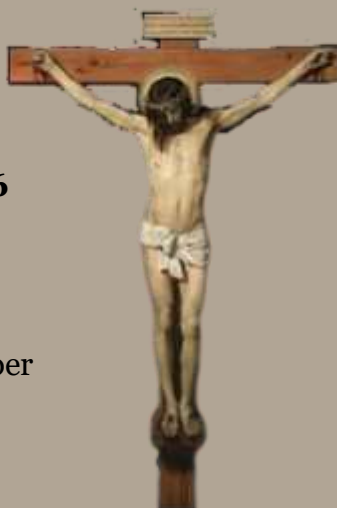

From the Priest-in-Charge



This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it. These simple, yet profoundly powerful words from Psalm 118 can anchor us at any time. And they are especially appropriate as we move from Lent into Holy Week and to the joy of Easter. They can help us as we live in a very anxious and uncertain world. They can anchor us in our personal anxieties and fears that we encounter every day.

We can bring our anxiety and fears to Christ at any time. But during Holy Week, we can bring all of ourselves- our anxiety, fears and our joys as we walk with Him to Jerusalem, to Gethsemane, to the Cross and to an empty tomb. Through the liturgies of Holy Week, we are given an opportunity to participate with Jesus in those final days of his life- days and events that changed the course of the world and can personally transform us in the here and now. We are given the time and space to stop and ponder what they mean for us. It is then that we will be able to experience the full joy of the Resurrection. So, this is a time to truly open our hearts to the Lord. His grace is a free gift that he invites us to welcome into our hearts and lives. We have Jesus Christ who is always present to us. He has died and has risen from the dead. He has overcome sin and brokenness. He has conquered evil. He has reconciled us to Himself once and for all. He has given us the hope of everlasting life and the certain joy and peace which we can experience even here on earth.

Here at Christ Church, there is much to have hope in. There is much that will bring us joy. Our average Sunday attendance has increased and our financial giving has increased. Our Sunday School and Adult Formation remains strong. We have four children preparing for First Communion and one adult preparing for Confirmation. Our music program is growing and nine children have asked to join the newly formed Children's Choir. More of you have expressed a real desire to be involved in parish leadership roles. Our new Vestry and I are working on ways to help the parish run more smoothly and address both our parish and community needs. We are a parish that strives to live into the reality that we are an important part of the Body of Christ.

The joy of Easter is so much more than the return of spring, brighter sunnier days, new flowers, green grass and bunnies. It is more than family gatherings and memories of past holidays. These things are wonderful and we thank God for them. But it is more important that we don't forget why we celebrate. Through Christ's death and resurrection, life and our existence has changed at its core. No longer does evil have the final say. No longer are we faced with the decay of this life. Christ has ensured for all of creation, that death is conquered. He offers new and eternal life- a life that we can touch even now. This year, let us experience this Easter reality!

From the Organist & Choir Director



Music Ministry Spring 2025

The choristers are going strong! As I'm writing we currently have increased to nine choristers!

There's always room for more! I would like to extend my thanks to Fr. Civale, Erika Holland, all parents, grandparents and our secretary, Betsy for helping me get this program up and running. The response has been a blessing. A great deal goes into educating our choristers, which includes books, materials, vestments, rehearsals and Services. This vibrant ministry would not be possible without the prayers and support of the congregation. During the spring, I will be reaching to the Woodbury and other nearby elementary schools and their music faculties to invite their students to our rehearsals. Our program beautifully reinforces and expands upon the school curriculum with solfège, theory, instrument exploration, and classical repertoire.



We have reinstated our membership with The Royal School of Church Music of America so that our choristers can receive their awards as they progress through the various levels which include sight singing/solfeggio, music theory, vocal production, languages, and liturgical music in reference to the Book of Common Prayer. Currently seven choristers are working on earning their surplice (white vestment that goes over the cassock) and Scott Cranston is working on the next ribbon for his St. Nicholas medal and Head Chorister award. We have begun using the Full Voice Workbook Series, I encourage all parents who like their children to learn to read music fluently to have their children become a chorister.

