Always hike with a map, water, and weather protection

Friday, June 1st

Hike: Calypso Orchids

9:00 am Meet at the Visitor Center

On this easy 1.5 mile hike, join Naturalist Jim to look for one of the most beautiful flowers in the park. They only bloom for about a week!

Touch Table: Meet a Tiger Salamander

2:00-4:00 pm at the Visitor Center

Join Naturalist Erin to meet Colorado's only salamander species and our State Amphibian! Discover what they eat and how they live.

Saturday, June 2nd

Hike: Elk Meadow to Murphy's Cut

8:30 am Meet at Elk Meadow Trailhead

Join Naturalist Cindi on this 3.5-4 mile hike that will take you winding through forest and open meadows that showcase Raspberry Mountain, Pikes Peak and Sentinel Point. Travel to the cut made for the Midland Terminal Railroad tracks and loop back to see Peak View Pond.

Hike: Bird Walk

8:30 am Meet at Elk Meadow Trailhead

Join Naturalist Craig to look for birds on this easy 2 mile walk. Learn about bird's behavior, habitats, food and more!

Amphitheater: The History of Mueller

8:00 pm Meet at the Amphitheater

From Native Americans to today, learn about all of the people who lived off the land here and the events that led to Mueller becoming a State Park. This event is led by Naturalist Erin.

Monday, June 4th

Walk: Trees of Mueller/ Wapiti Trail

2:00 pm Meet at the Visitor Center

Join Naturalist Erin for a short 0.8 mile walk to learn about the different trees at Mueller. You can make a tree identification book and learn some interesting facts about trees.

Wednesday, June 6th

Touch Table: Horns and Antlers

2:00-3:00 pm Meet at the Visitor Center

Join Naturalist Cassie to see a variety of horns and antlers that came from animals in the Pikes Peak area. Find out who has horns and who has antlers. Feel how heavy they are! Drop in!

Thursday, June 7th

Ecology Hike

9:30 am Meet at the Visitor Center

Join Naturalist Linda on this 0.8 mile loop to explore how the plants and animals live and prosper in this mountain environment.

Amphitheater: History of Early Explorers & Military in the Pikes Peak Region

8:30 pm The Spanish from Mexico were amongst the earliest explorers in Colorado as they searched unsuccessfully for gold! After the Louisiana Purchase, the US Army was sent to explore and map the new land. Next came exploring mountain men and government mapping teams in search of a route to build the railroad to California. Naturalist Paul is presenting this history series, a new one every Thursday night! Dress warmly!

Friday, June 8th

Hike: Rock Pond

8:30 am Meet at the Visitor Center patio

Join Naturalist Cindi on this 5-mile loop. Highlights on this trail are two beautiful ponds, Rock and Geer and a narrow canyon with creeks and a waterfall. We may even see some Calypso or Lady Slipper Orchids! This is a moderate to difficult hike due to hills.

Hike: Cahill Cabin

10:00 am Meet at Grouse Mountain Trailhead

Join Naturalists Jeremy and Sylvia on this historic 3-mile loop to the old Cahill Cabin and Pond. This hike is rated moderate for hills.

Archery for Beginners

2:00 pm Meet at Dragonfly Pond

Archery is a fun and safe sport! Join Naturalists Jeremy and Sylvia to learn how to hold a bow, nock an arrow, aim, shoot and more. Ages 8 and up are welcome.

Amphitheater: Animal Trivia

8:30 pm Meet at the Amphitheater

Saturday, June 9th

Fly Fishing for Beginners

2:00 pm Meet at Dragonfly Pond Parking Lot

Join Naturalists Linda and Erin to learn the art of acting like an insect! Fly fishing involves lures that look just like aquatic insects and the skill to make your lure act like one.

Amphitheater: Pony Express & Cattle Drives

7:00 pm Meet at the Amphitheater

Hike: Geer Pond/ Lost Pond

Hike: Elk Brain Teaser Hike

Monday, June 11th

Hike: Dynamite Cabin

2:00 pm Meet at Grouse Mountain Trailhead

Savor the immense variety of wildflowers, trees and wildlife as you hike the Dynamite Trail with Naturalist Erin. Easy to moderate 1.8 miles long.

Amphitheater: Animals of Mueller

Have you heard an animal scurrying about, but when you look under a bush or behind a tree, it is gone? Join Naturalist Erin to find out more about the animals that live at Mueller - the small and the large. Dress warmly!

