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The 8 Habits of Evangelism

Habit #7 Fellowship

Koinonia- it's a word we have all heard, I imagine. We think of fellowship—perhaps fellowship dinners at church, or the camaraderie lived out when working together on a project, or the feeling of connectedness in a prayer circle or Bible study. We don't necessarily connect koinonia with evangelism.

But Vilmarie Cintron-Olivieri (former Co-Moderator of the General Assembly) and Jose Manuel Capella-Pratts remind us that “the way we relate to others is a practice of evangelism, a way of communicating the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ.”

And we find examples of koinonia in Jesus' life. When Jesus meets Zaccheus, he goes with him to his house, not to “sell” him anything, or push a dogma on him, but to be in fellowship with him. When the disciples are sent out in Acts 2, we are told “day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. Cintron-Olivieri and Capella-Pratts remind us that it is the LORD'S action, not ours, that added. “It is not our task to “add,” they say. Rather, instead of focusing on getting new members, perhaps we should focus on practicing fellowship in a way that reflects the character of Jesus Christ.

Virtually every church describes themselves as “friendly.” But when I work with congregations, I ask “are you a friendly church, or a church of friends?” Often churches are very good at greeting and welcoming people into worship. But then I often see the second action, which is to turn to someone they already know (perhaps grew up with, raised their children together, etc.) and talking with them: “How's the grandkids? Did you get out to the beach this year?” and the newcomer...is left standing alone.

We need to cultivate the habits of listening and paying attention. Rev. Kay Lindahl writes “learning to truly listen to one another is the beginning of new understanding and compassion.” It creates authentic relationships, with God and with each other.

And, to be honest, it takes time and energy. But God calls us to be apostles, to be sent out into the world. How can we know the needs of the world, of our communities, until we listen and pay attention? How do we join God's work in the world God so loves, unless we see and hear and model God's love?

John Pavlovitz asks: “What if the best way we make disciples is by showing people the fullest incarnation of Jesus that we can manage, and rest in that?”¹

Discussion Question:

In light of this idea of koinonia as evangelism, can you identify examples of what authentic fellowship looks like in your context/community?

Adaptive Change...

We have heard about it, and experienced it ourselves. Perhaps you see that the ways we are church no longer works in our contexts. Sunday mornings are no longer reserved solely for church, the neighborhoods around us have changed, the old ways of reaching out (flyers, billboards, ads in the phone book or newspaper) no longer work. The pews are a little emptier, the offering plate a little lighter, the energy level, low, as we know that something isn't working, but everything we have tried...just doesn't work.

You know you are faced with an adaptive challenge...when none of the solutions we have used on a problem work.

But we rest in the promise that Christ will always have a church, and so we look for new ways to be the church in this time and context. Learning adaptive change skills is part of that new way.

Shenandoah Presbytery, through our Committee on Congregational Vitality and Transformation, will be working with Pneumatrix, who bring "Adaptive Change Leadership skills for congregational transformation with 'roll-up-you-sleeves' consulting and capacity building." This training is designed to have trained leaders ("apprentices") walk with congregations and their congregational leaders (session, members, pastoral leader) for a 2-year period, seeing what is, and discerning what is possible, to be the church God is calling us all to be.

Pneumatrix training will take place in 6, 90-minute zooms, plus a single one-on-one training with an "apprentice," over the course of a year. We are looking for people who have the gifts, skills, and energy to work with congregations and their leaders in adaptive change, as well as congregations themselves.

The overall adaptive process with congregations will hit each of these elements:

- The Life Cycles of a Congregation and "Gathering on the Balcony"
- Leadership v Authority- Creative Disequilibrium
- Diagnosis- Archetypes, Reading the Landscape and Naming the Elephants
- Reframing the Questions, Resetting the Defaults
- Culture Shifting- sharing the new lens and Reaching the "Aha" moments
- Orchestrating Conflict- Embracing the Minefields
- Fine Tuning your Role as an Adaptive Change Leader: Motivation, Inspiration, Courage
- Positive Deviance and the Value of Failure
- Jeremiah 29 – exile and the prosperity of the City
- Adaptive DNA


Presbyterian Women's 2022-2023 Horizons Bible Study

An Introduction to the Bible Study will also be offered at the Big Training Event, September 10, 2022 at Massanetta Springs Conference Center.





