Tell me a little about your agency, yourself, your career, and your current position.

The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society exists to cure leukemia, lymphoma, myeloma & Hodgkin's Disease and improve the quality of life of our patients and their families. We work to assure patients have access to quality affordable care while funding cutting edge research. We offer support services to patients and their families and advocate on their behalf. Over the last five years, LLS helped advance 75% of the almost 100 FDA-approved blood cancer treatment options.



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As LLS staff, we know all too well how pediatric blood cancer affects the lives of young patients and their families. Treatments are harsh and outdated, and the long-term effects of current therapies can create severe life-threatening complications, which is why LLS is investing over \$100 million over the next 5 years in pediatric blood cancer care and research. The project is called the Children's Initiative.

My career began in foodservice. I was very fortunate in 2006 to be able to choose something that I wanted to do VS having to do. I started as our Light the Night Director, was promoted to Special Events Director, left the organization for 6 months and returned as the Sr. Manager of Man & Woman of the Year. 6 years ago I earn the Executive Director role.
