## **Associated Builders and Contractors 2023 End of Session Report**

### **2023 Legislature**

The Nevada 2023 legislative session began February 1<sup>st</sup> 2023 and adjourned Sine Die on June 6<sup>th</sup>, 2023. The session began with considerable starts and stops as Carson City received historic snowfall causing a number of “snow day” cancellations. Once the session got rolling the consensus among observers was there seemed to be a lack of urgency in the process. This led to a worse than usual rush as the legislature worked toward adjournment.

The rush was made worse by the late session introduction of legislation to provide tax incentives for the Oakland A’s major league baseball team to relocate to Southern Nevada and for Sony Pictures to relocate their business to the Las Vegas area. Ultimately the A’s stadium proposal passed during a special session with bipartisan support while it was decided to leave the Sony Entertainment proposal to a potential special session in the Fall.

As might be expected during a session when the Democrats controlled both houses of the legislature and the Republicans controlled the governor’s mansion, there was plenty of disagreement about policy. This led to an unprecedented veto of one of the budget bills at the end of the regular session. As a result, two separate special sessions were required for the legislature to complete its business. The first lasted less than a day as the legislature adopted the budget that had been vetoed by the governor. The second lasted several days and ultimately saw the legislature approve incentives for the A’s to relocate.

In the end, after periods of uncertainty regarding their performance, most observers gave high marks to the legislative leaders of both houses.

### **Governor**

Governor Joe Lombardo generally earned high marks for his initial legislative effort. Surrounded by a strong team that served him well, the governor navigated a difficult process well. At times he was bipartisan and accommodating and at others he was aggressive and unyielding. In the end, he was able to get many of his priorities on the table and passed in amendment form. In terms of a grade from ABC Nevada, the Governor earned an A plus. ABC’s lobbying team was in constant contact with the governor’s legislative team and he vetoed the majority of the bills we found to be problematic.

### **Legislation**

As with every legislative session, ABC tracked and monitored hundreds of bills for potential impact on our members. A complete spreadsheet of the bills we monitored is attached to this report. However, many pieces of legislation required additional engagement on behalf of the ABC Lobbying team. Those bills are listed below:

## **Approved by the Governor**

### **Assembly Bill 22**

This bill was introduced by the Nevada Contractors Board. It revises provisions governing the actions that the State Contractors Board is authorized or required to take after the issuance of a cease and desist order for unlicensed activity.

### **Assembly Bill 23**

This was another bill introduced at the request of the contractor's board. It authorizes a person who is issued a written administrative citation by the State Contractors Board to request an informal citation conference before the Executive Officer of the Board. The board is then required to hold a hearing in these regards.

### **Assembly Bill 27**

This bill requires a general building contractor who provides management and counseling services on a construction project to have an active license in the same classifications and subclassifications that are required to be held by the prime contractor.

### **Assembly Bill 29**

This bill revises the grounds for disciplinary action against a licensed contractor by the State Contractors Board to include certain acts related to another person's application for a contractor's license.

### **Assembly Bill 163**

This bill provides for hours of leave, if an employee is a victim of an act which constitutes sexual assault.

### **Assembly Bill 189**

This bill gives authority to county commissioners in a county whose population is 700,000 or more (Clark County) to restrict the hours in which construction work may begin in a common-interest community. This bill started by providing this right throughout a local government jurisdiction but was amended to just apply to common interest communities.

### **Assembly Bill 210**

This bill requires contractors on a public work to provide a worker with written or electronic notice of certain information; requiring a person found by the Labor Commissioner to have willfully and repeatedly failed to pay prevailing wages to a worker, to pay certain damages to the affected worker. ABC spent considerable time on this bill amending it to a place where we were neutral.

### **Assembly Bill 391**

This bill authorizes a local government to enter into a pre-hire agreement for a public work. This includes a preference for hiring labor on the work to local residents. This bill contains a vague reference to project labor agreements. ABC was able to remove those provisions. Based on discussions with the local governments, we do not believe they will use the pre-hired agreements allowed by the bill. ABC did request a veto from the Governor, and out of all the vetoes we sought, it was the only one the Governor signed into law.

**Senate Bill 82**

This bill eliminates the threshold number of workers for the applicability of the requirements for using apprentices. Also, expands the circumstances under which a person is treated as an apprentice for those requirements. ABC opposed this bill throughout the session as it allowed journey workers who are within 3 years of graduation to be counted as apprentices for purposes of the apprentice utilization laws. In the end we were able to amend the bill in a way that got us to neutral as it now only impacts union programs.

**Senate Bill 147**

This bill requires that whenever an employer places an employee on non-working status, the wages earned and unpaid at the time of such placement become due and payable immediately.

**Senate Bill 226**

As drafted, this bill would have dramatically expanded the applicability of prevailing wage. ABC spent considerable time on this bill and ultimately was able to get it amended to clarify that prevailing wage must be paid on lease purchase projects.

**Vetoed By Governor****Assembly Bill 97**

This bill authorizes that a governing body of a city, county or other governmental entity may adopt a building code, ordinance or take any other action to prohibit the construction or use of an evaporative cooling mechanism. This received a majority vote in both houses but was vetoed by the Governor due to an oversight in the drafting.

