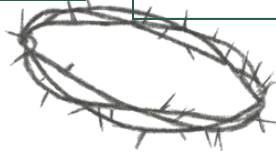

PASTOR'S PEN



I have a unique view of the gathering congregation as I look out from the pulpit on Sundays. I see mostly familiar faces, each warming my heart as I think of conversations we have had. I wonder what is on your mind today; I wonder what you need. I see new faces. I wonder what is on his mind today; I wonder what she needs.

And I wonder too, “Will Jesus Christ be glorified in these hearts and minds today?” I pray, “Help me, Lord, to be your worthy instrument to bring challenging yet healing words of your kingdom purposes and loving grace to each one.” And then I tremble. Can I really do this? Am I good enough—in character and skill—to inspire? Am I a capable conduit? Will these good people be able to set aside other things and allow space for God’s Spirit to work?

I remember the thoughts that went through my head as I entered the sanctuary and headed for a pew as a child, then a teenager, and finally an adult. I didn’t always enter with a generous and open mind, seeking God’s peace and kingdom living. The worst years were the ones when I was wrangling four children and a husband to get to church on time. In those days I often entered with a great deal of self-righteous anger. Nothing creates a barrier to God’s word more than self-righteous anger, right? We seethe as we replay our distress over and over, knowing we are justified in our thinking and internally building our case, striving for the words that will surely convince the world of our righteousness when we have the chance to speak again.

There are other thoughts that play out in similarly hazardous ways on Sunday morning as we gather for corporate worship. We bring hurts of all kinds with us. And then we encounter fresh discomfort as we find our way to seats in the sanctuary. Maybe you question why I greeted that person and seemingly ignored you. Perhaps you are thinking others are snubbing you with their lukewarm greetings. You may compare your clothes with others’ and think you have chosen better or worse. And then it may be that you are thinking, “There’s someone in my seat!” Ouch!

I am troubled by these sanctuary grievances—signs of *self*-centeredness. We are to be God-centered, not self-centered. As God’s people, we are heeding the command to gather for worship. Hebrews 10:24-25 declares, “And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another.” In worship we honor God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit—and we encourage one another in our faith. We grow in spiritual knowledge and strength. Our own limited vision and resources are enlarged and enhanced as we recalibrate our reasoning.

If we find ourselves thinking things like “They’re in *my* seat” (or “*my* parking space”), it’s time

Earth Psalms

What could be more meaningful than pictures of **nature** coupled with the **Psalms** from the Bible? Ms. Rivers puts together a beautiful book reflecting on God's purpose in our lives with these two elements.

Ms. Rivers draws verses from both the Old & New Testaments to relate an experience of her own life and how God has blessed her.

She adds comments from different sources such as lyrics from classic and new music, authors, scientists and pastors to further illustrate God's purpose in our lives.

She chooses to challenge us with reflection, application and connection with God after each chapter. So this book can be used as a Devotional if you so choose.

Finally ending with the Psalm verse that rounds out the purpose of each chapter.

My favorites include the very first chapter titled "Faithfulness Day & Night" - Psalm 90:14. Sunrise and Sunset are a blessing each day! Giving us hope and enjoyment with a range of beautiful colors.

My second favorite is the comparison of dog and cat, titled "Staying Close to the Master" - Psalm 63:4 - 5. Both are wonderful pets but they do not react to you in the same way. Similar to how we treat God in our spiritual life.

I sincerely hope that you choose this book from the library shelves and use the verse and photos to enhance your walk with God.

MISSIONS

April's mission offering will be designated to Youth Ministry International's fund that has been established to provide humanitarian aid to Ukraine during this time as well as help with the evacuation of Ukrainian citizens. Teachers at Kyiv Theological Seminary are actively working with Ukrainians in crisis. Missionary couple Sam and Melissa Hughes are graduates of Southern Seminary in Louisville, KY. They have served as missionaries with Youth Ministry International in Kyiv during the last ten years, where Sam teaches Ukrainians and trains them to serve in Christian ministry with a focus on ministry to youth. Weeks ago, the Hughes evacuated to Romania, where they and other evacuated missionaries are helping local churches and Individuals open their doors to the many Ukrainians crossing the border as refugees. Our financial gifts to YMI will help both those who are caught in Ukraine as well as those refugees in neighboring countries like Romania and Poland.

In March we collected for Precious Life and also took part in One Great Our of Sharing. As of March 21, we had \$340 for Precious Life. Our One Great Hour of Sharing Offering came to \$160.

SPRING FORUM:

for a thought adjustment. Our natural desire is for comfort, and we get comfortable with the familiarity of “our” spots at home, in the grocery parking lot, at sporting and entertainment events, and even at church. And yes, we can justify our preferences. But in worship we are not called to be comfortable. Jesus came to shake us up. (Check out Matthew 10:34-38, for example.) There are many reasons why we cannot claim a spot in the sanctuary. For one, we want to create welcome, open space for new folks. And a variety of people have to move about

from week to week because of the need to be near an aisle to assist someone, perhaps assigned as an usher, a greeter, etc. Or sometimes one needs to have easy access to a restroom. Some weeks it is good to move about to befriend a lonely or hurting soul, or to take the opportunity to catch up with another’s news. Some people have even found my suggestion to change seats for different perspectives to be beneficial. We need to feel free to enter and sit without hurtful, distracting thoughts.

The reality of Sunday morning worship is that we are a gathering of flawed people, including a pastor easily distracted by varied, major and minor concerns and tasks. And most people are just as self-conscious as you, probably more so. Looks are deceiving. Trust me when I say that others think what they have to say would not be interesting to you, so they may say next to nothing. And if you knew others’ secrets (for example, medical tests and decisions, loss of financial security, broken relationships, shame of past or present situations in their families, fear and anxiety of all kinds), your heart would soften.

In our worship this Sunday and into the future, let us draw near to God. Break through the barriers that hinder the Spirit’s work. And Jesus Christ will be glorified in our hearts and minds and beyond.

AT MORRISONS COVE

Your donations and your volunteer work directly help our elderly residents who can no longer care for themselves. In 2021 alone the percentage of residents who could not afford the cost of their care rose from 65% to over 70%. We expect this

body of need to grow as concerns of the pandemic continue. Compounded by the exodus of health-care workers throughout the country and the dwindling reimbursement options for small businesses, The Village is in dire need of assistance. We ask that you consider giving a financial gift or volunteering your time to the *Campaign for Care* initiative. Volunteers are needed to assist with activities like games or puzzles; help residents write letters, read aloud to residents; play music; visit with residents one-on-one; and assist in everyday needs, such as laundry. Every monetary donation matters, with \$20 covering the cost of a warm meal and \$500 covering a resident’s transportation for one month. Monetary donations can be sent to the Village at Morrison’s Cove, 429 South Market St., Martinsburg, PA 16662. “Campaign for Care” can be marked in the check memo.

NECOB is in need of a Village Rep. Their job would be to act as a liaison between the Village and our church. They would make us aware of things such as the above message and be the contact person for things like ticket sales, etc. that the Village may be selling.
