- 1. Within 5 miles of Biffa operation or 10 miles of active Biffa landfill site.
- 2. Third party contributor to provide 10% of grant applying for.
- 3. Project is less than £200,000
- 4. Full public access for minimum 104 days per year.
- 5. Used for site-based improvement work, not equipment or running costs. NB No funding where other government incentives will be claimed e.g. Feed in Tariff for solar panels.

Naturesave Trust

Renewable energy, Wildlife conservation & Recycling projects

- 1. Funding is available for projects submitted by any organisation whether they be charities, voluntary organisations or businesses. The Trust is unable to fund individuals.
- 2. Projects must be entirely based within the UK.
- 3. Grants are made to projects which specifically address the promotion and implementation of sustainable development, environmental and / or conservationist improvement and or general 'green' issues.
- 4. Applications for funding must be forwarded with a completed funding application form, together with any further information that the applicant thinks inform the Trustees further and support their application.
- 5. Applications that cannot convey (to the best of their ability) what they are trying to achieve on the application form, have a lower chance of success. The best applications are those that are succinct, concise and relevant.
- 6. Applications for funding are dealt with on a rolling basis there are no deadlines. Please allow six-eight weeks for the trustees to reach a decision.
- 7. Grants given may be subject to various criteria and funds are only released once these criteria have been met.
- 8. The organisation and/or project must have a website.
