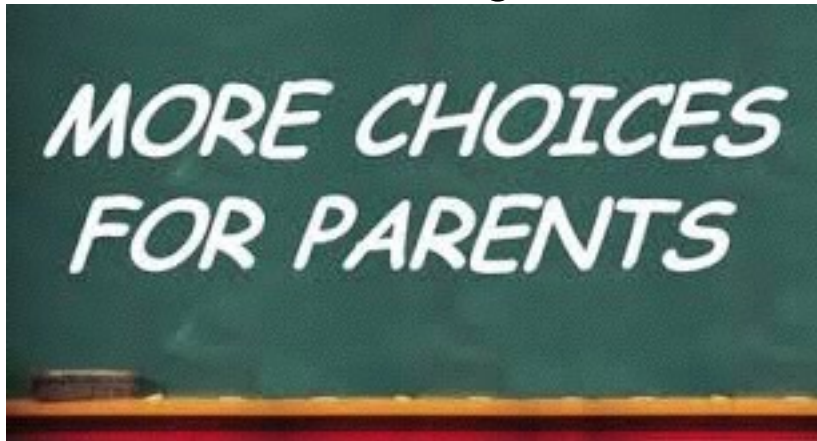


School Choice in Oregon



Are you concerned about your child's education in a one size fits all environment? Do you find some of curriculum objectionable and the content that is being taught to your child to be contradictory to your values? Do you believe our public schools are meddling in areas that were historically defined as family issues? One of the biggest obstacles to school choice is the teachers' unions: Oregon Education Association (OEA), [National Education Association \(NEA\)](#) and the [American Federal of Teachers \(AFT\)](#). The unions use the money collected from the teachers' annual union dues (approximately \$1000 per teacher) to support such organization as Planned Parenthood, GLSEN (Gay, Lesbian, Straight, Education Network). These unions are against charter schools, anti-school-choice, while being major donors to political campaigns. This is clearly unfair to teachers who do not support those political stands. How fair is this?

Fairness and equity seem to be the buzzwords that are being thrown around in today's educational lexicon. As parents and guardians we want the best education environment and opportunities for our children.

We want ALL students to be successful and have choices in the school they attend. Where is the fairness and equity to doom children to a system that is failing them? Where is the fairness and equity to have the unions control the outcome your child's education.
