ALS Executive Director's Report

"The only thing worse than being blind is having sight but no vision" — Helen Keller

The Lions of Alabama for the past 74 years have displayed a vision of bringing vision care to many Alabamians. The inspiration Lions have received through the years from a blind Helen Keller has given vision to many Lion leaders but also has literally brought physical sight to hundreds of thousands just within our state alone. Our illustrious past is not only a source of pride for us, but to countless thousands, it has been a life changing event!

The Board of Directors of Alabama Lions Sight have issued a vision of even greater service that together we can do so much more in the conservation of sight. The partnership that the Lions sustain with UAB Callahan Eye Hospital allows the Lions to provide the opportunity for the underserved and indigent Alabamians to receive from one of the most advanced and highly ranked eye care hospitals in the nation! The process for Lions Clubs to recommend patients to the hospital have been mailed to each club and sight chair in all three districts. Almost every county in Alabama sends patients to the Lions Clinic in the hospital. This letter should be a help to each club to understand the process.

Alabama Lions Sight has a strong start in its quest to request state funding to screen students in every public school in Alabama. The process isn't quick, as most would understand in Alabama, to get the legislature to act on anyone's request! I can say we have been met with optimism and a plan to move forward in the process. While I have met with several legislators, the quest will require us to keep up the pace and get a quick start on next year's budget. Lions have the state of the art equipment to provide vision screening. The important thing to keep in mind is that we do not want our children to lack for the opportunity to succeed because of vision impairments when it is so easily preventable. What a great investment that can be made in the future of young Alabamians!

The amount of success of our Mobile Eye Clinic is beyond all expectations. This is a major endeavor for the Lions of Alabama! The cost is a heavy one, that is gladly accepted, because the result cannot be measured monetarily. For example, last week the MEC had an occasionally slow day at clinic seeing only five patients. Cost wise for that day equals a red-letter day. However, Dr. Daum saw two of those patients that are suffering from severe glaucoma. Neither one knew why their vision was deteriorating as they have been without vision care in a rural county that without the MEC they would have lost their sight within months! The MEC saved their sight that day! Truthfully, Lions can say that they are saving someone's sight every day and changing lives! Currently, the future possibilities for the MEC are beginning to mount. Our six month grant project with the Department of Public health will end in July. I have already signed an agreement to extend our partnership for another 8 clinics with the possibility of even more to come. Lions roar loud and proud!

Those attending the MD 34 Convention in Orange Beach saw first-hand the MEC in action. What a great sight project to bring the MEC to give complete dilated eye exams to residents of two assisted living facilities and to provide the same for Lions on Saturday at the convention! Lions you are providing great service! Thank you for allowing me to be a part of this great service.



Well the end is near and it's time for some reflection. The year as your District Governor has been anything but boring. I thank each of the approximate 1100 members for the privilege of serving you and your clubs this 2018-2019 program year. Before the year started as all the other 750 district governors around the world did, I established what I considered a set of very conservative goals in the areas of membership, leadership, service and Lions Clubs International Foundation. Now as I review these goals for one last time I am embarrassed to share how short I fell from attaining these conservative goals. But they served as good targets, we worked hard and although we fell short, I am pleased with what we have accomplished this program year. The year started in Las Vegas, NV at the International Convention, where we met the new International President Gudrun Yngvadottir, the first female president. What better way to start the new century than with New Voices looking Beyond the Horizon?

We soon were faced with the first District Cabinet meeting. Oh no, what is there to be done? A little first of the year business, some officer training, some awards from last year and where are all the pins, badges and patches everyone is expecting to receive. Evergreen provided a central meeting location and with the help of my wife, Lion Glenda, we had a successful Cabinet meeting.

Then came in August the Alabama Lions Leadership Conference in Montgomery, hosted by the district. Over 100 attendees, great speakers, an outstanding program provided by PID Lowell Bonds, excellence venue and what about the food. Get ready, it will be August again soon.

Club visits were started with a goal to complete the district governor visits by December 2018. Did I mention missed goals? I am planning a club visit tonight, as I write this article.

The first Council meeting was an exciting daylong event with over 4000 committee positions to be filled with only 3000 Alabama Lions. Two called Council meeting later the committees were finally in place.

