offer, provide thoughtful feedback. This not only supports their professional growth but also leaves them with a positive impression of your organization.
