	<p>Diane L. Richard, MEng & MBA, Mosaic Research and Project Management (MosaicRPM), www.mosaicrpm.com, has been doing genealogy research since 1987 and, since 2004, professionally focused on the records of North Carolina and southern states. She has authored over 500 articles on genealogy topics. In 2019, she published <i>Tracing Your Ancestors -- African American Research: A Practical Guide</i> via Moorshead Publications. Since 2016 she has been the editor of the <i>North Carolina Genealogical Society (NCGS) Journal</i>.</p> <p>As a speaker, she has delivered webinars and in-person talks about the availability and richness of records documenting southerners, pursuing formerly enslaved ancestors and their descendants, genealogical research tips, techniques, tools and strategies, and under-utilized resource collections. She has appeared on <i>Who Do You Think You Are?</i> (Bryan Cranston episode). She is a board member of NC Historical Records Online (NCHRO), a non-profit organization dedicated to providing public access to high-quality images of original records and other related information useful to researching North Carolina history and genealogy.</p>
	<p>Jacqui Perez proudly admits that her obsession is genealogy. Growing up, her family instilled a love of history and a curiosity about those who came before us. At her grandfather's request, she began researching her family. After finding those first ancestors, she was hooked--leading her to apply for membership in DAR. Jacqui is currently serving as NCSDAR Lineage Research Chair and in her third term as registrar of the Micajah Bullock Chapter. She is a member of Colonial Dames XVII Century and the North Carolina Genealogical Society.</p> <p>Born in Morgantown, West Virginia, Jacqui moved to Colorado as a teen. She attended Aims Community College & the University of Northern Colorado, where she majored in pre-health focusing on Biology. She has been a Certified Dental Assistant her entire career. Besides West Virginia and Colorado, Jacqui has lived in Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, and Kentucky. In 2010, Jacqui and her husband, Rudy, made Raleigh their home. They have three grown children and seven grandchildren. In her spare time, when she can find it, Jacqui enjoys walking, hiking, swimming, reading, exploring antique shops, and visiting historic sights.</p>

After graduating from Vance Senior High in 1979, he attended the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, majoring in history. After finishing in 1984, he then switched direction, and worked for 25 years as an art director and illustrator in the advertising profession in Raleigh. In 2004, he started his own freelance advertising and illustration company.</p> <p>For the past fourteen years he has been the North Carolina Room Specialist at the Thornton Library in Oxford, North Carolina, and moved to Oxford in 2012. With a passion for researching local history for over forty-five years, he considers it an honor to be the caretaker of one of North Carolina's most celebrated local history and genealogical libraries.</p>



Jolene Mullen is a past National Chair of Lineage Research and a past National Vice Chair for the CDRC, Cold Closed Cases Project, and the French Task Force.
