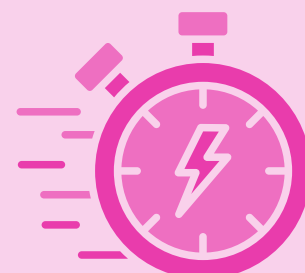

Behind Every Case IS A STORY

A couple of months back, a client came to our market as a walk-in, seeking formula and diapers for her young child. I directed her to the market so she could shop for the items she needed. During our conversation, she shared that she was a survivor of domestic violence. She had recently left her abuser and was living in her car with her children, having left with only the clothes they were wearing and no money to purchase formula or diapers.

I asked if she had ever applied for WIC. She told me that her former partner did not support applying for government assistance, so she had never accessed those benefits. I helped her contact WIC and schedule an appointment so she could begin receiving support.

I also asked whether she had ever applied for a protection order. She said she had never applied because she was extremely afraid to do so. I explained the process to her and encouraged her to apply as soon as possible, since the other person was currently in custody, which would make it easier to serve the protection order.

I provided information about completing a housing assessment for herself and her children, explaining how it would place her on the waiting list for housing assistance. She completed the assessment, and by our next appointment, she had already been accepted into a housing program.

The client worked hard to rebuild her life and remain in the area, but her abuser continued to harass her. Last month, she called to let us know she would no longer be returning to the market, as she had received assistance to relocate to her hometown, where she could be closer to family. She also shared that she had obtained a protection order, was awarded full custody of her children, and that her abuser had been incarcerated.

She expressed how grateful she was for the support she received through The Just One Project, sharing that she would not have known what steps to take without the guidance and resources we provided. Since returning to her hometown, she has secured full-time employment and returned to school with the support of her family. Her journey is a testament to her strength, resilience, and determination to create a safe and stable future for herself and her children.
