Scripture Reflection



Jesus' Baptism Brought Forth Eternal Life for Us All

One of the hard questions that I have encountered in grammar school was the question of why Jesus had to be baptized by St. John the Baptist if He is the Son of God and was born of the Virgin Mary who herself was conceived without original sin. I did not know the answer.

In that religion class we were taught that Christ had to be baptized by St. John not because he needed to be cleansed of original sin, but because if He is to be the savior of humanity, he needed to cleanse and sanctify the waters of the Jordan so that it can bring forth eternal life to all those who will be baptized in His name.

The baptism of the Lord in the Jordan by St. John the Baptist is the right way for Him to be inaugurated as the Savior of the world and to start his public ministry. During His baptism He was introduced by the Father and the Holy Spirit as the Beloved Son of God. The Holy Trinity was present at His Baptism.

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI in his book entitled, *"Jesus of Nazareth,"* wrote these explanations regarding Jesus' Baptism:

"Immersion in the water is about purification, about liberation from the filth of the past that burdens and distorts life. It is about beginning again, and that means it is about death and resurrection, about starting life over again anew. So, we could say that it is about rebirth."

The act of descending into the waters of this Baptism implies a confession of guilt and a plea for forgiveness in order to make a new beginning. In a world marked by sin, then this "Yes" to the entire will of God also expresses solidarity with men, who have incurred guilt but yearn for righteousness. Descending into the waters, the candidates for Baptism confess their sin and seek to be rid of their burden of guilt."

Looking at the events in the light of the Cross and Resurrection, we then realized what happened: Jesus loaded the burden of all mankind's guilt upon his shoulders; he bore it down into the depths of the Jordan. He inaugurated his public activity by stepping into the place of sinners. His inaugural gesture is an anticipation of the Cross.

He is, as it were, the true Jonah who said to the crew of the ship, *"Take me and throw me into the sea"* (Jonah 1:12). The whole significance of Jesus' baptism, the fact that he bears *"all righteousness"* first comes to light on the Cross. The Baptism is an acceptance of death for the sins of humanity, and the voice that calls out, *"This is my Beloved Son"* over the baptismal waters is an anticipatory reference to the Resurrection.

To accept the invitation to be baptized now means to go to the place of Jesus' Baptism. It is to go when He identifies himself with us and to receive there our identification with Him. The point where he anticipates death has now become the point where we anticipate rising again with Him.

In His baptism Jesus entered into the sins of others. His descent into the waters was done in the role of one whose suffering-with-others is a transforming suffering that turns the underworld around, knocking down and flinging open the gates of the abyss. His baptism is a descent into the house of the evil one, combat with the "strong man" who holds us captive.

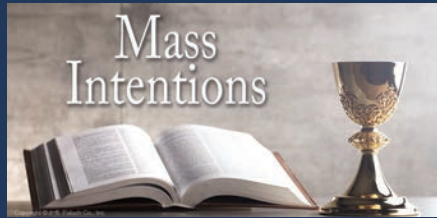
Throughout all its history, the world is powerless to defeat the "strong man;" he is overcome and bound by One yet stronger, who because of his equality with God, can take upon Himself all the sin of the world and then suffers it through the end – omitting nothing on the downward path into identity with the fallen. This struggle is the "conversion" of being that brings it into a new condition that prepares a new heaven and a new earth.

Looked at from this angle, the sacrament of Baptism appears as the gift of participation in Jesus' world-transforming struggle in the conversion of life that took place in his descent and ascent.

The solemnity today reminds us of our own baptism, when we were configured to Christ. We have been grafted to Christ, who is priest, prophet and King. We hear these words by the minister who administers the sacrament while anointing the newly baptized with the sacred chrism: He now anoints you with the chrism of salvation. As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet and King so may you live always as members of His body sharing everlasting life.

We have in the church many saints who have perfected the life of grace God has given us in Baptism. One of them is St. Faustina. They are the witnesses that the grace of our baptism is not in vain. If we believe in them and put them to life, we will live saintly lives like them. Jesus, the King of Divine Mercy, wants us to believe in the power that He had bestowed to us in Baptism.

In the image of our Lord, the King of Divine Mercy, we see the image of the sacrament of baptism - Our Lord explains it to St. Faustina – *The two rays denote Blood and Water. The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of the souls. These two rays issued forth from the very depths of My tender mercy when my agonized Heart was opened by a lance on the Cross. These rays shield souls from the wrath of My Father.* -Fr. Robert

Check your child's backpack

Check to make sure your children are not carrying too much around in their backpacks. Backpacks that are too heavy can cause problems like neck or back pain, or poor posture.

The American Chiropractic Association (ACA) recommends that a child's backpack weigh no more than 5-10% of the child's body weight.

Help your children by ensuring that they wear their backpacks correctly, with both straps over the shoulders, and that they are only carrying what they need. If you have concerns about the load your child is carrying, reach out to a teacher or school staff to discuss what should and should not be coming home every day.

LIFE, JUSTICE AND PEACE SPOTLIGHT

January is Poverty Awareness Month

Did you know that more than 1.5 million children experience homelessness in a year and more than 38 million Americans live in poverty? Poverty results from a multitude of factors, including demographics, economic issues affecting employment and housing, health status, and more.

