A Brief History of Lionism:

Probable evolution of the Lions emblem

The first idea of a Lions emblem was that of Alan Speed a friend and Mosaic brother of Melvin Jones. It consisted of the Masonic triangle with a gold circle and the letter L in the circle. The logo was probably not adopted because it looked very Masonic the Association would be a new entity with an image of serving the needy. It wanted to attract members who belong to various religious groups and other service communities these members thought that the symbol of a lion should be used because of the positive image is projected. A new emblem a emerged a design by Rosa Bonheur depicting a strong line holding a club between its teeth. Written on the club was the word international.



In the first edition of the Lions clubs magazine in November 1918 this logo was used it is significant that the addition was edited under the personal supervision of Melvin Jones.

Our current logo was designed by another friend of Melvin Jones, Maurice Blink and was presented to the board approval on April 12, 1920 the summer the 31st, 1921; the international Board of Directors approved it.



The circle contained in the “L” was blue with the circle around the “L” being gold the lion head from the second logo by Rosa Bonheur was increased to two which represented looking both into the past and into the future. The letter L in the center stands for: lion, liberty, loyalty, learning and leadership. The gold ring around the center represents the encirclement of the world. The word international from the second logo was maintained in the interior part of the emblem, and the name Lions which did not appear in previous designs was written on the top part of the emblem. The symbol of 1920 was simplified over the years to make it easier for clubs to use it in printing.



There were several other important things it took place during these first three years. In 1917 women were invited into the Lions Club, but in 1918 convention there was a motion made and carried to exclude women from the Association.

The finance committee recommended published in a magazine with all of the associations income above office expenses and the secretary’s salary was to be used for a magazine.

The first issue of the line appeared in November 1918 28 pages plus cover; it summarizes St. Louis convention listed new clubs. No one had envisioned the magazines growth that it was destined to be published in 19 different languages it would come the multilingual vault voice of lionism’s limitless world. By the end of the 1919 convention blending brains and determination in a climate of friendly cooperation, Lionism’s founders fashion a bold blueprint for lives devoted to helping others. The Mold had been set, it was the end of the beginning, but was for start of the largest and most successful service clubs in the world
