and leading the search for a new Head of School, and Tony Shaffer and his family were introduced and welcomed. Charlie Sachs was thanked for his service.

### Treasurer's Report

• Betsy Bannat, (Chair of Finance Committee) presented the Treasurer's Report in Sally Burton's absence. She highlighted the increase in giving as well as a grant which enables St. Martin's to increase the Thacker Maintenance Reserve Fund.

### Reports of Wardens and Rector

- The Junior and Senior Warden presented their reports. Susan Shingledecker, outgoing Senior Warden, was thanked for her service. Darin Parkison will be the new Senior Warden.
- Rev. Matthew thanked Mark Zielinski for his work leading the search for the new Head of School. He thanked Debbie Fitzgerald for help with the renovation of the sanctuary pews and flooring, He thanked Rev. Nathan and the Children's Ministries team for their work in maintaining in-person Sunday School. He highlighted increased parishioner giving and the new board structure that has been put in place. He also thanked Parker and Tiffany Carlisle for their work in Outreach and the staff for their continued service.

# St. Martin's Episcopal School

As Interim Head of School Charlie Sachs noted in this space a year ago, St. Martin's Episcopal School is in a period of transition. It is a delight to be a part of that and to reflect now on the 22-23 school year.

The Head of School role was not the only one to be in transition this year. With the departure of long-time Director of Academics Kim Carson. Mr. Sachs, and the Board of Trustees accurately determined that when folks said that Kim. "does the work of three people," that was an accurate appraisal and not a figure of speech. Consequently, the School established three Division Coordinator roles, two of which are full time this year. and all of which will be full time in the 23-24 school year. Laura O'Connor, Heather

Bosanko, and Michelle Kuemper have brought their significant gifts to these roles this year, and our students and staff have benefited from this new organizational structure.

A significant priority for the School was the completion of our decennial reaccreditation visit, a key component of the reaccreditation process for the Association of Independent Maryland and D.C. Schools (AIMS). The reaccreditation process requires that the School meet standards set by AIMS and provide documentation of adherence to those standards. The School must also engage in a meaningful process of self-evaluation and write a forward-looking report that identifies priorities for future growth and improvement.

Shepherded by Director of Finance & Operations and Re-Accreditation Chair Janet Mosher, whose tireless efforts kept the process on track and moving forward, the School completed its documentation and written report and hosted a successful AIMS visit in February. AIMS will provide a formal response over the summer, and the School will have a year to formulate an action plan based on our own self-evaluation, the Visiting Team's recommendations, and our upcoming strategic

planning process.

This year has also seen our community events return to campus. Families have been invited to join us in person for a number of celebrations, performances, curriculum nights, other events. The marquee event, our annual Field Party, was held in person for the first time since 2019. Led by the indefatigable Christine Hickey, Director of Marketing and Development—supported by an enthusiastic corps of volunteers from the PA and across the School community—this monthsplanning organizing effort led to such a well-prepared event that even a last-minute, weather-driven move to Parish Hall did not faze the team. On the contrary, not

only was the Field Party a fundraising success, but it was also a wonderful community celebration that our School and Church community and their guests greatly enjoyed.

On the topic of coming to campus, new families are doing so in order to get to know us and explore a St. Martin's education. Families are discovering that a small, welcoming independent school with a compelling mission has a great deal to offer their children. Director of Admissions Kira Dickson has done a marvelous job of working with Admissions Committees across campus and helping families to get to know St. Martin's. As we graduate the largest Eighth Grade class in School history and have no double section next year in the middle grades, we will budget for 260 students next year, as opposed to last year's 265. This is a normal variation in the life of a school, and it also means that we must, as always, be mindful and disciplined stewards of the School's resources.