The choristers will be busy during Lent preparing music for Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. During Eastertide we are planning on having our choristers featured and participate in the local American Guild of Organist's event: Pipes, Pedals & Pizza. This will be an ecumenical event and youth from all Woodbury denominations will be invited to this event which aims to teach young people about the history and uniqueness of the pipe organ.

More ecumenical happenings with the Adult Choir have taken place. Due to the positive response from Lessons & Carols, several singers from the wider community have reached out and asked to

sing for special Services. On Ash Wednesday at the 6:30PM Liturgy the Full Choir with guest singers offered the famous (perhaps “infamous”) Miserere by Allegri, which is probably the most breathtaking and spiritually thought-provoking musical setting of Psalm 51. It was written around 1638 for the Sistine Chapel Choir. Because it was written exclusively for the Sistine Chapel Choir, it was not published for quite a long time and secrecy surrounded the composition. This secrecy stems from that there were only three authorized copies outside the Vatican, of which were held by Emperor Leopold I, the King of Portugal, and Padre Martini. When finally published it was frequently performed in England, including such places as London, where performances dating as far back as c. 1735 are documented, to the point that by the 1760s, it was considered one of the works “most usually” performed by the Academy of Ancient Music according to Handel. In a letter written by Leopold Mozart to his wife on 14 April 1770, that at fourteen years of age, while visiting Rome, his son Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart first heard the piece during the Wednesday service, and later that day, wrote it down entirely from memory. It’s preservation and acclaim today is widely due to the chapel choirs of Kings College Cambridge, Magdalen College & New College, Oxford.

It is our aim to periodically offer special choral works that will attract members of the community to come and sing with our wonderful Adult Choir. We hope and pray our guest singers will find a musical as well as a spiritual home at Christ Church. The adult choir is striving to evangelize through the beautiful music they sing. It was a joy to welcome back singers from Lessons & Carols. We are always welcoming newcomers and are just as eager to grow as the youth in the chorister ministry!

During Lent the Adult Choir will be offering a lot of music from the Tudor period. We will highlight the contemplative and sublime music of William Byrd whose music was a favorite of Queen Elizabeth the First, and his Gloria from the Mass for five voices was featured at the coronation of King Charles the Third.

Fellows writes in his History of Anglican Church Music that, “William Byrd was the finest composer England ever produced”. Easter Sunday will be enriched with the music of another British composer: Ralph Vaughan Williams. The Full Choir and Choristers will sing together the first of the Five Mystical Songs: Easter, which movingly begins with the words by the Anglican priest and poet George Herbert, “Rise heart; thy Lord risen”. If anyone who is not currently in the choir would like to participate in the music of Lent, Holy Week and Easter please do not hesitate in reaching out to me. There’s always room for another enthusiastic voice.

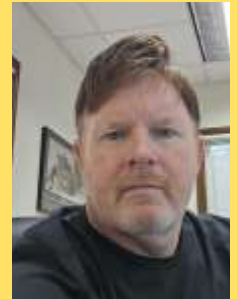
Currently, I am busily preparing for Holy Week and Easter and looking forward to tackling some of the many office projects that remain.

Book Corner

I love to read, and given the limits on my time, I also listen to a lot of audio books. It's become one of my favorite ways to stay connected to new ideas and reflections, even in the midst of a busy schedule. I also enjoy sharing book recommendations with others, and I thought it would be fun to share a few recent ones here in the newsletter. If you do decide to pick up any of these books—whether written or audible—I'd love to hear your thoughts and what resonates with you!

Lent with St. Benedict, Bede Frost

I've been spending my Lenten mornings with *Lent with St. Benedict*, and it's become such a grounding practice for me. Each day offers a short, thoughtful reflection that helps me apply the spiritual wisdom of St. Benedict's Rule to my own life. As someone who can get distracted by the demands of the world, it's been so helpful to take a step back and reflect on what it means to live a more focused, spiritual life.

What I love most is that it's not just about "doing more" for Lent—it's about understanding the heart of what we're called to during this season, and how we can apply those insights even outside the monastery. Bede Frost's background in both academic theology and practical spirituality brings a depth to the way he helps us engage with Benedict's teachings. It's not just about rules—it's about finding balance and grace in our daily routines. Whether you're in the middle of Lent or reading it at any other time of the year, it's a book that asks you to really consider what it means to be spiritually present in a chaotic world.

