

Socktober!



Reflection from Father Jason

I am tired, and I don't think I am alone in this. When I preach I usually try to stick to speaking about myself; this happened organically after the service one Sunday, when a parishioner was upset that I said we didn't do a good job caring for the poor. He listed all the various ways that he took care of poor people, and I apologized, and told him that from then on I would do my best to speak for myself. But I believe it's safe to say that we - that is, all of humanity in general - are tired. Our souls are tired, weary and wary. We are tired of violence, uncertainty, deceitfulness, tragedy, dissension and conflict. We are tired of controversy, which dominates nearly every source of news we have. The root meaning of controversy means to turn against, which is unfortunately appropriate for this day and age; it feels like we are continually turning against each other, looking for and picking fights where none should exist, while ignoring our basic call to love and help one another. This isn't a call unique to Christianity - it's one shared by every significant faith in the world. I feel that we collectively know that our souls are tired, but instead of looking for rest, we find ways to become even more busy. One of the telling things that happened during the pandemic was society's unwillingness to stay still for any length of time. It's as if the earth knew we needed to slow down - that we are sick, and we need our rest. But we are not good patients, nor do we have patience, and it wasn't long before we turned against each other over how to live with and during a world-wide pandemic. Sides were taken almost immediately - and if you were on one side, you were as good as dead to the other. And this is as much as I feel I can safely say about some of what's made our souls so weary. I don't know how to talk about the presidential election of 2020, the Black Lives Matter movement, immigration, gun violence, non-gun violence, the war in Ukraine or the significant uptick in natural disasters, without causing some kind of controversy. But I definitely think that all of those things have added to the stress on our souls.

What are we doing to refresh and renew our souls? What are we doing to renew our hope in the world? How are we renewing our faith? "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen," (Hebrews 11:1, ESV). In our Sunday school class on discernment, one of the primary things we discussed was sharing with God our true selves, with the faith that there is nothing we can do that would make God love us less. We believe that God knows everything about us, so it's not for God's benefit that we confess, but for ours. Doing the work we are called to do - loving one another - is exhausting, even when we are in great spiritual shape. But when we are tired and run down, it can seem impossible. We need to be able to tell God that we are tired - that we need help. We need to tell God what it is we hope for, and how we hope to achieve it. Until we can admit that our souls are tired, and take the time to rest them, the world will continue to wear us down. We are tired, weary, and worn; we have all been through a lot; even just standing on the sidelines has been exhausting. We need to admit this - pray on it, talk to God about it, tell God every bothering us, and ask Him to help and heal us. Be honest - say how you feel about the people you disagree with, unload everything to God, and when you finish, say the Lord's Prayer. It might take several days or weeks of doing this to find relief, but it will come. As we unburden our souls of worry, angst and anger, we will find room for grace, hope and love. We are tired, but there is hope for rest and renewal, and it starts by talking with God.

THE BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO THE ENNEAGRAM


The Enneagram is a spiritual tool for personal growth and development in order to deepen our understandings of ourselves and our relationship to God and the world.

Recommendations will be accepted until Noon on October 17, 2022. To recommend someone, please place the name in a sealed envelope and turn in to Lori in the church office. Please indicate the person and the position for which you are recommending them.

The nominating committee is made up of the outgoing vestry members, outgoing Senior Warden, Stewardship co-chairs, and two at-large members appointed by the vestry. The committee will prepare a slate to be published in November. The committee considers upcoming needs of the parish as well as people who are faithful in service and attendance. As in the past, the congregation can, until late December, make additional nominations of people willing to serve. The final slate, with short biographical sketches about the nominees, will be published before the annual meeting.
