Dear Members and Friends of Prince of Peace Lutheran:

October 31st is Reformation Day in the life of the Church. In the year 1517, a young RomanCatholic monk/priest/scholar from Wittenberg, Germany chose to challenge some of the actions and teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. That daring young upstart was Martin Luther. The word of his challenges spread like wildfire across Europe and became the starting point of the Lutheran Reformation.

What happened next? “Reformation” means “change, renewal, or reorganization”. Within a few short years all of those things happened within the Christian Church in Europe. The Lutheran Reformation spurred other groups to protest against the Roman church, and this whole movement of change and renewal became known as Protestantism. All Protestants today can point to October 31, 1517, as the starting point for the ministry of their Protestant denomination.

But Reformation is not just one moment in time. In so many ways, the Church is called to be continually reforming itself and renewing its ministry in the world. Here are some of the challenges that currently challenge us to think in a “reformation mindset”:

- Covid. Covid has changed the church more than anything I have seen in my lifetime. We are challenged to find new ways to reach people, and to deal with the new habit of leaving the church because of these health concerns.
- Busy-ness. People are so much busier in their personal lives: work, family, sports for children, travel. Worship often seems like the least important item on the weekly calendar.
- Deeper questions. We don’t live in the Middle Ages anymore. We now understand more clearly the science of the world we live in. For instance, it no longer makes sense to blame or credit God for the weather. So where is God in all of this? We need to wrestle with the deeper question of how God is still active in our world and in our lives.

So how does the Church respond to all these changes and challenges? I think we keep moving forward with a “Reformation” mindset:

We keep telling the same amazing story of God’s love and grace in the face of all that is happening in the world.

- We are “fearless” in our generosity of time, and talents and treasures for the sake of others.
- We commit ourselves to making a difference in THIS place. How can Prince of Peace make a difference in the world?
- When asked how the Reformation happened, Martin Luther said something like this: “I preached, I taught the Word of God, I drank some good Wittenberg beer, and God did the rest.”

That is what is at the core of our future: God is still here. God has not and will not leave us. We will do our best, and God will be with us. We will make changes, adjustments, and reorganizations, but God will never change. That’s the heart of Reformation. And it’s still happening today!



The annual Craft Fair is scheduled for **Saturday, November 4th** from **10:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.** at our church. As you may or may not know, everything for the Fair is donated. You are being contacted to request your help. Please let us know what you can offer this year **ASAP**. We need baked goods for the bake sale, pies and cheesecakes for lunch, soups and chili for lunch, used books for the book sale and, of course, your handmade crafts.

We will set up on Friday, November 3rd and need people to work for a short time on the day of the Fair.

There will be a "sign-up genius" account created for this event. This website is set up like a gift registry. You can see how many food items or time slots are still available and which have been spoken for. The site will automatically send out a reminder a few days before the event. A link to this can be found in the latest weekly update.

If you can volunteer your time, but your availability doesn't coincide with one of the slots, pick the one closest to it and leave a comment stating when you can help. We will happily make the adjustments.

If you have some able-bodied family members (youth or adults) who can come at 2:30 p.m. to help knock down tables and pack things away they would be **MOST APPRECIATED!**

If you have pledged a food that can be dropped off a few days early, please leave it in the church kitchen (or fridge) and label it "Craft Fair". Pulled pork has been popular in the past.

Any other food or craft item should be dropped off by 9:00 a.m. on the morning of the fair. You may leave books on the labeled bench in the Narthex beginning Sunday, October 29th.

There is a growing concern for food allergies. Please add a list of ingredients of your hot foods and baked goods to an index card which we will post near your homemade items. This will help to avoid possible untoward allergic reactions in our participants.

A very successful feature of our Craft Fair is a sale of gently used holiday items and costume jewelry. Please bring the jewelry early as it must be sorted and displayed.

Last year was very successful because we tried a few new things and so many people stepped up to help. We are still grateful for last year's donations and volunteers but hope to continue this success into this year and years to come!

A NOTE FROM BRIAN MULLER

Every Sunday, we gather together for worship. You typically will see me at the organ or piano, you'll see the choir and/or other musicians leading music. You'll see greeters at the door handing out papers; ushers assisting people.

Then there's the stuff you may not see. You don't see all the people serving behind the scenes. TEMPLE TALK

"Feed the Hungry, Empower the Weak, Nourish the Soul"

That is the mantra or tag line for the Loaves & Fishes food pantry of New Milford, CT.

In the quaint town of New Milford, Connecticut, there exists a beacon of hope and compassion known as the Loaves & Fishes Food Pantry. Nestled in the heart of this close-knit community, the pantry stands as a testament to the power of grassroots initiatives and the unwavering dedication of volunteers and supporters. It serves as a lifeline for individuals and families facing food insecurity, and its impact extends far beyond the distribution of sustenance.

In 1984 - 3 New Milford women – Ms. Sherrie McAuliffe and Ms. Alma Roberson from United Methodist Church, and Ms. Biddy Rogers from St. John's Episcopal Church saw a need to feed local hungry people in their town. The 3 women met with other local churches and service organizations to solicit funds and volunteers for a soup kitchen. On June 4, 1984 Loaves & Fishes of New Milford served its 1st meal at St. John's Episcopal Church. In 1990, the town of New Milford offered Loaves & Fishes space in the Richmond Citizen Center, and the program has been located there ever since. Loaves & Fishes is preparing to move to a brand new building facility that will feature a brand new up to date modern kitchen and appliances that will also be located in New Milford.

