Get the kids up and moving for a game of Follow the Leader or Simon Says. These games are simple enough for the children to understand. Roll Like a Rock

Technical steps for the forward roll:

- 1. Stand up and stretch your arms forward.
- 2. Squat and face forward.
- 3. Bend your head down.
- 4. Roll around on your back.
- 5. Finish it on your bottom with your arms around your knees.
- 6. Stretch your legs forward and stretch your arms forward the air.
- 7. Return to position in Step 1.

To make story rocks, you will need enough fairly large, flat rocks for the characters in your story. Then take the characters' pictures, place them on the rocks and paint over them with watered down glue. Let the rocks dry completely.