Shower Trailers Move On

About ten years ago Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) expressed a need for more shower trailers. Our Presbytery responded by building two. Twenty-foot box trailers were outfitted with shower stalls and one trailer had a washer/dryer and sinks. Covenant Church built one unit with a matching grant from PDA. The other trailer was procured and converted by donations from many Mountain Valley Mission Community churches. Both trailers were designed and built by church volunteers. They were designed for use by work teams at PDA volunteer host sites to work on long-term recovery from natural disasters. The Covenant trailer saw PDA service in South Carolina and then in Baton Rouge, LA. Our work teams annually going south delivered and moved that trailer across a three-year period. The MVMC trailer saw service each winter for the Winchester Area Temporary Thermal Shelter (WATTS) and several other assignments within the Presbytery.



Recently our Disaster Preparedness & Response Team with responsibility for operating and maintaining the trailers thought it was time to find new homes for the shower trailers where they could be put to better and more frequent use at disaster recovery sites. Using contacts with the PDA National Response Team, arrangements were made to transfer the trailers (DPRT members Dave & Carolyn Thalman are on that Team). After approval from the Committee on Mission & Outreach and the Coordination & Planning Commission, transfer arrangements were

made. The Covenant trailer was recently refurbished by Dan Drumheller of Covenant Church. It has been transferred to the West Virginia VOAD (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster) where it has already been deployed to Smithers, WV on the Kanawha River to aid the flood recovery there. The MVMC trailer was transferred to Charlotte Presbytery who has a Community Disaster Response Team that specializes in maintaining and deploying shower and tool units for PDA. They will refurbish that trailer and expect to deploy it to Kentucky.



The DPRT wishes to thank all those who assisted with this ministry over many years. We are very pleased that these resources will be put to good use for disaster response over many more years to come.

September is Disaster Preparedness Month

Disasters strike with little warning and produce chaos among families and communities, including churches. Shenandoah Presbytery has a Disaster Preparedness and Response Team that can help families and churches be prepared for disasters to reduce the chaos and improve the time for recovery. REFLECTIONS From Sally Hinchman, Interim General Presbyter

I recently learned about a Japanese tradition from a colleague of mine, Steve Yamaguchi.

Green tea is called 'ocha' and condiments are never added to this tea. However, black tea is called "kocha" and takes sugar and cream nicely. The same plant (Camellia sinensis) yields these two different drinks for two different worlds. He went on to share that when the Japanese drink ocha there is one pot on the table. Also when your cup is empty, etiquette does not allow you to lift the pot and fill your own cup. You may and should fill the empty cups of others at the table. You must wait for another person to fill your cup. It would be impolite and self-serving to fill your own cup. He said that these manners work wonderfully as long as everyone tunes into the etiquette and pays attention to each other's needs and cups.

His hope and prayer (and I concur) is that at this year's General Assembly we would have an opportunity to drink ocha together. His prayer is that we will sit down for ocha with God. That we would linger with God as we drink ocha and be filled with God's spirit. That we would not try and fill our own cup with words but to listen to one another and fill each others cups.

I have recently been cleaning out old files and boxes. This presbytery has a rich and wonderful history that grew out of your past from the Presbyteries of Lexington and Winchester. To become the Presbytery of Shenandoah I believe that you drank ocha with each other along this journey. It was important for each former presbytery to fill one another's cup.

As the Presbytery of Shenandoah moves into this second year of transition I hope and pray that we also will learn to fill one another's cup. To step back and celebrate all that is good throughout the past. But to also be open to filling one another's cup which 'may' mean letting go of some of your long standing ways of being a presbytery. It 'may' mean opening yourself up for another to fill your cup with new ideas. It will require individuals to be attentive to someone else's cup at the table.
