Good afternoon,

North Carolina girls in grades 9-12 have an exciting opportunity to test their cybersecurity skills and compete for cash and prizes through Girls Go CyberStart and we're asking you to get your students involved.

Girls Go CyberStart is a free and fun online program where students solve digital challenges and participate in online games. The competition gives girls in grades 9-12 the opportunity to discover if they have an interest in cybersecurity or computer science and explore potential future careers. Last year, more than 10,000 girls across the country participated in Girls Go CyberStart including more than 600 North Carolina students. North Carolina participants and their teachers took home a total of \$8,550 in cash prizes and scholarships.

On Wednesday, November 27, Governor Roy Cooper issued a [press release](#) encouraging North Carolina high school girls to join this innovative cybersecurity competition. Please help us spread the word about the program and consider signing up as an advisor, which is someone who forms a club, or club, and serves as a point of contact for your school's participants.

To get started, all a school needs to do is identify an advisor and register the club beginning today. Students and advisors need no prior experience to participate, only a computer, reliable internet connection, and Chrome or Firefox. Advisors are supported through various materials provided by Girls Go CyberStart.

This is the third year North Carolina has participated in the competition and feedback has been very positive:

The program also provides an opportunity for boys to explore cybersecurity. Schools that have five girls who qualify for Stage 2 of Girls Go CyberStart will earn additional non-competition licenses for boys or other girls in their school to participate.
