Hello WCA Friends and Family:

Is it possible that weeks feel like months? It sure seemed like it this week at the legislature in Olympia! Buffers, Cougars, Water Rights and more. Updates on some key bills below:

SB 5613 – Van De Wege, Rolfs - Concerning the use of dogs to hunt black bear, cougar, or bobcat.

Thank you WCA members that signed in opposing this bad bill. Kudos to Jeff Dawson who testified for WCA and did an awesome job explaining the absolute necessity for counties to have this authority. Also appreciated the support from Sheriff Brad Manke from Stevens County and Sheriff Bob Songer in Klickitat County who both gave excellent testimony in opposition to the bill. It was also opposed by Hunters Heritage.

However, the bill was brought up for a vote and our friends on the committee were outnumbered in their opposition to an amendment from Senator Van De Wege that allows counties to continue using hounds to hunt cougars, but requires they get state approval.

The fight will continue. The bill was referred to Rules – If it is pulled to the Senate Floor, that will be the next chance to potentially amend the bill in this challenging legislative environment.

SB 5624 – Warnick, Van De Wege - Extending the expiration date of certain sections of chapter 92, Laws of 2019, regarding livestock identification.

WCA, The Cattle Feeders and Agri-Beef were all in support of this bill in the Hearing. It was voted out of committee unanimously. Sent to Rules.

HB 1838 – Lekanoff, Fitzgibbon - Protecting, restoring, and maintaining habitat for salmon recovery. “THE BUFFER BILL”

This may be the battle of the year. The worst of the bad legislation heard this week. First and foremost, has been **HB 1838 – “The Buffer Bill”**, which very well may put many producers out of business – especially on the west side of the mountains. As a refresher, this is the one that we talked about last week that calls for mandatory riparian buffers of up to 200ft, with \$10,000-a-day fines for landowners who don’t plant trees along creeks and rivers crossing their property. The bill directs the State Department of Fish and Wildlife to set and enforce “riparian management zones”.

Kudos to Randy Goode who gave excellent testimony. There were so many people signed up to oppose the bill, that it actually took two different hearings to capture it all (that’s the first time I can remember seeing that). It certainly wasn’t all testimony in opposition though – The Governors staff, the environmentalists and many tribal members spoke in support of the bill. I recently spoke to Representative Chapman who shared that the bill “as written” likely didn’t have the votes to get out of committee... And that’s the part that is frightening. We don’t want this bill to get out of committee in any way, shape or form. More to come on this fight. Stay tuned.

HB 1909 – Dent, Pollet - Concerning the misbranding of meat and poultry products.

Very much appreciate Representative Dent’s work on this bill. We anticipate an amendment for Voluntary Country of Origin Labeling, which we fully support.

HB 1856 – Chambers, Springer - Adding counties to the voluntary stewardship program.

We support this bill for the few counties that did not join the voluntary stewardship program. It is scheduled for executive session from the House Ag Committee.
