From the Leadership Team

The topic of having flags in the church is one that is coming up more and more frequently; in our congregational forums, general discussion within the congregation and to members of the Leadership Team. The Leadership Team discussed the issue and has developed a process that will aid the Leadership Team in making a final decision. We are hoping this can be accomplished within the next few months.

The Leadership Team wants to approach any decision in the best way possible – knowing the sensitive nature of this topic within the congregation. Our desire is to develop a process that will allow everyone to more freely and openly share their own personal views and feelings. To develop this process, the Leadership Team met with our District Executive Pastor David Banaszak and a member of the district's Shalom Team. As it turns out, the Shalom Team member is a pastor in our district and their congregation went through a very similar process not all that long ago.

This process, to allow the Leadership Team to make a final decision regarding flags in the church, is outlined below.

- 1). There will be two opportunities for the congregation to personally share their views. These will be hosted following Sunday morning worship on May 16 and May 23. For these sessions, anyone from the congregation can meet with any one of four teams – who will be positioned in private areas of the church. Each team will be comprised of one member of the district Shalom Team and one member from our Leadership Team. The information provided to each team will be recorded on paper.
- 2). In lieu of these personal meetings with the teams, the Leadership Team will also be preparing paper forms on which the congregation can share their views in writing. A box will be placed in the Narthex into which the completed forms may be placed. At the end of each of the two sessions, ALL forms, will be turned over to our District Executive.
- 3). Once the District Office has received all of the forms, following the second Sunday of Sharing, the District will collate all this information and issue a summary report back to the Leadership Team. Copies of this summary report will also be made available to the congregation. Although ALL submitted forms are to include the individual's name, the summary report will contain NO names.
- 4). Once the summary report from the district has been received, the Leadership Team will meet, discuss the responses and attempt to reach a final decision – which will then be conveyed to the congregation.

Above all, may we approach this discernment process with continued prayer, seeking the mind of Christ and the leading of the Holy Spirit as we seek God's will in the life and ministry of this congregation.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL!!

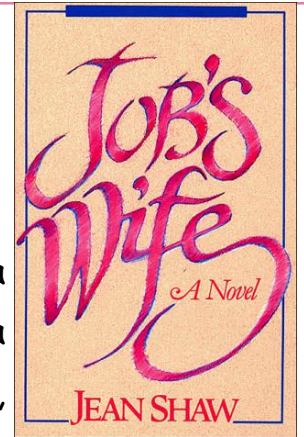

Job's Wife

The book of Job has always been a mystery to me. How could a righteous man be put into the position of such misery? How could a man who had so much in his life be found later on a pile of trash, dung and ash with oozing wounds?

Job's friends tried to explain the situation with attention to what Job must have done wrong in his life. His wife knew better, knowing Job as a righteous man following God's statutes "to the letter". But as Job's friends continued to berate him, her pride in her husband decreased. As Job's questions to God increase so did hers. As she stated in Chapter 23, "I think there exists in each of us, deep down and hidden, the fear that there is some area of life which is beyond God's control. I have observed that it is usually some trivial matter which makes us doubt." Why is this?

God wanted to remind Job and all mankind that He is the maker of all the earth and everything on it..so He dared Job to ask questions directly to Him. As Job's wife recalled, "it was the most solemn of moments. We sat in the dung, each reflecting on our personal manifestations of pride. We had been children, babbling with an arrogance based on false wisdom. God was calling us to the maturity of silent contemplation."

With the clarity that only God can give, Job and his wife learned the following "Shall we accept good from God, and not trouble?..Of course, we could not. We have had to accept both. Looking back, there has been so little trouble and so much good. If we could only see around the corners of life,how easy it would be. But then there would be no exercise in trust. We would miss knowing about God's faithfulness."

Know that He is faithful no matter what you are dealing with at this point in your life. Know He is there for you.

Aunt Bird had a way of making everyone feel welcome no matter what. She also always knew exactly what everyone needed – something that has proven to continue past her life. I met the Sollenberger family through Aunt Bird's nephew, Nolan (Nevin and Laura's son), in 2014 and will be officially joining the family in December of this year. Aunt Bird immediately took me in like one of her own nieces and would always entertain me with stories of the Sollenbergers, New Enterprise, the schools, and the Church. She even would discuss our upcoming wedding plans with such glee.

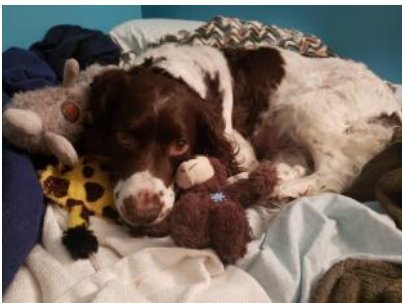
The day Aunt Bird passed, Nolan and I sat in her yard petting Molly, all of us completely in shock. Looking back, I think we were trying to comfort Molly as much as Molly was comforting us. Nolan and I knew we couldn't let Molly leave the Sollenberger family. Molly IS a Sollenberger. Molly is basically Aunt Bird's child. With the family's blessing, we adopted Molly to love her as much as Aunt Bird did.

We made frequent trips back and forth to Aunt Bird's house to help Molly adjust to Aunt Bird being physically gone. Someone as special as Aunt Bird never truly leaves us, and her ability to know what everyone needs has continued to be one of her best skills even in the afterlife. The day after Aunt Bird passed, I heard the tiniest meow coming from a black kitten stuck in the tree in her yard. I returned the kitten to the barn cats and went back to Molly. This kitten had other ideas though. She ended up crawling up my body to sit on my shoulder, something none of my other cats throughout my entire life have done, and was constantly playing with Molly. Now, both Molly and the kitten – Boo – are part of our little family.

When we read Mac's History Tales from December, it was overwhelming to know just how many people cared about Molly which is absolutely a testament to Aunt Bird. Aunt Bird would be thrilled to know so many people were concerned about her baby and wanted to make sure she went to a good home. We are beyond pleased to let everyone know that Molly has adjusted well to her new life with Nolan, his family, and I and that she is still the most spoiled pup in all of Pennsylvania. Nolan's truck and my SUV have been outfitted with Molly covers and all the windows have her nose art from our car rides. Not too long after Molly joined our little family, we learned she had cancer. Thanks to Dr. Gail from At Home Veterinary Care, Molly is now cancer free and has a great prognosis for a long, happy, healthy future.

Aunt Bird always knew what everyone needed, and I have no doubt that Molly and Boo entering Nolan's and my life after her passing was a gift sent from Heaven directly from her. If anyone would have enough goodness saved up to send an immediate message from Heaven, it would be Aunt Bird. Through those two lovable pets, Nolan, his family, and I were able to grieve the loss of Aunt Bird and have a reminder of her spirit every single day.

This isn't your normal Mac's History Tales, but it isn't likely that anyone can duplicate what Aunt Bird provided for everyone. Just like she provided for the church, Aunt Bird was a main organizer for all Sollenberger gatherings as well. Now, it's all of our turns to set up and continue all the traditions Aunt Bird was so passionate about. This letter is a tribute to her "Mac's History Tales," but I suppose "Mac's History Tails" may be more appropriate for the topic of Molly and Boo. Thank you all for loving Aunt Bird enough to also love Molly. When it is safe enough for all of us to grieve and celebrate Aunt Bird's life together, we will be sure to bring Molly along to let everyone have a bit of love from Aunt Bird's favorite Sollenberger. Losing someone is never easy, but hearing stories about Aunt Bird from so many people has definitely helped all of us heal.