Those resources, as is typical at any quality independent school, are largely devoted to compensating our staff. We are in the middle of a multi-year process aimed at increasing salaries to the median of AIMS schools that

# **Formation Report**

#### **Children's Ministries**

Children's Sunday School gathers children from Pre-K to 5th grade every Sunday morning at 9:15 a.m. for joint games and activities before splitting into two groups by age. This format, adopted this year, has helped build a sense of community across the age range while also providing more tailored lessons and activities for different age groups. The curriculum this past year was focused on the lectionary but will be shifting to a story-based one next year. Children's Chapel provides opportunity for ageappropriate fellowship and enrichment during the 10:30 a.m. church service. For infants and toddlers, the nursery is available from 9:15 a.m. through the 10:30 a.m. service.

#### **Youth Ministries**

St. Martin's youth ministries continue to provide a range of activities for our youth to grow in their faith. On Sunday mornings, we have three

different offerings based on year in school. For 6th, 7th, and 8th graders, Rite-13 combines some formal lessons with fun activities to engage youth as they progress past elementary school. Journey To Adulthood (J2A) consists of 9th and 10th graders who spent much of the past year preparing for their July pilgrimage to England. As part of their fundraising efforts, J2A hosted the perennially favorite Chili Cook-Off with tremendous results. It was a truly awesome evening of fellowship and food. Young Adults in Church (YAC) consists of 11th and 12th graders who spent the past year preparing for Confirmation after their pilgrimage to Italy last summer. That preparation culminated in Confirmation for many of them during Bishop Sutton's Visitation on April 23. All three programs are preparing to shift from a









lesson-based curriculum to an activity-based one in the upcoming year. In addition to these Sunday morning offerings, the Episcopal Youth Community (EYC) (grades 6-12) meet twice a month on Sunday evenings for fun activities such as bowling, progressive junk food dinners and noodle hockey.

#### **Adult Spiritual Formation**

St. Martin's provided a wide range of adult spiritual formation activities over the past year. The recently inaugurated Parents' Group has continued every Sunday morning at 9:15 a.m. with participant-led outreach. learning, and fellowship activities each week. Our new Bread Ministry has evolved from this group and is baking and delivering bread to our newest parish members. A four-week Sunday morning program on the power of story and its role in faith and life brought together adults across St. Martin's and we look

to bring similar programs to Sunday mornings over the coming program year.

In addition to Sunday morning activities, our strong Shepherd's group meets on Thursdays at 4:30 p.m. via Zoom for fellowship and lectionary-focused discussions. The Bible Challenge Book Study continues to meet in person on Tuesdays at St. Martin's House for interdenominational study and discussion on a number of Bible-focused topics/subjects.

Meetings are held the first Wednesday of each month in the Parish Hall at 7 PM and we invite you to join this vital and exciting ministry. As you read about the exciting and meaningful activities described below, please prayerfully consider whether God is calling you to help lead this ministry, since Parker and Tiffany will very soon be closing out their term of leadership.

A particularly productive highlight of the past year was the off-site Outreach Commission retreat on January 14, 2023. Held off-site at Bon Secours Retreat Center, the major outcome of the day-long retreat was to create a structure for narrowing and deepening the focus of the Outreach Commission's activities to allow more

meaningful impact in the following four areas: Food Insecurity, Homelessness, Mental Health, and Refugees.

#### **Food Insecurity**

Neighborhood Food Drives, kicked off in March by the Carlisle family. Monthly SPAN collections and weekly "Backpack Buddies" continue.







#### Homelessness

Regular Pizza Nights at Lighthouse Shelter in Annapolis. Winter Shelter – next year's date already established for March 2024.

The SMES Board of Trustees has seen a great year with excellent engagement and leadership from Mark Zilenski and Eileen Hartzel. Susan Shingledecker served as the vestry liaison to the school board this year, attending all school board meetings.

The relationship between the vestry, the governing

body of the church and the Board of Trustees, the governing body of the school is very strong. New Head of School Tony Schaffer has had an excellent first year and led the board in a discussion on enrollment models and will be initiating a strategic planning process in the coming months.

