LICENSED LAY MINISTRY (LLM): PASTORAL CARE

It made me remember good times, tough times, and times when I was afraid. But I survived with God's help. In such a brief time it made us all trust each other with our true selves.

We just read several chapters on 'Men Don't Cry ,,, Women Do'. The book explained how everyone grieves differently. In families that lose their loved ones, each can grieve in different ways, and we must accept and adapt to each of their needs. Men do not show grief like women who seek support groups and cry. The book points out that there are also different kinds of loss; it could be divorce, loss of a job, all these events can affect how people deal with these disappointments differently. Learning to recognize the different ways that men and women deal with their loss. We must also remember that we cannot put men in one category and women in another category. We must open our minds and provide comfort to people who need help, regardless of how they demonstrate their loss.