Loaves & Fishes is a non-profit organization staffed by CT volunteers from local Churches and other citizens wanting to help feed the hungry. There are no paid staff. The program relies completely on donated funds, food, and volunteer staff to prepare and serve a 4:30 PM daily hot meal 7 days a week. Volunteers from Prince of Peace Church prepare and serve this meal every 2nd Sunday of each month.

My faith journey and participation in the Loaves & Fishes program started about 16 years ago when Ed Wainwright approached me to get involved. After a few years as Ed became older and unable to continue as a Supervisor, I became a Supervisor and then the lead POP contact for Loaves & Fishes.

Over the last 20+ years Ed Wainwright, Casey Johansen, and Donna Wright, and myself have served as supervisors who plan, prepare, and serve meals together with other volunteers from our Church. Ed, Caseys', and Donnas' service and leadership is to be applauded. Ed had to step down due to his age and health, Casey moved to NC, and Donna passed away unfortunately.

I am speaking to you today to tell the Loaves & Fishes story, and to ask Prince of Peace members to consider becoming a Supervisor. I need assistance to keep POP's involvement in this outreach program strong. Supervising is not difficult and is very rewarding. The volunteer signup sheet is always on the table in the narthex.

Volunteering at Loaves & Fishes enriches all those who participate. It is an expression of our faith and service as we are all called to do by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Volunteers engage in friendly chatter with patrons. The patrons are indeed grateful for the company and nourishing hot meals, and they eagerly assist with clean up at the end of the meal time. My wife Liz and both of my children have prepared food and volunteered many times at Loaves & Fishes over the years. It has been a joy for me to see both of my children recognize what it means to serve in faith and know they have truly helped someone in need. Thank you to anyone who has volunteered in the Loaves & Fishes outreach program. Please reach out to me to learn more.

Parish Life Committee

Stewardship is the gift of time and energy that is shared with one another in a wide variety of fellowship and service.

My name is Lorraine Lavery and I am the chairperson of the Parish Life Committee. My family has been members of POP since 2017 when we moved here from New York.

I grew up in a big Italian Catholic family. I still have very vivid memories of walking into a house full of family at my grandparent's big Victorian house in NJ. The smell of my grandmother's cooking permeated throughout the house. There was a large dining room table that always miraculously fit everyone. And before every meal we prayed together. There was always lots of good food, laughter, and fellowship. This fellowship helped create a supportive family ready to take on life's storms.

When I stepped up to be the chairperson of the Parish life committee, I knew how important fellowship is in a family. I felt my experiences growing up has given me the talents and passion I needed to be able to serve on this committee.

Fellowship makes us stronger. When we gather together at events like coffee hour or at Friday Night Live, being around other believers gives us the chance to learn and grow in our faith. Fellowship provides encouragement. Providing luncheons after funeral services encourages and supports members that are going through difficult times. Fellowship reminds us we are not alone. Sharing in events throughout the church season: Oktoberfest, Shrove Tuesday, congregational picnics creates a home at POP. God wants us to come together so that we know we are not alone.

Fellowship helps us grow. A church with a strong sense of fellowship within, will be a church prepared to grow. Together we will be equipped on how to share, demonstrate, and evangelize our faith commitment to others during our community events.

Life gets busy. And sometimes it seems like we cannot fit one more thing into our schedules. But during these times is when God is calling us the most to turn our focus on HIM. Peter reminds us that "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms" Did you ever get a nudging feeling or asked to serve when it seems like the most impossible time. This is the Holy Spirit calling you. As we enter this season of stewardship, I challenge you to react to that nudge. If you react to the call of the Holy Spirit, I am positive you will be able to find and give fellowship in whatever service you may choose.

Faith Formation

Stewardship is an ongoing commitment to grow our faith. As we learn more about who we are - as the people of God - we are being good stewards of the gift of faith that comes to us through the Spirit of God.

I know many of you, but my name is Heather Pontonio and my son, Alex - back at the Zoom computer - and I have been members since 2012.

Over the past few years PoP has moved from using the words Christian Education to Faith Formation. It embraces how our education as Christians doesn't end when thinking on *Education* ends - whether that be 12th grade or college. It's lifelong.

My faith journey took a deep and immensely fulfilling turn when I started to teach Sunday School. You think you know the story of Noah - try teaching it to a 2nd grader. You think as an adult that you're alone in the struggle of life? Come to our adult bible study (after church today!) and hear from a dozen other adults feeling similar challenges.

Faith Formation is not about knowing - it's about forming, it's about learning and it's about connecting. Imagine a virtual hug - you can get that here each week.

We all need hugs. It's something that makes us human. We were created in God's image. Which means God needs hugs too. Being part of Faith Formation - for others or yourself - is a hug to God.

My path in Faith Formation was not a sudden jump into the deep end. It took time. It started with simple words from my father - "your talents were given to you by God. They are not just for you. How are you using your God-given skills to help others?" And I'd ask you the same.

As we are in the stewardship season, I encourage you to think about the path you are on and ask how Prince of Peace can help you build your faith... and invite you to use your skills and talents to help this church, this community, and your neighbors.