**Assembly Bill 359**

This bill would have increased certain taxes imposed on fuels for motor vehicles in certain larger counties. This was the fuel indexing proposal that had wide support from business groups, including ABC. The veto of this bill came as a surprise to all. The governor objected to the fact that it did not go to the ballot before indexing the current fuel tax.

**Assembly Bill 235**

This bill originally required the payment of prevailing wage to workers who perform custom fabrication of non-standard goods or materials. An amendment was adopted to provide that prevailing wage only be applicable to the following: sheet metal products, plumbing or pipe fitting, ventilation system, air conditioning system, and heating systems. ABC remained opposed to the bill throughout the session. We worked to ensure that the bill received a party-line vote. We requested that the Governor consider vetoing this bill, which he did once it reached his desk.

**Assembly Bill 305**

This bill requires a contractor or subcontractor to ensure at least 2 percent of the hours of labor performed by apprentices must be performed by women, women who are veterans, or women in minority groups. We worked to make this bill acceptable and ultimately got to a position of neutral.

**Senate Bill 433**

This bill provides criteria that a Labor Commissioner is required to examine when determining whether prevailing wages are required to be paid on a project. This bill started out to be very damaging. However, we were able to secure a significant amendment that has moved us to a neutral position on the bill.

**Senate Bill 301**

This bill required prevailing wage to be paid to those delivering and removing construction material from the site of a public work. We expressed significant opposition to this bill as it would significantly increase the cost of public construction.

**Senate Bill 384**

This bill sets certain requirements for state agencies that award grants of federal money for the development of broadband services and infrastructure. This legislation set an unfair precedent by outlining a process that gave contractors subject to collective bargaining agreements a different and unfair standard for qualifying to bid these projects. ABC opposed this bill based on the precedent.

**Failed to Pass the Legislative Process****Assembly Bill 89**

This bill would have required contractors and subcontractors on public work to use the federal E-Verify employment verification system to verify eligibility for employment.

**Assembly Bill 106**

This bill would have authorized the State Contractors Board to annually adjust the value of work for which a licensed contractor may perform and not have a license in the applicable classification or subclassification.

**Assembly Bill 171**

This bill authorizes a public body or its authorized representatives to award a contract for a public work for which the estimated cost exceeds \$100,000 to the responsive and responsible bidder offering the best value bid if the public works project presents unique and complex construction challenges.

**Senate Bill 26**

This bill would have allowed the authority of the Administrator of the State Public Works Division of the Department of Administration to approve change orders related to the construction and repair of certain building projects.

**Senate Bill 52**

This bill would have given the State Public Works Board or the State Public Works Division of the Department of Administration, the authority to establish standards for the efficient use of energy.

**Senate Bill 111**

This bill revises certain requirements relating to prime contractors. This bill failed to meet the deadline.

**Senate Bill 193**

This bill would have increased the Nevada gross revenue threshold in which certain business entities engaged in business with this State are required to pay the commerce tax.

**Senate Bill 233**

This bill would have lowered the amount of taxes collected on the rental of certain heavy equipment. This bill would have also exempted certain heavy equipment from the tax on personal property. ABC worked to amend this bill at the request of several of our members. However, the measure failed to gain passage.

**Senate Bill 394**

This bill would have limited the total amount of tax abatements allowed. This bill would have capped any abatement at \$500,000. This bill was of significant concern to ABC and the business community. We worked with our business group partners to defeat this bill.

**Senate Bill 427**

This bill required training related to the mitigation of heat illness and exposure to poor air quality. This bill was of significant concern to ABC because it set up standards for heat mitigation that were simply not feasible in Southern Nevada. We spent considerable time trying to get the bill amended to accommodate our concerns. Unfortunately, we were unable to reach consensus and worked to defeat the legislation. It passed the Senate on a party line vote but failed to pass the Assembly.

**Conclusion**

On paper, the 2023 session of the Nevada Legislature was a difficult session for an organization like ABC to navigate. Anytime the Democrats control both houses of the legislature it is inevitable that pro-union legislation will emerge. However, based on our years of working with legislators, legislative leaders and union organizations, and building relationships of trust, ABC was extremely successful in getting many of our concerns with proposed legislation this session addressed while bills were still in the legislature. For those bills of concern that we were unable to address in the legislature, ABC relied on a strong relationship with the governor and his staff. The governor did not disappoint, vetoing a record number of bills this session.

In the end, ABC was able to leave the 2023 session with the status quo in place relative to the majority of issues we are concerned about. In the past few sessions, ABC has positioned itself as the premier construction organization in Carson City. ABC once again has proven to be the catalyst for the industry lobbying effort, providing input and strategy that is generally followed by the rest of the construction lobby in Carson City. In short, ABC's financial and logistical commitment to politics in Nevada is paying off in a big way.

Special thanks to all our members who support and sustain our political efforts. In addition, many thanks to the ABC Government Affairs Committee who met with us weekly to discuss

legislation and help formulate amendments and testimony. We believe we can count this session as a success for our members.
