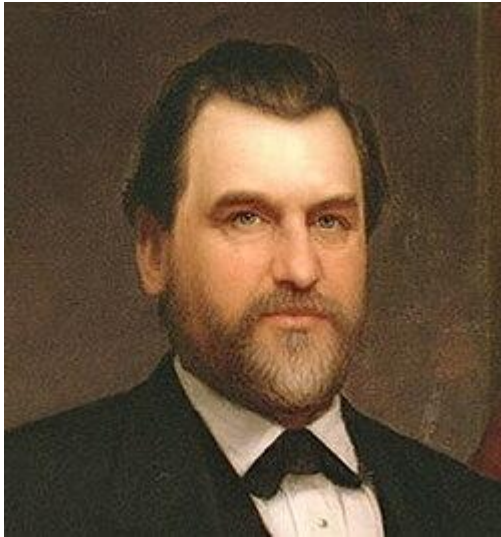


The Life of Leland Stanford: A Visionary Behind Stanford University

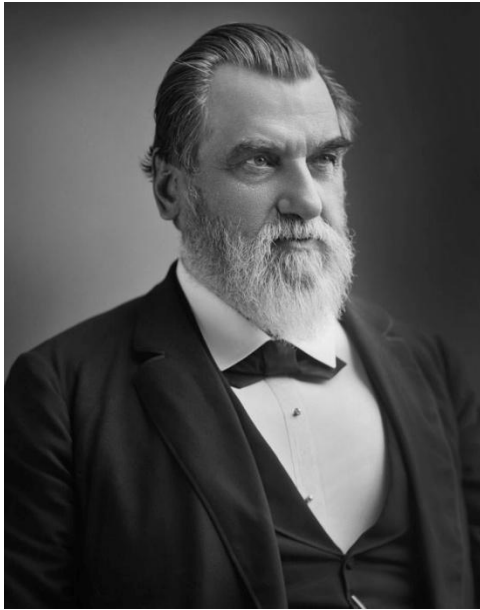
