

THE GUIDING PRINCIPLES OF COMMUNAL DISCERNMENT

The following principles guide all the processes in a communal discernment chapter. ¹

- 1. Communal Discernment is:
 - a. A way of seeking together God's dream for the group; God's call to the community
 - b. A balance of deep personal prayer and faith-sharing with each other
 - c. A balance of attentive listening and authentic speaking
 - d. A movement from "I" to "we"
 - e. A movement from "we and they" to simply "we"
- 2. Communal Discernment requires letting go of personal agendas and staying open to new possibilities
- 3. When a chapter is in session, it is the highest authority in the congregation and therefore everyone is equal in the group
- 4. Because all are equal in the group, all the information needed is available to all of the participants in the discernment process
- 5. Each person makes a commitment to respectful conversations, particularly during discernment for elections
- 6. Each person makes a commitment to have "the meeting at the meeting"
 - a. While it is fine to converse with others before or after the meeting, the respectful conversation guidelines still hold.
 - b. What <u>is inappropriate</u> is to meet to strategize about how to "make something happen" as the meeting unfolds.
 - c. Politicking or efforts by members to manipulate the outcome have no place in communal discernment
- 7. The results of communal discernment will reflect:
 - a. The quality of the information available to all
 - b. The commitment of each person to respectful conversation
 - c. The time available —the actual time-frame of the meeting
 - d. The inner spiritual freedom of the discerners regarding the outcome
- 8. The key questions in communal discernment are:
 - a. What is God saying through the group?
 - b. What is for the greater common good of the whole?
 - c. To what are we being called?