All the while service and fund raising projects are being planned, conducted and celebrated – tunnel runs, dinnings in the dark, county fairs, vision screens, golf tournaments, day diabetes camps, week end diabetes camps, all week camps, turkey hunts for vision, flag displays, radio days, vision mission trips, food pantries filled, yard sales, eyes exams and glasses provided, pan cakes for all, video game tournaments, state centennial displays unloaded, assembled, disassembled and reloaded, pork barbecue all around, rubber duck races, yard sales and yes, even a pigeon race. To date over 10,000 hours of service to the citizens of south Alabama from this district.

Then came all the awards to hand out – 21 Club Excellence Awards, 101 Service Tabs recognizing over 2700 years of service as Lions and several centennial celebration awards for all clubs.

Before we knew it, the second Cabinet meeting was upon us and the second Council meeting, both of which saw important information passed along and multiple district business conducted.

The clubs I visited endured the one joke I told at every meeting and the same challenge in regards to membership growth. By now everyone in the district were sure that I cared nothing about service and was only focusing on membership retention and growth. Who is tired about hearing the Seal Beach, CA story and how to conduct a membership growth event. At this moment, congratulations are in order to the district. We are currently plus 30 in membership for the year and our drops are down about 40 from last year. Some clubs have taken my membership message to heart. One club has almost doubled its mem-

bership this year from 14 at the start to a current membership of 27 for an increase of 13. Another club has attracted 17 new members and even another 16 new members.

And speaking of new members, we have a new club that received final application approval May 13, 2019 in Troy, AL with 26 new members with directions from the new club president of each current member to recruit two members before June 30, 2019. I really like the new Troy Lions Club President.

The District has supported our Lions Clubs International Foundation well this year. We have added 10 Melvin Jones Fellows, year to date with a total of over \$35,000.00 donated.

For those who missed our District Convention in Atmore – it was the best. According to my count there were 101 in attendance, we all enjoyed our International Director Tom Gordon for Canada, and the magician without a rabbit was fun. If the other districts need a host club -you can't have Atmore.

A special thanks to PCC Dora and her committee for planning and conducting this year's State Convention. A huge time was had by all!

District 34 C is blessed to have the greatest suite of twenty-two Past District Governors – soon to be twenty-three. Thanks to each of you for continuing to love and support this district.

I would like to thank District 34 C Cabinet and the District Governor's team this year for their support, namely, Glen Elmore, LCIF Coordinator; Zone Chairpersons Pete Crews, Charlie Wigglesworth, Iris Ethridge, Mary Turner, Tim Edwards, Jody Rawls, Ron Tucker, Larry Bryant and Alexandra Conniff; IPDG Claudia Wigglesworth, Global Membership Coordinator; PDG Daryl McDaniel, Global Leadership Coordinator; PCC Linda Ziglar, Global Service Coordinator; Roger Mixson, Cabinet Secretary/Treasurer; and DGE Yvonne Burroughs, First Vice District Governor for their outstanding support this year. Campaign 100 - Empowering Service "The most ambitious fundraising effort in LCIF history, Campaign 100 will span three years and seek to raise \$ 300 million".

We the Alabama Lions are now about to close out 'year one' of Campaign 100, which means we have just one month left in this Lions year to achieve our goals . . . to raise \$110,000 to add to last year's total of \$90,000 to bring the 'year one' combined total for Alabama Lion's Campaign 100 contributions to \$200,000 (a goal of just \$20,000 more than last year). Working together, where we stand: MD-34 contributions thru April, the last available numbers as this is written, with May and June contributions to be reported: \$ 63,000 received, plus \$ 90,000 from last year for a 'year one' total of \$ 153,000, short of our goal by \$ 47,000 thru April.

Club or Lion's personal contributions from just 58 or our 129 total clubs comprise this total, which means the membership of 71 of our Lions Clubs have yet to contribute this Lions year.

Our fundraiser ticket sales concluded with the drawing of the one winning ticket during our banquet on Saturday night at State Convention. And the winner is . . . PCC Julia Pacheco of the Greater Dothan Lions Club - Congratulations Lion Julia, and Thank You All for your support of this fundraiser effort. Once again, the Prattville Lions Club paid for the printing of the tickets, and after all expenses, I have sent \$5,200+ to LCIF for Campaign 100 from the Alabama Lions!

T-shirts continue to be available in limited sizes and quantities for purchase at \$10 each - with these profits also going to Campaign 100. Please contact us to purchase.
