It is easy, really easy, to say that we will work to build bridges between people with differing viewpoints. But given the times we live in - this may in fact be our most difficult task. All of us love Newton and have a vision for what we want it to be. We will all have to work hard to listen to each other and keep open minds and if we disagree, we can still do this agreeably.

Just a word about a few things I hope accomplish with the council – Along with the Clerk we need to strengthen our communication with Newton Citizens. As I said, so many don't know what we are doing and why. Information can go a long way toward building bridges. I'm also very interested in using technology more effectively for us as Councilors and for citizens access to information about our work. We aren't using our brand new screen today but the next time you come to one of our Council meetings – seeing the presentations in the Chamber will improve by 1000%. And finally, I'm asking

our Committee Chairs to take time at the beginning of the term to develop an agenda – and determine what are the things the Council can do in this term to move Newton forward.

Two years ago we were blessed by a prayer from Reverend Howard Haywood who sadly left us last year. He talked about our being brought together on inauguration day by our visions for better world; by stewardship of the natural world, caring for children and families, civic compassion, understanding and inclusiveness for all members of the community.

These are good thoughts for me to end with. I look forward to a productive term for the city council and for our city. I wish all of you a healthy, happy and productive New Year.