### **Music Ministries**

Following a couple of years of uncertainty and suffering, we have been blessed to resume our "normal" tasks at full capacity. Both the adult and handbell choirs have actively led our Sunday services covering various repertoire and their singing and ringing skills have continued to improve. We have also invited guest musicians to enrich our music program for special services.

One of the most notable accomplishments that the music ministries achieved in 2022 was presenting a fundraising concert, *Songful Prayer*, for those suffering in Ukraine. It was our first full choir

concert since I was appointed as the Director of Music Ministries at St. Martin's-in-the-Field in 2017, and it was a great success. Sharing God's love through music is the fundamental goal of our ministries and we were delighted to benefit the Ukrainian community by raising \$3,775. The theme for the concert was God's love, comfort, mercy and peace, and the program included a diverse repertoire with many of our favorite sacred songs, including, "Prayer for Ukraine," and "Peace Prayer" by St. Francis sung in Korean by guest tenor, James Kil.

Another successful achievement was holding an evensong service last October. Evensong is a unique and

That process is on track, and we will always need to be mindful of the work and focus required to ensure that we are able to offer the compensation needed to attract and retain the excellent teachers who deliver on St. Martin's Mission every day, in the classroom, in performance spaces, and on the fields and courts. This is another area that will be addressed in our strategic planning process.

The Board of Trustees will coordinate the strategic planning process in concert with the School's leadership team, and it could not be in better hands. Small boards and small schools often struggle to function at a high level, but that is not the case at St. Martin's. Board Chair Mark Zielinski, Vice Chair Eileen Hartzell, and Treasurer

Tonya Hill, in particular, are exceptionally effective as an Executive Committee and have been a tremendous support during this time of transition.

Rev. Matthew has been a strong supporter of our School as the fourth member of that Executive Committee, and we will miss him greatly. That said, because of all the work put in by the St. Martin's Church and School community in recent years, this opportunity will no doubt be an attractive one for many prospective candidates as the St. Martin's-in-the-Field searches for its next Rector.

It is an honor to serve as your Head of School, and I am proud to report that the School staff, students, PA, and friends across the community are advancing the Mission of our St. Martin's Episcopal School.



### **Buildings and Grounds**

The Buildings and Grounds Committee is a joint committee of the Church and School, and includes staff from each, as well as Vestry representatives. In the past, there were both church and school maintenance personnel that interacted to care for our campus. This year, these positions were combined under the school, resulting in great efficiencies and upgrading to



After deliberation and approval, projects are forwarded to the Finance Committee for their consideration. Projects completed in the last year include: new flooring in the parish hall, Narthex, and music room and replacement of the sanctuary speakers. A grant paid for new, brighter lighting at the church entrance and installing two new light poles for the rear parking lot. On-going maintenance has included repainting much of the campus interior, repairing fences, and eliminating a great liability by repointing the Heck Hall front steps. Several on-going grounds and maintenance contracts were reviewed and bid. Upcoming projects include leveling and sodding the athletic field and adding a sprinkler system and replacement of the narthex HVAC system, which will result in reconfiguring the Flower Guild/Altar Guild sacristy and the narthex closet.





#### **Personnel Committee**

Our committee met with Rev. Matthew to develop a job description for a newly created position in the church office- Parish Administrator & Volunteer Coordinator. The new position includes the basic responsibilities of overseeing various office functions and has a new component which addresses the need for a level of coordination between the rector and various church leaders and volunteers. This new component will be carried out primarily on Sunday mornings with those members of the congregation who assist in the organization and leadership of several Sunday morning duties -eg. Sunday School teachers, Youth leaders, Welcome Team members and other functions. These functions require this person to be present on Sunday mornings, in addition to normal church office hours. St. Martin's was able to recruit Ms. Katrina Schultz. recent University of Toronto graduate, who began work on May 1, 2023. Katrina, who has been involved with St. Martin's since childhood, will serve through the upcoming interim rector's time with the possibility of extended service following the new rector's arrival.