Bittersweet, Shauna Niequist

I just finished listening to *Bittersweet* by Shauna Niequist, and it's one of those books that you can't help but feel deeply while reading. Niequist doesn't shy away from life's struggles—her miscarriages, marriage challenges, and job loss—but she also encourages us to embrace the bittersweetness of life. What struck me most is her ability to weave together joy and sorrow in a way that feels both real and relatable.

There were moments when I found myself taken aback by her lush descriptions of food and life's little luxuries, but then I realized—it's all part of the book's central theme. She's teaching us to savor both the sweet and the bitter moments. Life can be messy, but it's also filled with beautiful, joyful things to appreciate, even in the midst of hardship. It's a reminder that suffering doesn't erase the goodness around us; it can actually deepen our appreciation for life's colors and flavors.

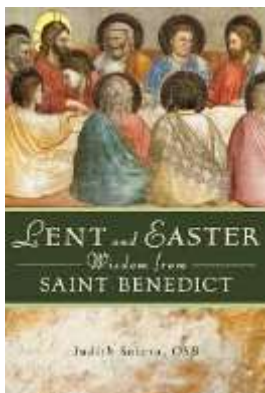
Let Them, Mel Robbins

I've read my fair share of self-help books over the years and recently took a hiatus from them. But a friend recommended *Let Them* by Mel Robbins so I gave it a go. It was a quick listen – the pace is energetic and paradoxically seems to take too long at times but I did appreciate Robbins' focus on relationships and the importance of letting go of control. In a world where we often feel like we need to have it all or fix everything, Robbins challenges us to stop trying to control the uncontrollable and focus on our own actions and responses.

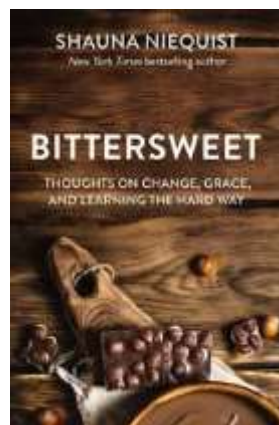
I have a tendency to want to control everything—relationships, circumstances, how people perceive me—and Robbins rightly points out through her theory of "Let Them/Let Me" that this only leads to stress and burnout. Robbins argues that, while we can't change others, we can change how we react.

However, while I found many practical insights in the book, there's an important caveat I have to share. The idea that we can solve all our problems on our own can be tempting, but as Christians we know that real transformation doesn't come from just our efforts. It comes from Christ. While Robbins' advice is helpful, it's a reminder for me that relying on my own strength will only get me so far; I need God's guidance, too.

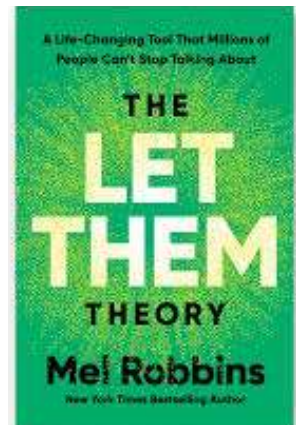

Youth Group

Christ Church Youth Serve at Kitchen of Hope

Early one Saturday morning, five members of Christ Church's Youth Group, along with four adult leaders, gathered at Kitchen of Hope, the food pantry ministry at St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Glassboro. This vital outreach program provides food to over 100 families each month, ensuring that those in need have access to fresh groceries and essential supplies.

From 8 to 11:30 AM, our team jumped right in—unloading deliveries, sorting and packing food, and distributing bags of groceries to community members. The pantry operates as a drive-up service, so we worked together to bring food directly to each car. Some of us loaded bags, others greeted visitors, and a few handled logistics behind the scenes. It was a fast-paced morning, but knowing we were helping make a real difference kept everyone motivated.

One of the most powerful parts of the day was seeing just how much this ministry means to the families who rely on it. A simple smile and a “thank you” from someone receiving food reminded us why this kind of work matters. It wasn't just about handing out groceries—it was about showing kindness, offering dignity, and building community.

After finishing up, we headed over to the Cranston home for some well-earned pizza and a chance to reflect on the morning.
