
THE HEART OF THE MATTER Lenten Bible Study

Led by The Rev. Deacon Pam Rhea, March 9, 16, 23,30; April 6, 13 at 5:30 p.m. in the Earline Robertson Room.

"Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me." (Psalm 51:10)

What does a clean heart look like to God? This Lent we will look at The Heart of the Matter by looking at matters of the heart in a six-week teaching series.

The servant's heart


The grateful heart

Reflection from Father Jason

Lent begins on March 2, with the observance of Ash Wednesday. During the course of the service, we acknowledge to God our wretchedness, admit to a series of sins committed by most modern Christians, and ask God to give us true repentance and a clean heart. For years I have downplayed the admission of our wretchedness, and the borderline, self-flagellation that often accompanies it. But in doing this, I have weakened the argument for our need to repent. Where there's no sin, there's no need for repentance. Because of our hard-heartedness, sometimes the only way for us to recognize our sinfulness is to have it shoved in our face. We are amazingly good at justifying our sins and pardoning ourselves. But this flies in the face of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us," (1 John 1:8-10). Lent isn't a time for

bemoaning our fallen state, as though we have no choice in how we live- it is a time to shine the light on the darkness of our lives, to bring before God all those things that have no place in His kingdom, and leave them there at the foot of the cross. If we can do this - if we can bring before God our sins, and leave them at the cross, when we get to Good Friday the impact of what Christ did for us will drop us to our knees. Lent is about drawing closer to God, and removing those things in our lives that separate us from the love of God. It is about sacrifice, but what we sacrifice is that which is destroying us: our pride, hypocrisy, impatience, self-indulgent appetites, exploitation of other people, envy of those more fortunate than ourselves, false judgments, our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, and our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors (BCP 268). God isn't asking us to sacrifice chocolate or fast food; God is calling us to sacrifice those things that keep us out of the kingdom - the one that's here and the one to come.



This year for Lent we are offering several different ways to come closer to God. On Sundays from 9:15-10:00, Father Jason will lead a study of The Great Divorce by C.S. Lewis. It is an allegorical work about what we can bring into the Kingdom of God, and what we must leave behind. On Wednesdays at 12:05 there will be Holy Eucharist in the chapel, and at 5:30 Pam Rhea will lead a class about what it means to have a clean heart (create in me a clean heart O God, and renew a right spirit within me, Psalm 51:11). We will also be reintroducing acolytes and the choir to the Sunday service, and beginning on Ash Wednesday, return to the altar rail for communion (though we are still mandated by the diocese to limit the cup to intinction). My prayer for this Lent is two-fold: one, that it not be interrupted by Covid, and two, that we prayerfully and intentionally examine our souls, and rid ourselves of those things that separate us from the love of Christ.
