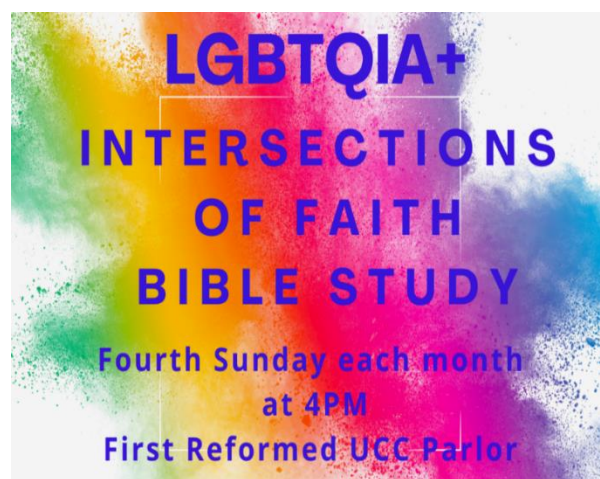

Special Concert at FRUCC May 31st at FRUCC Burlington Boy's Choir (4:00pm)

On Sunday, May 31st at 4pm, we have the pleasure of attending a concert by the Burlington Boy's Choir.

The Burlington Boys Choir is the oldest organization of its kind in North Carolina to have been continuously sustained in training and performance. Members of the choir range from the ages of eight to fourteen. Boys are auditioned and membership is attained based on recommendations, singing abilities, high academic achievement and review of effort and improvement while a member of the training choir. Continued participation in the choir is contingent upon maintaining high grades and following high standards of conduct.

Today's choir holds to its founder's ideals, Ms. Wiseman, and incorporates modern approaches to teaching and learning both music and discipline. The current choir, composed of 15 to 30 boys, rehearses twice a week and memorizes 200 to 250 sheets of music, many in German, Latin, Italian or French each season.

The choir has performed at the White House on five occasions, and has performed at many famous churches and cathedrals in the United States, including the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. They have performed many times over the past 30 years at the Christmas Eve Communion Service at Duke University Chapel.

The choir has performed every year since 1991 at the Biltmore House in Asheville for their Christmas Candlelight Evening Tour. At one time they were the only children's group to be allowed to perform at the Biltmore House. The employees at Biltmore have said "This is one of the best entertaining attractions at the Biltmore House during the Christmas season. We draw straws to see who will have the opportunity to work and hear the choir perform."

The choir has performed in four operas and one oratorio with the Greensboro Symphony under the direction of Dr. Peter Paul Fuchs and several other times with other directors. They have worked with the North Carolina Symphony and have performed



on five different continents. They have been featured on the cover of Jack and Jill Magazine, in the North Carolina magazine, the City-County Magazine and the Alamance Magazine. The choir has been on the local Fox 8 News, Channel 2 Evening News and were filmed by ABC National News for a Christmas Special at the Biltmore House.

The Choir is presently directed by Bill Allred, who worked as an assistant director for Ms. Wiseman prior to her retirement in 1994. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Westminster Choir College at Princeton, NJ, received his Masters from the North Carolina School of the Arts, and a Doctorate of Musical Arts from The University of North Carolina Greensboro. Still under his direction in 2005, the choir added several exciting endeavors to its remarkable history. Several former choir boys were welcomed back in the new tenors and basses sections resulting in glorious harmonies, the choir recorded its first CD in over 10 years, featuring the traditional sacred music and selections from Fiddler on the Roof, and they partnered with the newly formed Alamance Girls Choir.

Ms. Wiseman passed away in 2005, and even though the choir is under different direction, she will always be a part of the choir. She taught about 500 Alamance County boys to sing throughout the world, and that number continues to grow today. She has given everyone a gift from God, she created a choir... a Choir of Angels...

FRUCC Community Garden: Off to a Fast Start – Edgar Miller



The First Reformed UCC Community Garden hosted two successful events in April with the Anything for Our Youth organization led by Tina Royal. On April 5, we welcomed 13 kids and eight adults who helped plant five different kinds of blueberry bushes, including testing and fertilizing the soil. We also planted peas and carrots (the kid's favorite vegetable so far) and harvested asparagus and herbs for their use at home.

On April 19, we held a combined Easter and Earth Day event, which featured planting annuals in the garden pollinator bed along with an explanation of the importance of pollinators for food production. We had six kids and five adults, who also helped plant tomatoes, squash and cucumbers. The kids enjoyed hunting for Easter eggs stuffed with different seed packets, including a wildflower mix, bush and pole beans, carrots, basil, dill,

tomatoes and squash, to take with them to plant at home. Lastly, Edgar Miller, the church's community garden liaison led a discussion of "Creation Care" for Earth Day, including scriptures encouraging humans to steward the Earth rather than "dominating" it.

The next Garden activity with the kids will be held on Saturday, May 17, from 10 AM – 12 PM and will feature Davidson County Cooperative Extension horticulture agent, Sam Boring, doing a tree planting workshop, followed by the Anything for Our Youth kids planting apple and fig trees.

We also continue to employ several garden workers during the week to prepare the garden for the kids' activities. Your donations to the Garden Fund help provide a living wage to folks that need the extra money. Thank you for your support.

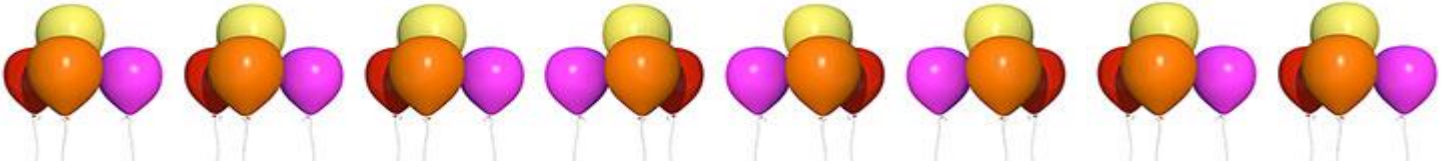
