

Get vaccinated for COVID-19

The vaccine is safe.

All three COVID vaccines were tested and the vaccine side effects are usually mild and very short-term. On the other hand, the impacts of COVID can be very severe and long-term or even fatal.



The vaccine is free.

Vaccine providers and health insurance companies are not allowed to charge patients any fees at all.



You can get vaccinated regardless of your health insurance status.

You do not need to show proof of health insurance to get vaccinated.



You can get vaccinated regardless of your immigration status.

You do not need to show proof of immigration status to get vaccinated.



You should get vaccinated even if you already had COVID.

The vaccine gives you a much stronger and longer immunity from COVID than having had COVID itself.



You can use paid time off work to get vaccinated.

State law requires public and private employers with 26 or more employees to provide up to 80 hours of special COVID related sick leave for full-time employees. Part-time employees are eligible too for a smaller number of hours.



You can easily make an appointment online or over the phone.

There are drop-in locations all over the County.

Appointments are not required at these locations. Go to sccFreeVax.org or call 2-1-1.



There are evening and weekend options for getting your vaccine.

You can get free transportation to and from vaccination sites.

The County and VTA have a free, door-to-door service to transport to vaccine appointments. Call (408) 809-2124.



If you are unable to leave your home due to a medical condition or disability, you may be eligible to get vaccinated at home.

A Public Health Nurse, EMT or paramedic will come to your home. To see if you qualify, call (408) 970-2818 or email CovidVaxHome@phd.sccgov.org.



The vaccine is safe if you are pregnant or trying to get pregnant.

There is no evidence that the COVID-19 vaccine cause fertility problems.