Tuesday, June 12th

Hike: Buffalo Rock

8:00 am Meet at Grouse Mountain Trailhead

Hike past the historic Cheesman Ranch and continue through an open meadow with beautiful views of Pikes Peak. I often see wild turkeys on this hike and there should be some wildflowers in bloom. Bring insect repellent, sunscreen, dress in layers and have sturdy footwear. Join Naturalist Nancy to hike this 3.5-4 mile loop.

Pond Safari

10:00 am Meet at Dragonfly Pond

What is that swimming in the water? Join Naturalist Linda to find out what types of amazing pond life are in the water and find out why they are important.

Wednesday, June 13th

Touch Table: Skins and Skulls

2:00-3:00 pm Meet at the Visitor Center

Join Naturalist Cassie to explore the skins and skulls of animals that call Mueller State Park their home. Come by any time.

Thursday, June 14th

Hike: Cahill Cabin

9:15 am Meet at Grouse Mountain Trailhead

Travel back in time with Naturalists Eileen and Carrie as you hike a 3 mile loop to the old Cahill Cabin and Pond. We will also visit the Lost Still! This is a moderate hike due to hills.

Amphitheater: History of Fur Trade in the Pikes Peak Region

Beginning in 1820, the trade in Beaver Fur was the industry of Colorado for over 30 years and lead to the exploration of Colorado. Join Naturalist Paul to learn the history of the Pikes Peak Region. Check out his history series every Thursday night! Dress warmly!

Saturday, June 16th

Hike: Cheesman Ranch

8:30 am Meet at Grouse Mountain Trailhead

Learn about the rich history of Mueller State Park as you see the sights, breathe in the mountain air and look for wildlife and wildflowers. Visit the many structures of the Cheesman Ranch, the best preserved historical buildings in the park. Naturalist Cindi will guide you on this 5 mile long but moderate trail. Bring plenty of water and a snack!

Children's Program: Black Bears

2:00 pm Meet at Camper Services Building

Join Naturalist Erin to learn about one of the largest mammals that lives at Mueller. We will learn what they eat and how they live.

Join Naturalist Erin for hands-on activities and games to discover the importance of black bears, mountain lions, foxes and other predators. We will look at skins, skulls and tracks to identify and learn about these common Mueller animals. Dress warmly!



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Monday, June 18th

Hike: Osborn Homestead

9:30 am Meet at Black Bear Trailhead
Visit the Osborn Homestead to take in some views and travel back in time with Naturalist Rose on this 3 mile moderate hike.

Tuesday, June 19th

Hike: Mash-up Hike

8:00 am Meet at Outlook Ridge Trailhead
Join Naturalist Nancy to combine 6 different trails to create and approx. 4-5 mile loop. This hike will start at Outlook Ridge (#7) to Geer Pond (#25), follow the short trail to Beaver Ponds (#26), then a section of Homestead (#12) to Black Bear (#13) and will finish up on Revenuer Ridge (#1) back to the trailhead. These mash-ups give a bit of variety to your hiking experience. You will see meadows, a pond, views and wooded trails and there should be some wildflowers in bloom too. Bring insect repellent, sunscreen, dress in layers and have sturdy footwear.

Wednesday, June 20th

Hike: Elk Meadow Loop

9:00 am Meet at Elk Meadow Trailhead
Join Naturalist Erin on this 2 mile loop hike that will take you winding through forests and open meadows. Watch for wildflowers and signs of wildlife!

Touch Table: Trees

2:00-3:00 pm Meet at the Visitor Center
Join Naturalist Cassie to discover the secrets trees can tell us! They are food, home and history books all in one. Also learn how to identify the trees in the park. Drop in!

Thursday, June 21st

Touch Table: Mule Deer

12:00-2:00 pm at the Visitor Center
Join Naturalist Erin at the Visitor Center to learn more about these important members of our ecosystem. We will also discover the adaptations which help them to survive! Come by any time.

Amphitheater: History of Mining in the Pikes Peak Region

The discovery of Gold in the Denver area in 1858, led to a mass migration to Colorado and the beginning of the mining industry that is still active today. Join Naturalist Paul to learn the history of the Pikes Peak Region and check out his history series every Thursday night! Dress warmly!

Hike: Rock Pond

Hike: Nobel Cabin

Learn about how the Ute Indians modified trees for navigational, spiritual, burial, medicinal, nutritional and educational purposes. Prayers Trees are now called Culturally Modified Trees. Join guest speaker, John Anderson for a presentation about the culture and the spirituality of the Ute. Hike at 3 pm to see one!

Hike: Prayer Trees

Join guest speaker, John Anderson for a hike to see a modified tree near School Pond and to learn more about the Ute. This is a 1.5 mile hike.