The domestic anti-poverty program of the US. Catholic Bishops, the **Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD)**, is an instrument of the Catholic Church working to break the cycle of poverty. CCHD aims to carry out the mission of Jesus Christ, "... to bring good news to the poor ... release to captives ... sight to the blind, and let the oppressed go free" (Luke 4:18).

CCHD provides the Catholic faithful with concrete opportunities to live out the love of God and neighbor in ways that express our baptismal call and continuing Eucharistic transformation. CCHD is made possible by the generous support of Catholics in the United States, especially through an annual parish collection. CCHD holds the belief that those who are directly affected by unjust systems and structures have the best insight into knowing how to change them. CCHD works to break the cycle of poverty by helping low-income people participate in decisions that affect their lives, families and communities.

What can we do to impact poverty in our communities?

- **LEARN ABOUT POVERTY**, it's causes, and ways that we can respond:

Charitable Works and Social Justice - There are two different, but complementary, ways that we can walk the path of love, or caritas. We call these the **"Two Feet of Love in Action,"** based on Pope Benedict XVI's reflections in *Deus Caritas Est* (God is Love) and *Caritas in Veritate* (Charity in Truth).

Charitable Works help to alleviate basic needs and aid individuals and families. "Christian charity is first of all the simple response to immediate needs and specific situations: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, caring for and healing the sick, visit those in prison, etc." -Pope Benedict XVI, *Deus Caritas Est*, no. 31

Social Justice removes root causes of poverty and improves structures. "Social justice concerns the social, political, and economic aspects and, above all, the structural dimension of problems and their respective solutions." -Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, no. 201

The Church's Social Teaching is a rich treasure of wisdom about building a just society and living lives of holiness amidst the challenges of modern society. <https://www.usccb.org/offices/justice-peace-human-development/catholic-social-teaching>

- **RECEIVE THE EUCHARIST** - The Eucharist, celebrated as a community, teaches us about human dignity; calls us to the right relationship with God, ourselves, and others; invites us to community and solidarity; and sends us on mission to help transform our communities, neighborhoods, and world.

- **VOLUNTEER or DONATE** - Volunteer at or donate to local community organizations that assist low-income people and empower families' and individuals' self-sufficiency and promote the thriving of all people. Two such local organization are:

- **WRITE TO CONGRESS** - Write your elected officials about poverty issues you care about (<http://www.usccb.org/issues-and-action/take-action-now/index.cfm>).

- **CHOOSE YOUR WORDS WISELY** - Using derogatory terms and/or making generalizations about people who are living in poverty works against people who are trying to get back on their feet. Instead, talk with people who are struggling and listen to their stories.

- **SHOW RESPECT** - Jesus chooses to reveal himself in poverty. Be respectful of people's occupation and considerate of all types of workers we encounter every day. Treat our unsheltered neighbors with dignity and respect.

THE BAPTISM of the LORD

*A voice from heaven,
"You are my beloved Son;
with you I am well pleased."
-Luke 3:22*

A MODEL FOR OUR PRAYER LIFE

The Advent/Christmas cycle that began on November 28 ends with the Baptism of the Lord. We likely have an image in our minds (based on details from the Gospels and works of art) of what that scene looked like. We might wonder, "Who else was there and who wasn't?" No disciples were present because Jesus had not yet begun his ministry. They would have to wait until the Transfiguration to hear a similar message. However, the three persons of the Blessed Trinity are accounted for: the Father (the voice from heaven), the Son Jesus, and the Holy Spirit. Interestingly, Luke alone notes that it was after Jesus had been baptized and while he was praying that the voice was heard. All of the Gospels show Jesus praying at turning points in his ministry; this is but the first example of Jesus' need to root himself in prayer throughout his life—a model for us to follow.

ON THE CUSP OF A NEW CREATION

It was on the Fourth Sunday of Advent this past December that we first heard of the two cousins, John and Jesus, meeting. Then it was in the womb of their mothers, Elizabeth and Mary. Now the cousins meet again on the shore of the Jordan River. John is already well known—so much so that people had begun to wonder if he was the long-awaited Messiah. Jesus, on the other hand, is about to begin his ministry. One could say that Jesus entered the waters of the Jordan as a private person and came out of them as a public one. The voice from heaven left no doubt about that. As we come to the end of the Christmas season our readings echo Isaiah and Titus (see Advent and Christmas Day readings) and together with today's Psalm 104 they point us to Pentecost. We are on the cusp of a new creation.

JOHN THE BAPTIST: PATRON SAINT OF LITURGICAL MINISTERS?

John the Baptist was what we might call today a "social influencer." People paid attention to what he had to say. And what he said affected the choices people made. Yet today's Gospel reminds us of John the Baptist's ultimate goal: "One mightier than I is coming." The Baptizer walks the fine line between drawing attention to himself with his fiery preaching and then re-directing that attention to Jesus, the "beloved Son." John the Baptist could be considered the "patron saint" of those who minister as lectors, extraordinary ministers of the eucharist, cantors, greeters, acolytes, and musicians. Isn't John's teaching a good goal for a liturgical (or any!) minister? Rooted in the graces of their own baptism, ministers must be skilled and confident enough to draw people's attention (or, at least, not turn them off!) and then gradually re-focus that attention on Jesus.
