Dear Members and Friends of Prince of Peace Lutheran Church:

I am here to confess that I am a “leaf peeper”. As a long-time Midwesterner, I am fascinated by the fall foliage in New England, and the brilliant changing colors that often overwhelm the landscape. If you ask anyone outside of New England, they will tell you—“That’s what New England is famous for!”

We have a friend from Denmark who is visiting us this week. She came to “see the leaves”. In a few weeks, we have friends from Nebraska who will be our guests, and of course, they came to “see the leaves”.

Of course, everyone, everywhere makes quick and unfair assumptions. I have been asked many times if Nebraska has anything more than corn. And on the other side of that, I believe a significant part of the country believes that New England has nothing more than pretty leaves.

Of course, there’s more than the beautiful fall foliage. You have to live in this part of the country and experience this part of the country to know that. New England, and Connecticut are amazing—so full of history, fascinating sites to see, cultural opportunities and so much more.

I use that illustration because I want to ask the question, “What is Prince of Peace known for?” If you were to randomly ask a person on the street in Brookfield or any other surrounding community that question, what would the answer be? Would they even know we exist? And if they did know about Prince of Peace, what would they say about us?

I have been challenging the Church Council to think about this. What are we known for as a congregation? What do we want to be known for? What is our identity? How can we make a bigger impact in our community? How can we make a difference in our little corner of the world and beyond?

We have a wonderful Mission and Vision Statement. We have reduced those statements (which no one has set to memory) to this phrase, “**Gathered Together to Serve**”. I don’t know if that will catch on, but it does define who we are and what we hope to be. Prince of Peace needs an identity in this community. We need people to talk about us (in a good way, of course). We need people to admire what we are trying to do in service, enough so that they may want to be a part of it.

I’m going to keep talking and challenging folks to think about this. Just like New England is more than pretty leaves, Prince of Peace is more than a building. We are truly “Gathered Together to Serve”. So who or what are we serving? Why is our gathering any different than anyone else’s? What do we have to offer?

It’s something to think and talk about.


Please sign in upon arrival.





The annual Craft Fair is scheduled for **Saturday, November 4th** from **10:00 a.m.- 3:00 p.m.** at our church. As you may or may not know, everything for the Fair is donated. You are being contacted to request your help. Please let us know what you can offer this year **ASAP**. We need baked goods for the bake sale, pies and cheesecakes for lunch, soups and chili for lunch, used books for the book sale and, of course, your handmade crafts.

We will set up on Friday, November 3rd and need people to work for a short time on the day of the Fair.

There will be a “sign-up genius” account created for this event. This website is set up like a gift registry. You can see how many food items or time slots are still available and which have been spoken for. The site will automatically send out a reminder a few days before the event. A link to this will be found in the upcoming weekly updates.

If you can volunteer your time, but your availability doesn't coincide with one of the slots, pick the one closest to it and leave a comment stating when you can help. We will happily make the adjustments.

If you have some able-bodied family members (youth or adults) who can come at 2:30 p.m. to help knock down tables and pack things away they would be **MOST APPRECIATED!**

If you have pledged a food that can be dropped off a few days early, please leave it in the church kitchen (or fridge) and label it "Craft Fair". Pulled pork has been popular in the past.

Any other food or craft item should be dropped off by 9:00 a.m. on the morning of the fair. You may leave books on the labeled bench in the Narthex beginning Sunday, October 29th.

There is a growing concern for food allergies. Please add a list of ingredients of your hot foods and baked goods to an index card which we will post near your homemade items. This will help to avoid possible untoward allergic reactions in our participants.

A very successful feature of our Craft Fair is a sale of gently used holiday items and costume jewelry. Please bring the jewelry early as it must be sorted and displayed.

Last year was very successful because we tried a few new things and so many people stepped up to help. We are still grateful for last year's donations and volunteers but hope to continue this success into this year and years to come!

SEAFARER'S

Over the years the women at POP have been knitting scarves and caps for the Seafarers that dock in Connecticut. We will be blessing them before we send them off in mid October. Below are the instructions for those wanting to help out with this much needed project. The Seafarer's are so thankful for our gifts. Any questions you can contact Marci Sharp at 203-775-4657.

KNITTED SEAFARER'S SCARF

Yarn – approx.. 300 yds. Worsted weight yarn (acrylic).....Size 6 or 7 needles
Finished measurements: approx.. 6.5" by 46"

Cast on 32 stitches

Knit even for 14 inches

K4, P4 for 18 inches

Knit even for 14 inches

Bind off with medium tension and weave in all ends.

Tip: slip the first stitch of each row purl wise to neaten the edges.

(Note): the 18 inches of ribbing will make the neck of the scarf narrow looking. This makes the scarf more dense and warmer around the neck without adding extra bulk.

KNITTED WATCH CAPS FOR SEAFARERS

Yarn: 1 4 oz. skein of 4-ply acrylic (worsted weight).....Size 6-16" circular

Cast on 120 stitches.

Knit 1, Purl 1 for 9 to 9 ½ inches

Continue knitting in stockinette stitch (knit) for 1 to 1½ inches

Decrease as follows:

1st row – Knit 10, knit 2 tog, repeat to end of row

2nd row – Knit 9, knit 2 tog, repeat to end of row

3rd row – Knit 8, knit 2 tog, repeat to the end of row

Continue decreasing in this manner until last decreasing row is K2, knit 2 to, repeat to end of row

There should be 30 stitches left on needles.

Cut yarn, leaving a 12 to 14 inch end.

Transfer stitches from knitting needles to tapestry or large-eye needle.

Pull stitches together firmly and secure by sewing criss-cross (in an X).

Note: If you mark the beginning of the row with a marker it is easier than trying to determine the beginning, and will make the decrease rows easier.

Please note the items that are listed below for the pantry. They tend to be the most nutritious and are easy to distribute.

Avoid glass jars and fragile packaging.

- Canned tuna, salmon or chicken
- Beans (canned or dry)
- Peanut butter
- Meal-in-a-can (beef stew, spaghetti & meatballs, etc.)
- Soup (especially chicken noodle)
- Rice (1, 2 or 3 pound bags)
- Pasta
- Macaroni and cheese
- Canned corn
- Canned vegetables
- Canned fruit
- Breakfast cereal (hot or cold)
- Marinara sauce and canned tomato products
